

## EAGLE POINT Class Play Decided

Eagle Point — The play, "Our Miss Brooks," has been chosen and the cast selected for the junior class play at Eagle Point High school.

Under the direction of Mrs. Ardice Tilly, the play will be presented Dec. 16.

## 137 Permits Issued By City in October

A total of 137 building permits for construction valued at \$293,126 was issued by the city building department during October, according to O. R. McNeel, director of building safety.

The amount was considerably less than the 146 permits totalling \$1,129,821 in October, 1958. Eighteen permits totalling \$244,500 were issued last month for construction of single family dwellings and 18 permits totalling \$23,975 were issued for remodel and repair of single family units.

Nine permits were for new private garages, eight for business remodeling and repair and 11 for fences.

The remainder called for erection of signs, other remodeling and utility permits.

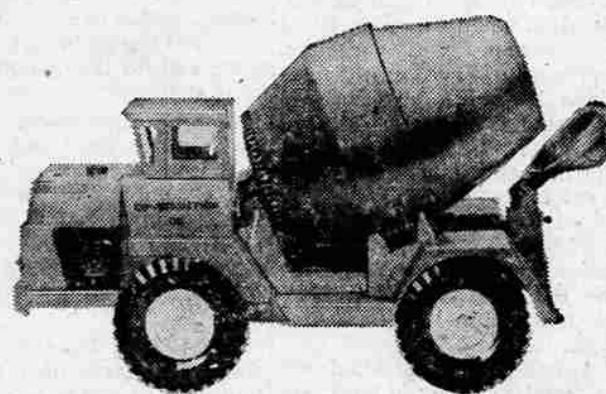

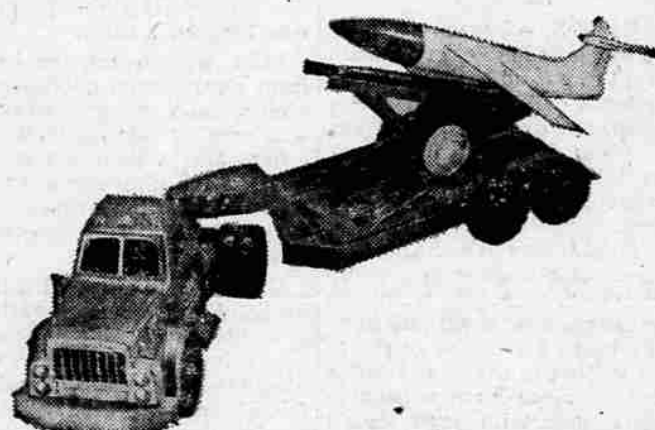

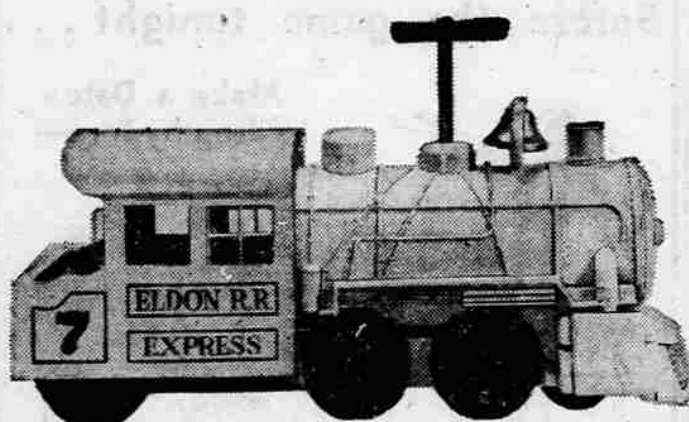
