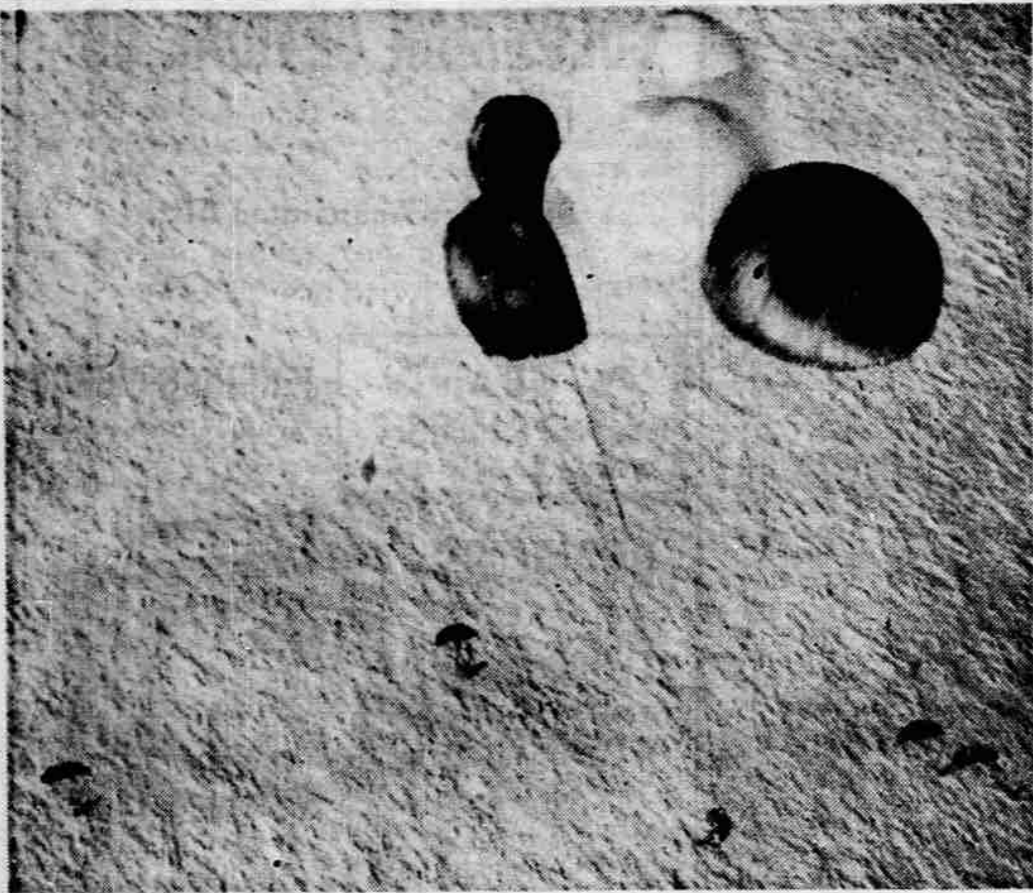


Snow Turns Midwest Into Traffic Mess; Schools Closed

AMERICAN SHOT IN CUBA; RESCUE REPORT FALSE

Havana, Cuba — (UPI) — Three men dressed in military uniforms and carrying rifles fired on American-born Maj. William Morgan's house Wednesday night in an apparent assassination attempt, it was disclosed today. One of the attackers was captured.

Morgan was absent but his family, servants and bodyguards were there.

The guards quickly returned the fire and caught a man

identified as Manuel Aleaga Gonzales. The prisoner was said to be an Army sergeant in the Cuban Air Force supply office. He was said to be a former member of the National Revolutionary Police from which he was fired.

Morgan is a Castro supporter and holds the rank of "commandante," or major, in the Cuban revolutionary forces.

The search for missing Cuban Army Commander Maj. Camillo Cienfuegos, meanwhile, went into its eighth day in an atmosphere of deepening mystery.

There was some speculation that the false report of his rescue Wednesday may have been designed to lure Prime Minister Fidel Castro into an ambush.

First reports said that Cienfuegos had been found alive

by a fishing launch near Key Largo off Cuba's southern coast. A radio message urged that Castro fly immediately to the scene with a physician and medical aid.

Palace sources noted Castro's frequent impulsive actions and his deep concern over the disappearance of his revolutionary comrade-in-arms. They said it would not have been strange if he had

responded to the reported appeal.

The report that the bearded popular Cienfuegos had been rescued touched off wild rejoicing in Havana until the government issued an official denial. Observers said the demonstrations rivaled those which greeted Castro's triumphant entry into Havana Havana after the overthrow of dictator Fulgencio Batista.

Ike Appears to Have Put Ties In Proper Focus

Washington — (UPI) — Diplomatic officials said today President Eisenhower appeared to have put East-West relations back into proper focus by deflating Soviet ballyhoo about a "Camp David spirit."

They said it was high time to correct the impression in Russia propaganda broadcasts that unless the United States and its Allies came to terms with the Kremlin they were destroying the magic that came out of the Eisenhower-Khrushchev meeting at Camp David, Md.

The President, at his news conference Wednesday, obviously wanted to throw up some caution flags against expecting too much from the current slight easing of tension.

Asked about the "Camp David spirit," he said he didn't know what the Russians meant unless they referred to the fact that he and Khrushchev, when speaking alone, were able to talk "without being mutually abusive" because they stuck to general principles.

Eisenhower said that when it comes down to specific issues instead of generalities, the going gets tougher.

The President also made it clear that although he has been anxious for an early East-West summit meeting, he will not rush into it until the Western Allies are all ready.

Asked about the "momentum" generated for a summit conference, Eisenhower said this should not lead to "rushing into something that is not prepared."

