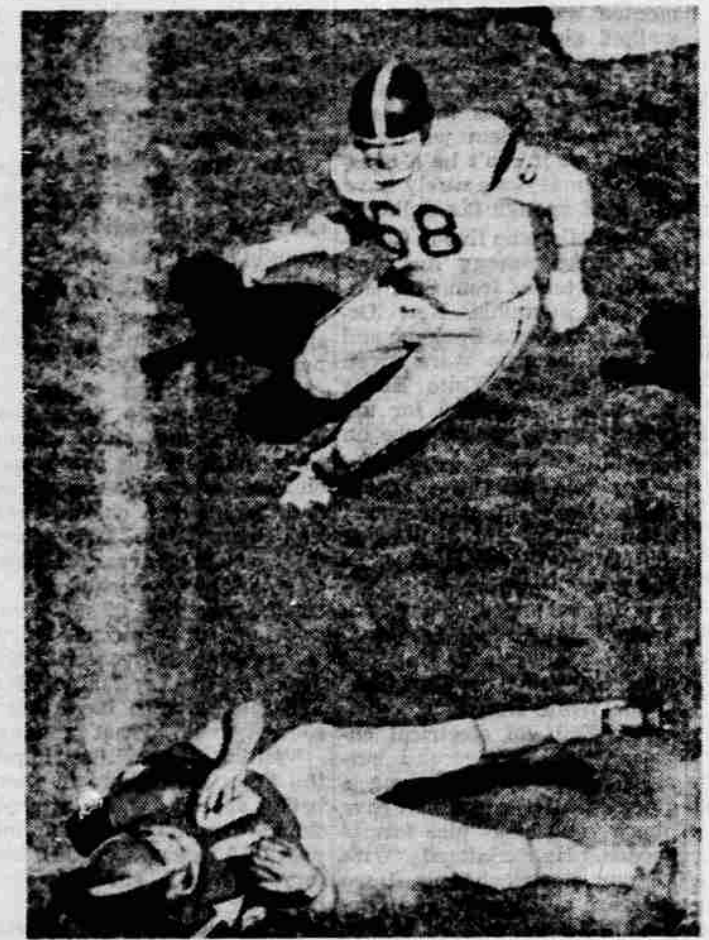


# Guard Hero in Los Angeles But Rated Bum in Berkeley

# GP Downs Medford In JV Grid Clash

Grants Pass High school, using breaks to the fullest advantage, downed the Medford High junior varsity in a thrilling defensive game last night on the Medford high football field 13-7.

The Tornado had the ball for only four plays at the first of the quarter before having to punt. The Cavekids then began a drive from their own 35-yard line to the Medford 14. Vic Van Koten took a pitch-out and was dropped for an eight yard loss back to the 22 by Jim Stevens. On the next play a Bob Lewellyn pass was batted in the air by Stevens and caught by Larry Brown on the 10-yard line, giving the Tornado the ball. Mike McCollough made six yards up the middle and George Clearwater went to the 20 but fumbled and Gary McClain picked up the ball and scampered 20 yards for the touchdown. A Lewellyn pass to McClain was broken up.

After the kick-off the Cavekids used the best defense in the game, ball control. After the score the Tornadoes could not keep the ball for more than two downs at a time. In the first half the Tornado ran only 12 plays in contrast to the 33 by the Grants Pass club. In the first half the Tornado fumbled four times and lost the ball three times, also the Tornado had a pass intercepted. The Medford crew did not pick up a first down in the first half and they netted only 18 yards from scrimmage.

After taking the opening kickoff Grants Pass moved

the face of halfback Steve Bates during Saturday's 14-7 loss to USC.

"I saw absolutely no intentional smash with the elbow or shoulder but a rolling type of block," Clark said after studying game films for eight hours. And with one dissenting vote, the Los Angeles football writers named McKeever college player of the week from that area.

But Elliott, who viewed a different set of films, declared that his first peak at the movies showed McKeever taking a crack at Bates after the latter had fallen out of bounds during the second period.

**Deliberate Elbow Smash**  
"It was not a question of piling on," Elliott said. "McKeever had plenty of time to sail over Bates. But he put his hands together and hit him with an elbow smash. And believe me, no weapon is more lethal than the elbow. It's three times worse than a fist."

Bates is in Cowell Memorial hospital after incurring what Elliott described as a "cheek fracture from the eye socket to the sinus area, a broken nose and loose teeth."

McKeever, one-half of Troy's famed twin linemen, denied there was "malicious intent" to hurt Bates or any other California player.

"Marlin (his brother who plays end) and I have always tried to play hard, aggressive and clean football. It is unfortunate that this accident happened," Mike said.

Clark added: "Mike played one of the greatest offensive and defensive games of football I have ever seen and it is a shame that his outstanding efforts are being clouded by these accusations."

Elliott said he aired the charges, "because if somebody doesn't say and do something when a player has a record for fouling, then football won't be helped."

Elliott also said he would like to go over the game films with Clark but that both men were busy getting ready for next Saturday's games.

Asked if he would take punitive action if he thought a player on his squad indulged in personal fouling, Elliott said "Yes, I would. And I did, not too long ago."

Tom Hamilton, the executive director of the "Big Five" to which the Trojans and Bears belong, lightly chided Elliott for airing the incident and immediately was "ganged-tackled" by reporters at the weekly football writers lunch here.

**Wants No Publicity**  
"Pete, you should have called Clark and handled the matter between the two of you," Hamilton said.

Pittsburgh's former coach and athletic director also said that the press had the ability to "highlight or lowlight" certain phases of the game and that the McKeever-Bates affair should have been played down.

