

U.S. Team Wins Ryder Cup in Golf

Palm Desert, Calif. (UPI) — Capt. Sam Snead's United States team walloped Britain 8½ to 3½ Saturday to regain the Ryder cup — the trophy emblematic of world supremacy in professional golf.

With Snead, PGA champion Bob Rosburg and Masters champion Art Wall crushing their foes with a relentless birdie attack, the British never came close.

It was the 10th American victory in the 13th biennial matches for the cup which the two countries first began battling for in 1927.

The U.S. picked up five points yesterday to go with the 3½ gained in Friday's Scotch foursome competition. The British scored 1½ points Friday.

Playing against Dave Thomas, Snead built up a 5-up lead going into the 31st hole. Then, after Thomas had putted to the lip of the cup for a cinch four, Snead chipped into the cup from 25 feet away and off the green for a birdie as a large segment of the crowd of 12,500 cheered. It was a 6-5 triumph for the American and typical of the day's play.

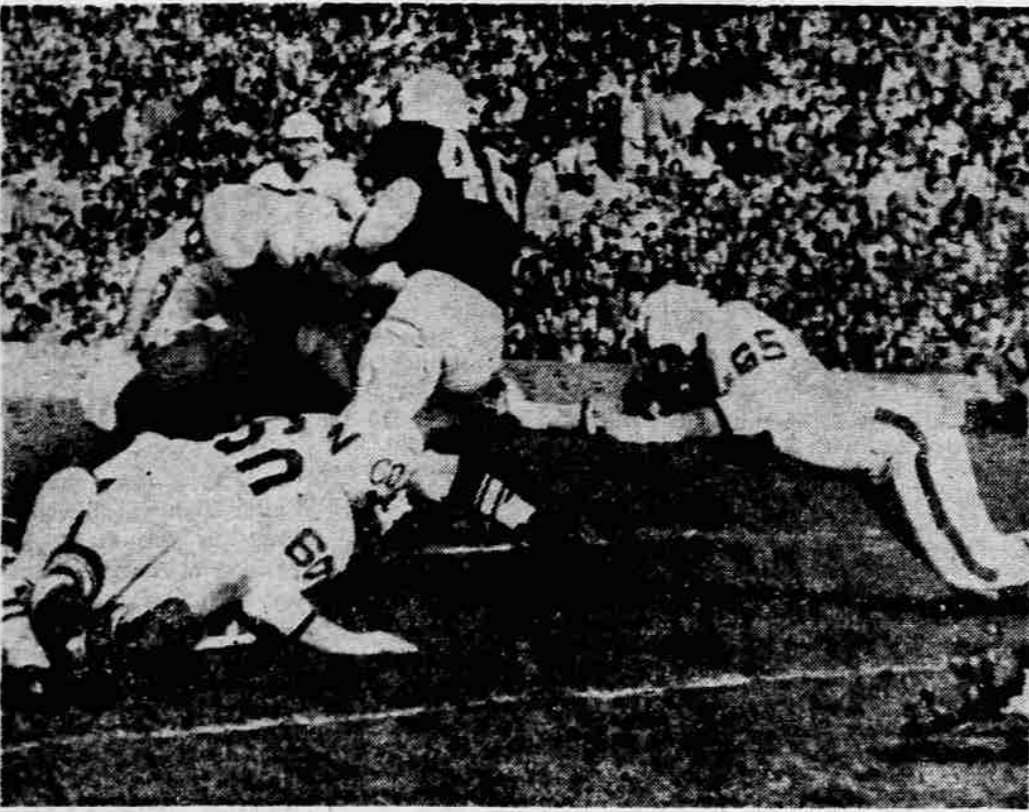
Rosburg was another perfectionist as he routed the long-hitting Harry Weetman by the same score, 6-5. Wall was one under par for the 30 holes he needed to crush Irish Christy O'Connor, 7-6.

