Committees Help Handicapped Get Steady Positions

To you, Mr. Unemployed Handicapped: Read this article. Stop, think, and evaluate yourself. Do you need a job? Are you ready to work? Have you honestly tried to secure employment? Are you willing to do your part in securing and holding steady employment?

All of these questions must be answered by you. For more than a decade, a program for the employment of the physically handicapped has been in existence. This program has been national in scope under the President's committee for the employment of the physically handicapped.

To facilitate acceptance of this group, there has been Governor's committees established in each state; county committees formed in each of the many counties in each state and local committees formed in many large cities and municipalities.

Purpose of Committees
The big purpose of the committees is to sell the abilities of the handicapped, to educate employers on the principle that the handicapped is not job handicapped if properly placed, to sell the public, as a whole, on the idea of hiring the handicapped.

During the past 10 years, industry and business have changed from the negative to the positive on this program. Many millions of men and women possessing severe handicapped have been placed.

These millions have proved to their employers that the hiring of their abilities was good business. These millions, through work, have set the present stage for the employment of the physically handicapped, and you now have the advantage with a sympathetic industrial and commercial society.

Makes Up Mind
Now, having thought it over, I am sure you realize that you need a job and that you have made up your mind to do everything within your power to secure and hold employment.

Up to this point, you have had to stand alone. No one could help you in these two most important decisions. But from here on in, you need no longer have to stand alone. You may contact the local state employment service. They are equipped to advise and assist you.

After they give you the necessary assistance in referring you for interviews in line with your qualifications and abilities, or in the event you are one who needs vocational training, they can advise you on and assist you in applying for vocational rehabilitation with the state vocational rehabilitation service. The state employment office desires to serve you.

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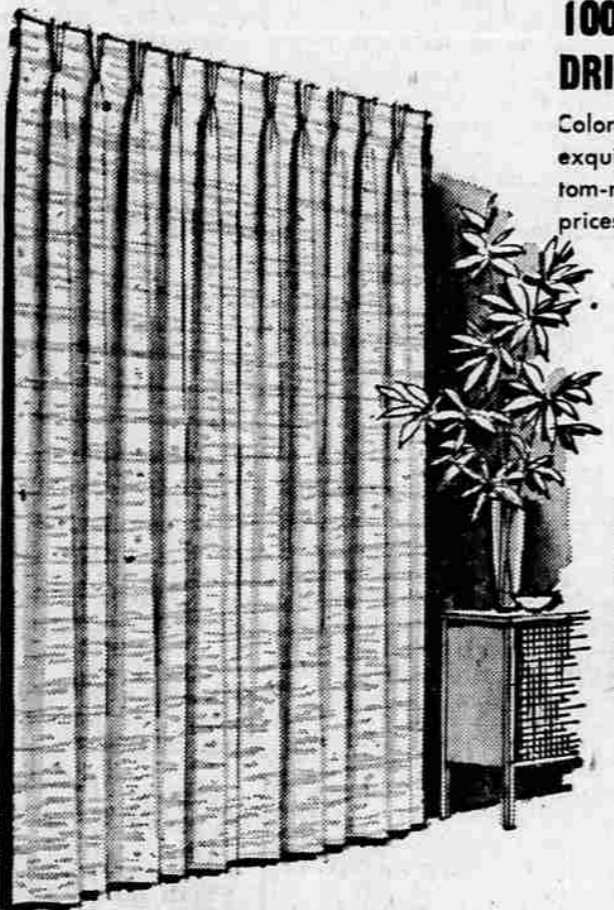
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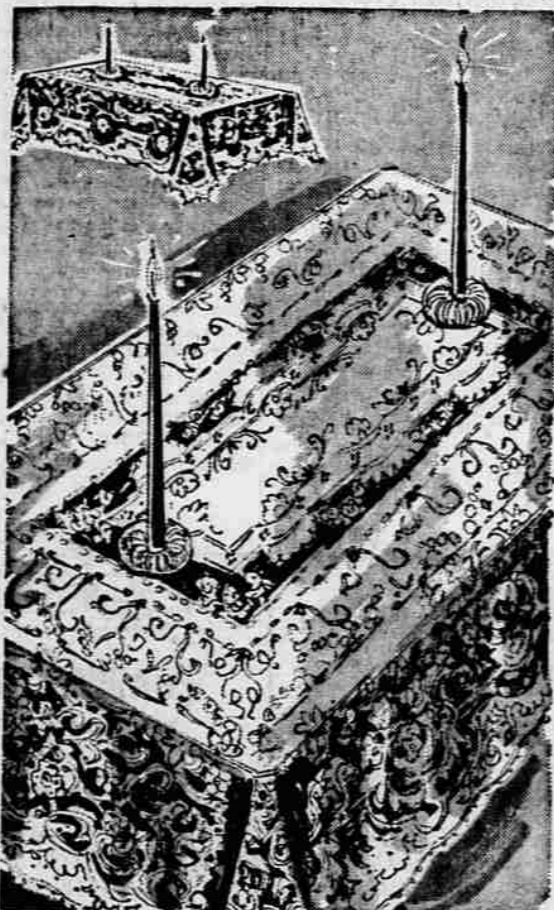
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
