## Arabs Protest Proposed Atomic Tests in Sahara

United Nations, N. Y. —UPI— Angry Arab nations fearful of radioactive fallout from a French atomic explosion in the Sahara Desert called on other nations Thursday to support them in their drive to ban the scheduled French tests.

Ahmed Taibi Benhima, secretary general of the Moroccan Foreign Ministry, warned Wednesday that deadly strontium 90 from such a test would threaten 200,000 Negroes, Arabs and Israelites in Africa and that untold harm might be caused to oases and watersheds on which many depend for a living.

### Attacks Expected

New attacks on French policy were expected today from the Arab nations now seeking to line up further support from other nations for an Afro-Asian resolution seeking a U.N. ban on the tests. Introduction of the resolution was postponed until the Arab nations win more backers.

French delegate Jules Moch told the General Assembly's main political committee Wednesday that his country would go ahead with the tests, probably next spring, unless the United States, Russia, and Britain "renounce their nuclear armament."

The three atomic powers are now negotiating a nuclear test ban at Geneva and pending the outcome of the talks are observing a year's ban on further tests.

"Let these powers agree to halt, under control, the production of fissionable materials for weapons purposes, to begin the reconversion of their stockpiles, to eliminate the vehicles from these explosives — in short, to renounce a monopoly in fact — and that very hour, France will adopt the same measures," Moch said.

### COURT SUMMONS CALLS

Brescia, Italy —UPI— An Italian court has ordered soprano Maria Callas to be in Italy for a hearing Nov. 14 on the separation suit filed against her by her husband Giovanni Battista Meneghini. Miss Callas is currently appearing in the United States.

## Anti-Inflation Laboratory Tests May Chart Future

New York —UPI— America currently has the benefit of laboratory tests of anti-inflation measures that should provide a background for future course of operations.



These laboratory tests are eminently successful in Germany and in Japan where abandonment of inflation has brought a spurt in industrial progress.

France, too, is reported to be doing very well with its anti-inflation operations. George Hagedorn, director of research for the National Association of Manufacturers, told the Joint Economic Committee of Congress of the progress these countries are making in a paper which set forth our major problems and

presented methods of solving them.

We must find new ways to finance business which for years now has built up a giant debt through the "painless" method of inflation.

### Cost Borne By Creditors

The cost of this financing, Hagedorn says, "has been borne in substantial part by creditors — bondholders, insurance policy holders, savings bank depositors, pension fund beneficiaries, etc."

"The reduction in the real value of their claims has been a major source of the capital for postwar business expansion."

He says we cannot expect creditors to cooperate indefinitely in a process which operates largely at their expense.

Rising interest rates, he notes, are a sign creditors are becoming reluctant to supply funds for business expansion.

He is convinced business faces the problem by finding new ways to finance neces-

sary expansion. Hagedorn cites the example of the three nations noted, all of them prospering by strict anti-inflation reforms.

He concludes that the inflation problem here is emerging into a few phases because the American people are thinking about the problem.

"Some national attitude toward inflation — it is too early to make predictions as to what the attitude will be — is going to crystallize out of this thought process," he says.

### Cites Three Major Problems

He centers his paper to the committee on three economic problems that will call for a solution in the 1960s — rising labor costs, capital needs, and foreign competition.

"A continuance of inflation would not solve these problems but would only make them worse," he holds.

"On the other hand, even if we succeed in avoiding inflation, these problems will still be with us."

"Both the long-term goal of continuous growth in productive capacity and the short-term goal of continuous high-level employment of that capacity, depend on finding a solution to these problems."

As the program for the 1960s he suggests a forthright renunciation of inflation and all its works; dealing directly with "monopolistic union power"; tax reforms to ease the tax burden on individuals and corporations; and economic tightening up to fight foreign competition.

## Portland Twins Total 17 Pounds

Portland —UPI— A Portland woman gave birth to twin boys Wednesday at St. Vincent hospital and doctors said it was possibly the heaviest birth ever recorded in Portland. The boys totaled nearly 17 pounds.

Mrs. Harold Hartmann, 25, was reported in fair condition, but she was close to death on three occasions Wednesday.

The birth was normal, doctors said, but shortly afterwards complications set in. To save her life, major surgery was performed that used all but two pints in the city of a rare type of blood.

The Red Cross began a dramatic search for B negative blood and finally obtained 13 pints, exhausting the supply of every hospital in the city.

Mrs. Hartman was given 11 pints with two left in reserve when she finally passed the crisis.

The two boys, Pat and Mike, were born, coincidentally, on the birthday of the father, a 32-year-old record clerk at Electric Steel foundry.

Pat weighed 8 pounds, 3 ounces, and Mike weighed 8 pounds 11 ounces.

The Hartmanns have two other children, Billy, 3, and Kathy, 2.

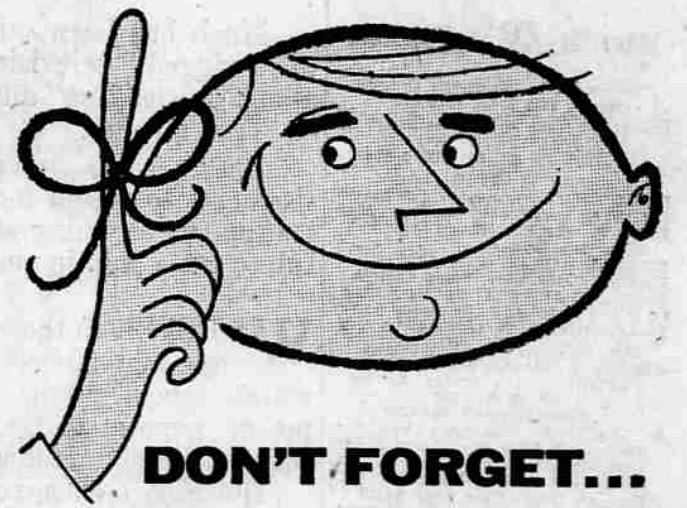

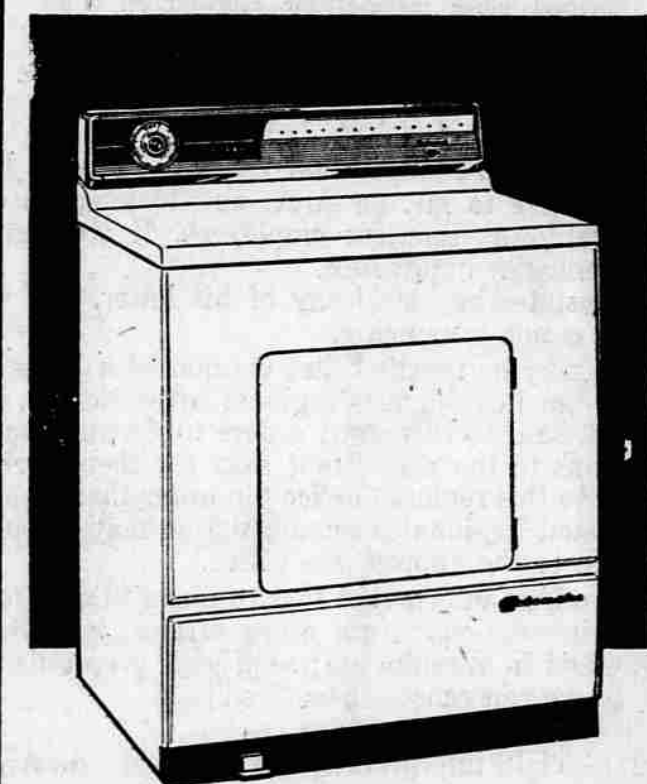
