Success Chance For Proposed Loop Favorable

Boise, Idaho — (UPI) — An athletic alliance taking in the University of Idaho plus Montana and Dakota schools might be just the ticket for a successful sport combination, Idaho athletic director Robert Gibb indicated today.

But Gibb cautioned that while the much-discussed conference "has the best chance of success" of anything so far, fans had better not bank on an immediate tie-up.

Discussing a report that a conference might be in the making as proposed by Montana State college, another athletic orphan at the moment, Gibb said:

"This is the first concrete proposal we've had. It has the best chance of success of any so far."

The much-headlined meeting in Bozeman, Mont. last Sunday may serve as a starting point, declared Gibb. He revealed he didn't know the conference was going to be discussed until he read about it on a train headed for the meeting.

Individual Passing Led By Brown

Portland — (UPI) — Jack Brown of Southern Oregon regained the individual passing leadership among Oregon Collegiate conference football teams last week.

Brown hit 10 completions in 13 tries against Eastern Oregon to overtake Roy Johnson of Eastern Oregon. Brown has completed 44 of 84 passes for 511 yards. Johnson has 38 out of 81 for 528 yards.

Stan Glass of Oregon Tech, the league champion, leads in rushing with 600 yards in 133 carries, a 4.4 average. Gordy Carrigan of Southern Oregon has received 27 passes for 434 yards and four touchdowns.

Allen Leach of OTI leads in scoring with 6 touchdowns for 36 points to 30 points each for Glass and Al Barnes of SOC. Ron Jolma of Oregon college leads in punting with a 36.2 average.

Teamwise, Oregon Tech leads in total offense with a 244.4 per game average and in rushing with a 168.2 per game mark. Southern Oregon leads in passing with a 114.8 per game average.

Cus Faces New York Ring Group

New York — (UPI) — Fight manager Cus D'Amato finally was to face the New York state athletic commission today at a license revocation hearing.

Five misconduct charges are filed against Cus, manager of former heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson, in an attempt to revoke D'Amato's license as manager and second. The licenses already are suspended.

At today's hearing, he was to "show cause" why the licenses should not be revoked. The five charges resulted from testimony at the commission's previous general hearings into the promotion of the June 26 fight at Yankee Stadium in which Sweden's Ingemar Johansson won the world heavyweight championship from Patterson.

Cus is admitting one of the charges "on a technicality," according to his attorneys, Edwin S. Schweig and Julius November. But they stressed he is denying the other four.

He is admitting a technical violation of the rule requiring a manager to file a report of his fighter's purse with the commission within five days after the fight.

"He didn't file because he had received no purse within five days," Schweig said.

Chamberlain, a prime cause for Philadelphia's three straight wins in NBA play this season, kept the Warriors' slate clean Wednesday night when he poured in 41 points and recovered 40 rebounds to lead his mates to a 124-113 victory over the Syracuse Nationals.

Wilt's brilliant performance has him pacing the circuit's scoring leaders with a 40-point per game average. The hometown giant also is tops in rebound averages with a 34-a-game mark. If the Philadelphia flipper maintains the stride, it's good-bye NBA records.

In the only other action, the New York Knickerbockers evened their mark at 2-2 by defeating the Detroit Pistons, 107-101. The Knicks, led by Richie Guerin's 27 points built a 58-39 halftime lead and then weathered a Detroit surge, Bailey Howell was Detroit's high scorer with 15.
