Portland—The National Council of the Metropolitan Opera company has selected Eugene Fuerst, musical director of the Theatre Arts Opera association of Portland, to be director of the Oregon Section of the Pacific north-west regional auditions.

Purpose of the regional and state auditions is to help discover new American talent for the Metropolitan and to make it possible for young singers in all parts of the country to be heard and aided in their careers. The expansion of these auditions to include the entire nation has been a signal achievement of the National Council.

Winners of the Oregon auditions will be eligible to participate in the Regional auditions at Seattle. A representative of the Metropolitan Opera will hear the finalists and will select one candidate to be sent to New York for further auditioning, with expenses paid by the National Council.

The Oregon auditions have been set for Sunday, November 29, at 2 p.m., at Lincoln High school auditorium, Portland. The Oregon candidates will be heard by a panel of qualified judges. The past Regional winners have achieved considerable success in the music world after receiving their award.

The 1959 Regional winner, baritone, Roald Reitan, Tacoma, Washington, co-winner of the 1959 National Auditions, received a one-year Metropolitan Opera Company contract. He has been assigned 24 roles in Metropolitan Opera company productions for

the 1959-60 season.

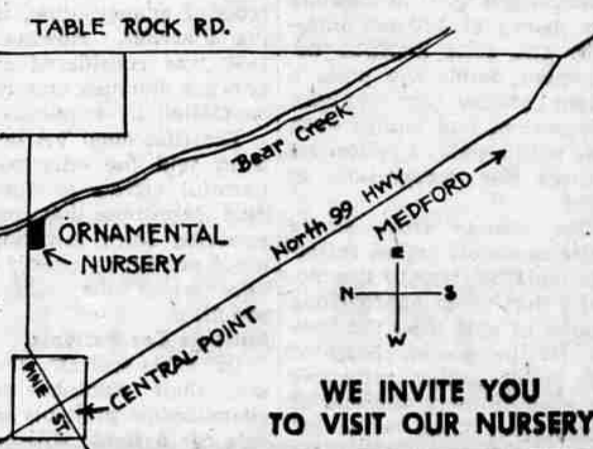