That's why, he said, the Western Allies are meeting in Paris Dec. 19 to coordinate their positions on critical issues.

British Laborite Member Awarded Nobel Peace Prize

Oslo, Norway — (UPI) — Philip Noel-Baker, a British Labor party member of Parliament who has campaigned vigorously for world disarmament for more than 30 years, won the Nobel peace prize today.

The Norwegian Storting (Parliament) awarded the prize, which carries a cash award of \$42,602, to the 70-year-old elder statesman of the British Labor party without listing a specific reason for his selection.

Long Peace Devotee
But Noel-Baker, descended from a family with Quaker and pacifist traditions, had devoted the greater part of his life to working for international peace and cooperation.

In Chicago, Dr. Mayfield is attending a national meeting of school administrators. He will leave Chicago Saturday night.

He was instrumental in founding the League of Nations and was one of the earliest members of its secretariat. He also was a moving spirit in founding the United Nations.

Delegate To UN
He was the British delegate to the first and second U. N. General Assembly sessions, part of the long list of international peace making and disarmament conferences in which he took part.

Noel-Baker climaxed his 30-year struggle for disarmament last year with a book outlining a comprehensive "program for world disarmament." The book, called "The Arms Race," made sweeping proposals for gradual abandonment of all classes of weapons, nuclear, conventional, chemical and biological.

Klamath Falls — (UPI) — Two young men on a drive from Grants Pass to Klamath Falls were nearly asphyxiated today near Keno, state police reported.

Officers said John Cooger, 24, was treated at Klamath Valley hospital and released at 9:35 a.m. His companion, Kenneth Winters, 18, was transferred to Hillside hospital for further treatment. His condition was "good." Both are from Grants Pass.

Ambulance Called
A passing motorist called a local ambulance service and the driver, Felix Peace, said he administered oxygen during the 10-mile drive to Klamath Falls. The young men told him their car, its windows closed, became filled with exhaust fumes from a hole cut in the rear portion for a muffler modification.

Temperature in the area this morning was 20 degrees above zero.

C. Girard Davidson, Democratic national committeeman for Oregon, will speak at a meeting of the Jackson County Democratic Central committee at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 11, at the Labor temple, 24 1/2 South Grape st.

Frank Christian, Talent, chairman of the committee, said Davidson will discuss changes that the new allotment of national delegates will bring, and what it will mean to the people of the county.

Davidson came to Oregon in 1940 to become general counsel of the Bonneville Power administration. In 1946, he was appointed assistant secretary of the interior.

He returned to Oregon in 1950.

Supports Formation
He supported the formation of the Democratic Advisory committee, and helped the policy making of the Western States Democratic conference. Davidson also assisted in bringing the Democratic National convention to the west coast for the first time in about 40 years.

Davidson is chairman of the Natural Resources committee of the Western States Democratic conference, and is chairman of a committee which is working on new programs — policy items for the Democratic platform and campaign.

Counter-Protest Made Against Security Forces

Balboa, Canal Zone — (UPI) — Panama rejected Wednesday the U.S. protest against anti-American demonstrations by Panamanian nationalists and countered with a protest of its own against American authorities and security forces in the Canal Zone.

The Panamanian counter-protest was delivered by Foreign Minister Miguel J. Moreno Jr. to U.S. Ambassador Julian F. Harrington while new anti-American violence erupted in Panama City.

Bank Windows Smashed
Mobs smashed windows in the Chase Manhattan Bank building and the U.S.-owned power and light company before being dispersed by National Guardsmen.

Panamanian National Guardsmen also patrolled the borders of the Canal Zone where U.S. Army troops stood guard behind newly-erected barbed wire barricades to block any new invasion attempt by nationalistic elements from Panama.

Harrington had protested to the Panamanian government against the attack on the embassy and other American agency buildings, the tearing down of the embassy's flag during Tuesday's rioting.

Police Action Protested
In its reply, Panama protested against the "attitudes and deeds" of Canal Zone police and U.S. troops who were called out to help them disperse mobs which tried to enter the zone.

The note said the Panamanian government "trusts that U.S. civilian as well as military authorities in the Canal Zone will act in the future with more care and sense, in order to avoid repetition of the events that we all regret."

Road Conditions Given Blame for Eight Fatalities

Montana Reports 10 Below Zero

Wet snow turned the Twin Cities area of Minnesota into a sprawling traffic jam today and other storms gave motorists headaches across parts of the Midwest.

Eight deaths were blamed on road conditions in the West and Midwest, four in Wisconsin, and one each in Iowa, Illinois, Montana and Colorado in a 48-hour span.

A Minneapolis police dispatcher said "it's a mess," in the Twin Cities and fender-bender collisions were so numerous that police were forced to confine their on-the-spot handlings to those in which personal injuries were involved.

Some drivers reported they took 90 minutes or more to travel eight or 10 miles.

A few schools were closed in southern Minnesota because buses could not run, and strong winds whipped the state.

Iowa Schools Closed
Other schools were closed in northwest Iowa because roads were overlaid with snow which measured up to four inches deep at Sioux City reported a rash of minor motor accidents and trees and power lines in the area were damaged by high winds.

Driving was hazardous in parts of northern Wisconsin, and the Michigan Highway Department issued its first road condition report of the season, reporting generally slippery conditions on roads in a nine county area of western upper Michigan. Strong winds and blowing snow swept over most of Kansas, where a hard freeze was expected tonight.

Cold in Montana
Montana had snow 14 inches deep in spots, and night temperatures of 10 below zero.

While the North Central states reeled under the near-blizzard blast, house-wrecking winds whiped through Dixie, causing thousands of dollars in damage. Two tornadoes were reported in Texas.

\$311.84 Collected in UNICEF Campaign
