Grants Pass — The Josephine County United Fund last week reached its quota of \$28,000 to be the first united fund campaign in Oregon to reach its goal this year, according to David Talbot, chairman of the drive.

NAACP Man Urges Stand by Churches

Portland (UPI) — The Rev. Edward J. Odom Jr., field secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said here Friday that churches must take positive stands on issues like equality in housing, public accommodations and job opportunity. He said theologians have a moral obligation to do so.

"The church," he said, "has a moral obligation to take these stands. Church people should become more involved in political action. This is in line with what the church stands for."

The Rev. Mr. Odom praised progressiveness in Oregon in the matter of race relations and said that Oregon civil rights laws "ought to be encouraged and copied in other states." Church groups, he added, should help in this work.

Test Due Bomb Threat Suspect

Portland (UPI) — A circuit judge here has ordered a psychiatric examination for a 41-year-old man accused of threatening to blow up the Meier & Frank company Portland store if he didn't receive \$10,000.

Raymond William Haupt, 41, Portland, was arrested by police Oct. 29 when he went to pick up a package supposedly containing the payoff.

Attorney Brice L. Smith, who appeared for Haupt, requested the examination.

Phoenix — An annual counseling service for ninth grade students at Phoenix High school is being initiated this year, according to Supt. E. R. James.

Rockefeller's Itinerary Told

Albany, N.Y. — (UPI) — Gov. Nelson D. Rockefeller's tentative Oregon itinerary next week was announced Saturday. It starts with his arrival next Friday night at the Eugene, Ore., airport.

Saturday a press conference is set for 8:55 a.m. on the University of Oregon campus. There will be radio and TV interviews at 9:30 a.m. and at 10 a.m. an address to Oregon students followed by a question and answer period.

After a luncheon hosted by Dr. O. Meredith Wilson, Oregon president, Rockefeller flies to Corvallis for the Oregon State-Stanford football game. The New York governor is due in Salem and a Marion hotel reception at 4:45 p.m. He addresses Willamette University at 8 p.m., and then meets with Gov. Mark Hatfield and other top state officials.

Rockefeller is due to leave Salem airport at 7:15 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 14, for Seattle, and the remainder of his West Coast tour.

Signatures Sought For Eagles Petition

Crater Lake Aerie, Fraternal Order of Eagles, last week adopted a resolution urging legislation to eliminate age discrimination in employment.
