Three Meals Not Enough For Some Adolescents

Corvallis — Three meals a day are enough for most folks, but not for adolescents.

During their "growing up" years—the time of fastest growth except in infancy—young people have higher nutritional needs than at any other time in their lives.

During these years too, careful planning and guidance are necessary to see that these requirements are understood and met and that good eating habits are developed, two Oregon State College home economists emphasize.

In a special chapter for the new Yearbook on "Foods," published by the U. S. department of agriculture, OSC's Dr. Clara Storvick and Dr. Margaret L. Fincke point up the importance of proper diets for adolescents and young adults.

Dr. Storvick is in charge of home economics research at Oregon State college and Dr. Fincke is head of the department of foods and nutrition.

Planning Needed
Meals need to be carefully planned to provide nutritional needs and the between and after meal eating done by young people also needs attention, Dr. Storvick and Dr. Fincke explain.

Snacks, for example, can follow the needs and preferences of the individual boy or girl. A cheese sandwich may satisfy the boy after school and a glass of milk enough for the girl. Fruit between meals rarely spoils the

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
