A family friend, Mrs. Jacob Mogelev, said the youngster probably would be going back to Los Angeles within a day or two, apparently without fulfilling one goal of her cross-country trip.

Wanted to See Mamie
Evelyn wanted to see Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower to get help in boosting her acting career. But Mrs. Mogelev said there were no plans to seek an appointment for her at the White House.

The blonde youngster arrived here Wednesday. She had taken \$150 from three piggy banks, sneaked away from home while her parents were asleep and boarded the plane for the east coast. Evelyn, distressed because she had been unable to get choice roles lately after her spectacular TV success as "Eloise," admitted the reason for her escape was to obtain publicity.

Like Ordinary Girls
Mrs. Mogelev said she did not know yet whether Evelyn's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Emory J. Bernauer, would come here to take her back. "We may just put her on an airliner for home by herself," she said.

In the meantime, Mrs. Mogelev said, "we're going to try and keep everything quiet... Evelyn is going to do things just like ordinary little girls."

Not All TV Quiz Contestants Given Advance Answers

Washington -UPI- There's one TV quiz show contestant who not only didn't get any questions in advance, he didn't even get his category in advance.

He is Kenneth Hoffer, a young, mild-mannered former employee of the Hess Department Store in Allentown, Pa. Back in 1955 Hoffer had ambitions to appear on "The \$64,000 Question" as an expert on the Bible. Word that he had applied to be a contestant soon got to his boss, Max Hess.

Wanted Plug for Store
Hess also had ambitions to get in a plug for his store on the popular program. So, Hess told House investigators Wednesday night, the store arranged to pay an aide to the program producer \$10,000 to take Hoffer as a contestant.

Hoffer kept telling officials of the show that he didn't know much about anything except the Bible. Okay, they said, you can answer questions about baseball.

What is more, according to Hoffer, they wouldn't even guarantee that baseball would be on the category selection board the night he was on the show.

Hoffer's big night came on Aug. 9, 1955. Baseball was on the board. And quizmaster Hal March struck him out on the third, or \$256 question.

Hoffer remembered that Babe Ruth was "the Sultan of Swat" and that Joe DiMaggio was "the Yankee Clipper." But he forgot, or never knew, that Tommy Heinrich was "Old Reliable."

Hoffer said Hess had promised him he would win at least a new Cadillac worth \$4,000. But all he ever got was a consolation prize - a package of Revlon products.

Hoffer's sad story had an even sadder postscript. Sixteen months later - on Christmas eve night - Hess fired him.

Shady Cove Man Injured in Mishap

Dee Stockton, 39, Shady Cove, was reported in fair condition today at Rogue Valley hospital, where he is being treated for face and head lacerations received in a one-car accident Wednesday night.

State police reported that Stockton was injured about 8 p.m. yesterday when the car he was operating left Highway 62 between Shady Cove and Trail, and traveled 150 feet before shearing a telephone pole and rolling over a number of times. The automobile continued another 93 feet before stopping, police said.

Stockton was found lying beside the totally demolished car. Officers said the car apparently hit a rock on the highway and went out of control.

Hanging of Briton Touches Off Capitol Punishment Furor

London -UPI- Cop-killer Guenther Fritz Podola was hanged today while prisoners in Wandsworth prison cried "murder" and students in the street outside chanted "thou shalt not kill."

Podola, 30, a one-time member of the Hitler youth movement, died on the gallows for a murder he said he could not remember - the shooting of Scotland Yard Detective Sergeant Raymond Purdy, 42.

But in his last hours the sorrowful Podola, a part-time photographer and part-time thief, remembered the widow and bequeathed her his all - the \$22.85 he had in his pockets when he was arrested. He broke off a chess game with his guards to scribble the will.

No reporters or other outsiders were permitted to witness the hanging. A brief announcement by the Home Office issued at 11:05 a.m. said simply:

"The sentence of death for capital murder passed on Guenther Fritz Podola at the Central Criminal Court on 24th September, 1959, was executed at 9:45 a.m. today at Wandsworth prison."

Podola died for slaying Purdy while resisting arrest on suspicion of blackmail. It was the first hanging in England since May 9 when Ronald Marwood was executed for murdering another policeman, Raymond Sumner.

At the moment of the hanging, elderly Agnes Whitfield, dressed in black, walked across the road to the prison and placed a bunch of violets

Prisoners Demonstrate

Young prisoners in Wandsworth prison demonstrated throughout the night, banging their cell doors and chanting "leave Podola alone" or "Podola... Podola... Podola."

News of the demonstration came from George Phillips, 30-year-old Londoner who was released at 8:30 a.m. after serving a four-year sentence.

"It was murder in there last night," he said. "Most blocks were quiet but C-block was bedlam." C-block is where young offenders are kept.

Podola died in the middle of a major controversy over capital punishment which has been outlawed in Britain except for certain crimes. Cop killing is one of those.

Even the choice of executioner touched off a public furor. He was Harry B. Allen, a pub keeper who said he had known Purdy well and "met him on several occasions in London socially."

"I liked him very much," Allen said of the dead policeman. "He was too nice to die the way he did."

Chicago -UPI- It will take the steel industry and the United Steelworkers 10 years to make up for the losses in wages and profits suffered in the current strike. R. J. Marlette, president of the Industrial Management Society, said Wednesday. Marlette, of Chicago, told a convention of industrial engineers that strike losses to steelworks amounted to \$70 million a week and the probable loss in profits to the industry was \$4 to \$5 billion.
