Nun Now Uses Two Hands to Pray After Mishap With Mangle

New York—(UPI)—Sister Brian Brennan of Pittsburgh folded two hands in prayer today. It's a natural pose for a nun. But Sister Brian, 29, hasn't been able to strike it for nearly a year.

It was a feat for the spunky Franciscan. One of her hands is a metal hook. "I was afraid I was going to be a burden to everyone," the nun said during an interview at New York's Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

Gazes Almost Happily She gazed almost happily at the hook jutting from her sleeve as she told about her accident last February.

A mangle grabbed her fingers. In the split second it took to apply the emergency cut-off, the mangle reeled in her arm.

Sister Brian was alone in the laundry room at the St. Jo-

seph's home for aged women in Pittsburgh's South Side. She cried for help, prayed and pulled.

It took 15 minutes for someone to hear her. It took another 15 minutes for janitors, with crow bars, to free the mangle's metal grip.

Meanwhile, she was given the Roman Catholic Church's last rites.

Sister Brian didn't faint then—or in the police ambulance racing her to the hospital. But surgeons shook their heads in a "hope against hope" way when she was wheeled into the operating room.

They saved the top six inches of the arm. They removed skin from Sister Brian's legs and grafted it in place to cover the exposed shoulder and "residual arm" muscles.

Recovered in Seven Weeks In seven weeks, Sister Brian walked out of the hospital. She went to her order's main convent in Millvale, Pa., but didn't remain a convalescent in the infirmary for long. Soon she was trying to help other sick and aged there.

In May, July and October, Sister Brian was sent—for weeks at a time—to the Rehabilitation Institute at New York University, Bellevue Medical Center.

First, she learned to crack an egg with her one good hand. Because of the tender graft on the "residual arm," it was doubtful that she could learn to use an artificial one.

Several weeks ago, she tried. It was painful at first. But within three weeks, Sister Brian learned to dress herself "in 15 minutes," tie shoe laces, carry trays. She can do "almost everything" now.

Astronomers Seek Moon Pictures In More Detail

Washington—(Science Service)—U.S. astronomers are looking forward eagerly to future pictures of the moon's seen side, photographs that will show much more detail than the Russians obtained for the first time from their lunar rocket.

They expect the apparent monotony of the moon's far side will then disappear. The first photographs, admittedly a great technical accomplishment, were too crude to show many details of surface structure.

When clearer, sharper pictures are made, U.S. astronomers will be very surprised if they show that the moon's unseen side differs very much from its familiar face.

If it does indeed differ greatly from the pockmarked side we see, then the theory that the moon's surface features were caused by the impact of meteorites, comets or other heavenly debris will

have to be discarded. Dr. Chester B. Watts, recently retired from the U.S. Naval Observatory staff and a foremost lunar expert, said there is no known reason why one part of the moon should be hit more often than any other part.

A relatively smooth unseen side, if confirmed, would also upset another widely held theory concerning the formation of the moon's surface features—that they result from volcanic activity.

The volcanic theory recently received renewed attention when the Russian astronomer Dr. Nikolai A. Kozyrev of Pulkovo Observatory reported observing gas issuing from the center of a lunar crater.