In other matches, Doug Ford dissipated an early 4-up lead and hung on to gain a draw with Norman Drew of the British team — each scoring a half point; Mike Souchak dropped a 25-foot putt for a birdie on the 34th hole to trim Kenneth Boussfield, 3-2; and Dow Finsterwald edged British champion Dai Rees 1-up in another hard-fought battle.

Tennessee, Wisconsin Upset Opponents in Major Contests

Tennessee ended nationally top-ranked Louisiana State's 19-game winning streak, 14-13, and Wisconsin upset Northwestern, 24-19, Saturday in the biggest surprises of a day that left four major perfect-record teams in the land.

With the top two teams beaten, Syracuse made a strong bid for the No. 1 ranking with a 20-18 triumph over Penn State. The win, Syracuse's seventh straight, practically clinched a Cotton or Orange Bowl bid.

One of the season's most exciting programs also saw fourth-ranked Texas, 10th-ranked Washington, 11th-ranked Georgia Tech win by a touchdown or less. Fifth-ranked Southern California walloped West Virginia, 36-0, sixth-ranked Mississippi clobbered Chattanooga, 58-0, and ninth-ranked Auburn ripped Mississippi State, 31-0, in the only easy victories scored by top-ranked powers.

Tied With Illinois
Tennessee, tied with Illinois for 16th ranking, sprang one of the season's biggest upsets at Knoxville, Tenn., by scoring two quick touchdowns in the third period and then throwing back Billy Cannon's bid for a two-point conversion after L.S.U.'s fourth-period touchdown.

Wisconsin recovered four fumbles and intercepted three passes to snap second-ranked Northwestern's six-game winning streak. A 14-yard pass to Al Schoonover put Wisconsin ahead, 17-13, at the half and a three-yard plunge by Eddie Hart, following a third-period fumble, produced the winning margin for Wisconsin.

Roger Kochman's 100-yard kickoff return and a later touchdown in the fourth period brought Penn State to within two points of Syracuse but the Nittany Lions failed on their two-point conversion try. Syracuse scored on marches of 43, 56 and 41 yards for its seventh straight win. Recover Fumble
Texas went 39 yards after recovering a fourth-period fumble, Clair Branch banging over from the two, for its eighth straight win. Ronnie Stanley passed and directed Baylor to second and third period touchdowns that had the Bears in front, 12-7, going into the last quarter.

Marvin Tibbitts' two second-half touchdowns enabled George Tech to down Notre Dame, 14-10.

Southern California scored 20 points in the second half after West Virginia battled on even terms for almost the entire first half. Johnny Vaught unleashed Ole Miss' backs for 380 yards gained against hapless Chattanooga and Bobby Hunt scored on runs of 42 and 51 yards, averaging 13.4 yards a carry, in Auburn's fifth win in six games.

Other Games
Lowndes Shingler's 30-yard touchdown pass with 27 seconds left in the first half enabled Clemson to beat Duke, 6-0; Dean Look threw two

touchdown passes as Michigan State ruined Purdue's Rose Bowl hopes, 15-0; Michigan turned two of four interceptions into touchdowns for a 20-15 decision over Illinois, Ohio State and Indiana battled to a scoreless deadlock and Phil Snowden's passing and running led Missouri to a 13-0 win over the Air Force in other games involving the nation's top 20.

Colorado moved solidly into the Orange Bowl race with a 27-14 victory over Big Eight rival Kansas; Southern Methodist downed Texas A&M, 14-11, on the passing and running of Tiry Wilmon; Joe Caldwell's passing set up both touchdowns in Army's 14-0 win over Villanova, Pennsylvania took over the Ivy league lead with a 28-12 defeat of Yale; Oklahoma routed Kansas State, 36-0, and Pittsburgh blasted Boston College, 22-14, in other leading games.

Autorama At Armory To Conclude
Presentation of awards this evening will climax the second and final day of the Southern Oregon Autorama at the Medford Armory.

The show, featuring an array of customized cars, will be open from noon to 8 p.m. Awards will be announced just before closing time.

The autorama is not a "hot rod" show but an exhibit of autos which have been personalized by their owners. Antique, as well as custom and rod vehicles, are on display.