Amid a barrage of rebuttals by Bay Area scribes, Hamilton also said, "the incident should have been suppressed because it does damage to the kid. I'm sure McKeever is a fine boy. And Clark can handle him."

Lost in the shuffle was the fact that McKeever, who now has been kicked out of two straight games, was not chased at Berkeley for the Bates incident but for applying a forearm smash to the jaw of sophomore quarterback Pete Olson in the final quarter.

# Small Center Big Reason For Wins By Oregon Ducks' Football Team

Eugene, Ore. - A small center named Bob Peterson is a big reason why Oregon's football team has been ticking so solidly this year.

Peterson, who weighs a shade under 190, co-captains the Ducks and is a native son nominee for the UPI All-America squad. This is the same pivot man who took over as center midway through the 1957 season then starred against Ohio State's tough line as the Ducks were losing a heart-breaker, 10-7, in the Rose Bowl.

With Peterson on the job, Oregon has been the surprise of the West Coast this season. The Ducks won their first five games in a row, knocking over the previously unbeaten Air Force-20-3-in the process.

Last season, Oregon only had a 4-6 record although it sported one of the country's best defensive marks, allowing only 50 points in 10 games. Peterson was a major factor on that defense. But the Webfoots were hit hard in the line by graduation and

sophomore and starred there as some of the Ohio State team can testify.

Last season as a junior, Peterson earned the West Coast coaches' nod for All-Coast center. And this year, although bothered by an injured foot and a drop in his weight, he has remained the sparkplug of the thin Oregon line both on offense and defense.

A lot of tub-thumpers feel that Peterson's ability to be at the right place at the right time and his competitive spirit rates him some mention this year when the All-America ballots are cast.

As Frei puts it, "He's a dandy."

Peterson will be working against California's line next Saturday when the Bears come up for a game with Oregon at Portland. Other leading coast battles feature West Virginia at Southern California, Oregon State at Washington, UCLA at Stanford, Fresno State at College of the Pacific and Wyoming at San Jose State.

Washington State is idle.

"If there is another war, at least the Medford Tornado will be on our side."

That, according to Speed Prescott, sportswriter for the Ashland Tidings, is about the only consolation the Ashland high school football team won 56 to 0 last Friday night.

Prescott said that the Grizzlies joined a select group of high school ball clubs which have been the victims of "as destructive a ball club as has come down the pike in many a year." He added that the Grizzlies didn't have a chance against "perfection personified."

**NEEDS JUST TIE**  
Medford high needs only a tie in its game with Grants Pass this week end to claim the Southern Oregon conference and District 6 A-1 football crown. Grants Pass has to win to gain even a co-championship. But, under league rules, a victory for the GP Cavemen would send them into the state title play-offs instead of the Black Tornado.

Southern Oregon conference regulations stipulate that when two teams knot for the crown and a tie game is not involved, the team which has beaten the other gets the play-off spot.

**50th CONTEST**  
The important game here next Friday night will be the 50th between Medford and Grants Pass. The Tornado has won 36 and Grants Pass 11. Scraps in 1957 and 1958 were the only ties. In the past seven seasons under the coaching helm of Fred Spiegelberg, Tornado teams have lost only once, 13 to 12 in 1953, to GP mentor Mel Ingram's eleveners. Medford won 20 to 13 in 1952, 14 to 7 in 1954, and again in 1955 and 28 to 6 in 1956. The ties were 20 to 20 in 1957 and 0 to 0 last year.

**369 POINTS SCORED**  
Tornado players will enter the Caveman hassle after having amassed 369 points against eight other teams this season. That's an average of 46.1 per game. There have been 57 touchdowns and 27 extra points. Medford foes have totaled 70 counters. Grants Pass has run up 116 markers while its rivals have scored 150.

**PLUMLEY, COPPLE RIVAL**  
On hand at Corvallis last Saturday to see two of his high school stars play against each other was Medford grid mentor Spiegelberg. The players were Neil Plumley of Oregon State college and Dick Copple of Washington State university. The two were linemen on the 1956 state runner-up Black Tornado team.

Spiegelberg, a WSU alum, said that Neil, a defensive left tackle, did a real fine job on defense during the second half. He played more than half the game. Copple, No. 2 defensive tackle for the Cougars, saw duty in about half the game. He called defensive signals when in the

# Bob Bragan New Dodger Head Coach Bears Will Discuss 'Fouling' Charges

Los Angeles -UPI—Bobby Bragan, whose antics have entertained baseball fans in both the major and minor leagues, today replaced equally colorful Charlie Dressen as coach for the Los Angeles Dodgers.

The appointment of Bragan as Dressen's successor was announced Monday by Los Angeles General Manager E. J. (Buzzie) Bavasi who dipped into the club's farm system for the replacement for Dressen.

Bavasi said Manager Walt Alston picked Bragan as his new assistant when the general manager had suggested that they stay within the Dodger organization in picking the coach. Pete Rieser also had been mentioned as a possibility.

Bragan brings to the Dodgers experience as both a major and minor league manager. He managed Pittsburgh in 1956-57 and for half of 1958 he managed Cleveland. For the past year and a half he has managed the Dodger farm club in the Pacific Coast league at Spokane, Wash.

The spill occurred at the three-eighths pole of the six-furlong event when Hindu Mood, with Burns aboard, ran up on another horse's heels and went down. Bartock, carrying Lumm, and Miz Claudette, with Lopez aboard, tumbled over the fallen horse, throwing their riders to the track.
