## Area Hunters Are Warned About Deer Meat Contamination

Hunters in the Jackson county area may be bringing home contaminated deer meat without realizing it, according to the chief meat inspector for this area.

Dr. G. A. Gitzen, Medford veterinarian and chief meat inspector, said a number of deer carcasses brought to local butcher shops have been infested with tape worms. When the infested carcasses were noticed early in the deer season hanging in cold storage plants with inspected and government graded meat, it caused considerable concern to meat inspectors, Dr. Gitzen said.

**New Regulations** This resulted in issuing new regulations by Dr. William L. Searles, supervisor, state meat inspector, for all retail markets, locker plants, processing plants and slaughterhouses. Recommendation for the new regulations was made by Ward Spatz, Medford.

The chief meat inspector suggested hunters be careful to wrap each carcass in a game bag. At night the bag should be opened to allow cold air in, and closed to keep cold air in during the day, he said. Other animals carry various forms of tape-worms, but the deer problem is the chief one right now, the veterinarian said. Ten or 12 known carcasses have been thrown away because of worm infestations this season, he added. Three infested deer have been taken from the Evans creek area and some have been taken in the Chemult and Green Springs area.

**Four Tracts of Timber Sold by BLM in Counties** Four of the seven tracts offered for sale by the Medford district of the bureau of land management Nov. 5 were sold for \$150,829.45.

The tracts sold consisted of one green sale having a volume of 4,226,000 board feet which sold for \$135,573.70 and three salvage sales with a volume of 429,000 board feet which sold for \$15,255.75. The three tracts for which no bids were received were all salvage sales with a total volume of 168,000 board feet.

The green sale, which is located south of Lincoln in Jackson county, was purchased by Kogap Manufacturing company, Medford, after a sale in which three bidders submitted 99 oral bids to determine the high bidder. The high bid included prices of \$51 per thousand board feet for Douglas fir and \$25 per thousand for white fir, which were the two major species in the sale.

**Salvage Sales** The three salvage sales were all located in northern Josephine county. Caveman Lumber company of Wolf Creek purchased 83,000 board feet for \$34 per thousand, Patterson Lumber company, Inc., of Glendale bought 45,000 board feet without any competition for \$23.80 per thousand and Superior Lumber company of Glendale was the high bidder for 301,000 board feet with a bid of \$37.75 per thousand. Douglas fir was the only species involved in all three of the sales.

One of the no-bid sales is located in the Prospect area in Jackson county, one is near King mountain in Josephine county and the third is near Glendale in Douglas county. These tracts will remain available for bids for a 90-day period in accordance with the regulations.

The next timber sale by the Medford district of the bureau will be held on Dec. 10 at which time five tracts containing 13,061,000 board feet will be offered for sale. Two of these tracts are in Jackson county, two in Josephine county and one in Douglas county. The sale may also include four or five additional small salvage sales in Josephine and Douglas counties according to John Carnegie, district sales officer.

**Portland Man Sent To State Hospital** Portland - (UP) - Berthel William Miles, 49, Portland, has been committed to Eastern Oregon State hospital in Pendleton by Circuit Judge William L. Dickson.

Miles allegedly tried to run over two Multnomah county sheriff's deputies and rammed a squad car Wednesday night. He had booked on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

Of the total, 13 were in Medford, 3 in Ashland and 2 in Phoenix.

Other cases of communicable diseases reported included amebic dysentery, Shady Cove 1; gonorrhoea, Medford 1; mononucleosis, Medford 1; strep throat, Phoenix 2; aseptic meningitis, Medford 1; mumps, Ashland 1; chicken pox, Trail 8, Ashland 8; and German measles, Medford 4.