Major awards are sweepstakes trophies in rod and custom competition and for the best car shown by an exhibitor who resides within a 75 mile radius of Medford. Some 14 autos are in competition in this "local" sweepstakes.

Popular
Mike Batnich is staging his second autorama here. It is patterned after similar - type shows which are becoming increasingly popular on the west coast.

Cars are entered in a variety of classes with awards being made in all. Judging will be on the basis of originality, construction and beauty.

BASKETBALL

The only National Basketball association action Friday night saw the Detroit Pistons defeat the Minneapolis Lakers, 118-113, in double overtime. The victory enabled Detroit to tie St. Louis for the Western division lead and marked the fifth straight setback for the Lakers.

Elgin Baylor of the Lakers was high man with 33 points. Gene Shue tallied 22 to lead Detroit's scoring.

Oregon Edges California; Huskies Eye Rose Bowl

Portland (UPI)—Five-foot, three-inch Cleveland Jones made a sensational catch of a desperation 35-yard pass for the winning touchdown Saturday as Oregon came from behind to edge fighting California 20-18.

Jones wrestled the ball out of the hands of six-foot Wayne Crow as he was falling into the end zone.

His catch came with just five minutes left in a game that California went all-out to win for controversially-injured halfback Steve Bates.

California came from behind a 14-0 deficit to go into the lead 18-14 in the third period behind the running of reserve fullback Walt Arnold.

Arnold, who scored California's first touchdown with a two-yard plunge in the second quarter, raced 49 yards on the Golden Bears' first scrimmage play of the second half for another score. This came after Arnold had recovered a fumble.

Recovers Fumble
Moments later, California guard Norm McLean recovered a fumble by Dave Grosz on the Oregon 39. The Bears moved to the go-ahead touchdown in 11 plays with Billy Patton going over from a foot out.

Then the Bears put up a great goal-line stand, halting Oregon on its one-foot line.

But this was not to be California's day. Oregon took California's first punt of the day on its 48. The Webfoots, now 7-1 for the season, moved to the Bear 41. Willie West ran

to the California's 35, but California held on two plays.

Then Grosz faded back and cut loose with his long pass that Jones turned into the winning score.

Pass Interceptions
Oregon turned two pass interceptions into its first two touchdowns. West picked off one on the California 49 and three plays later he scored on an 18-yard pass from Grosz.

Alden Kimbrough intercepted another pass moments later on the Oregon 49 and in four plays the Webfoots were over again. Don Laudenslager made the touchdown from five yards out.

Spectacular Play
Ironically, Schloredt also figured in the game's most spectacular play, but he was on the wrong end of the action. Oregon State center Bruce Hake picked off a Schloredt pass on the 12-yard line and raced 88 yards for a touchdown. It was the first pass Schloredt has had intercepted this year out of 65 attempts.

Washington had driven from its own 10 to the OSC

15 before Hake hit the glory trail.

The Huskies were pounding in the Beaver door again right after the Oregon State score, but this drive bogged down on the nine when Kermit Jorgensen's fumble was recovered by Jerry Doman.

Unable to Drive
Neither team was able to get a drive going until late in the first half, with Oregon State being plagued by a rash of fumbles—seven of them—and Washington unable to move against a stubborn OSC line.

Washington finally managed to score when end John Meyers recovered Ron Miller's fumble on the Beaver 35. From there the Huskies marched over the goal line in seven plays. Schloredt sparked the drive, completing passes for 18 and 12 yards to Meyers and Lee Folking and then bucking over himself from the one yard line.

DeJohn, 28, recovered the prestige he lost two years ago and also earned a tentative date with fourth-ranking heavyweight contender Eddie Machen Friday night when a surprise opening assault brought him a technical knockout over eighth-ranked Charlie Powell at 47 seconds of the first round.

Barely seated before DeJohn floored Powell three times to produce the automatic ending of the nationally-televised 10-rounder under New York state rule. Harry Markson of the Madison Square Garden Boxing club said he would try to line up DeJohn with Machen in New York on December 18.
