

Open House Slated At VA Domiciliary

To most people the Veterans administration at Camp White is a large setting of buildings, landscaped and possessing a modern baseball field.

They know that veterans are housed and treated there, but for the most part the buildings seem like some military camp of World War II, one of mystery and associated with loneliness and unhappiness, pain and suffering.

"Our Domiciliary is far more than that," Manager Henry C. Herzog said today, and he offered to prove it to southern Oregon and northern California residents on Nov. 10, when the Domiciliary holds "open house."

Veterans Day Event

Open house at the Veterans administration installation, like its 175 counterparts elsewhere in the United States, is a Veterans Day thought of Sumner G. Whittier, administrator of veterans affairs, who has ordered that every VA

hospital, domiciliary, and regional office in this country to be open to the public Nov. 10, the day before the national holiday.

"The administrator believes that veterans, their friends, and their families should have the opportunity of seeing how the Veterans administration treats the disabled men, providing for more than just medical treatment," Herzog explained.

Organized tours will be at 10 a.m., 2 p.m., and 3 p.m., with volunteer guides to escort visitors through much of the Domiciliary.

Included in Tour

The tours will include a visit to the admission office where the legal determinations are made on admitting members. In effect, visitors will follow the normal steps taken by a typical veteran being admitted by visiting medical clinic where the preliminary physical examinations are conducted.

Also included will be a visit to an actual ward, or section as it is called in a Domiciliary, theater, the various sections of physical medicine and rehabilitation, arts and crafts area, dietetic service, canteen, medical building, library, chapel, and then to the Employees' club where refreshments will be served.

Domiciliary officers believe the open house will offer an opportunity for veterans, their families and friends to better understand the mission and the manner in which the administration is attempting to carry it out.

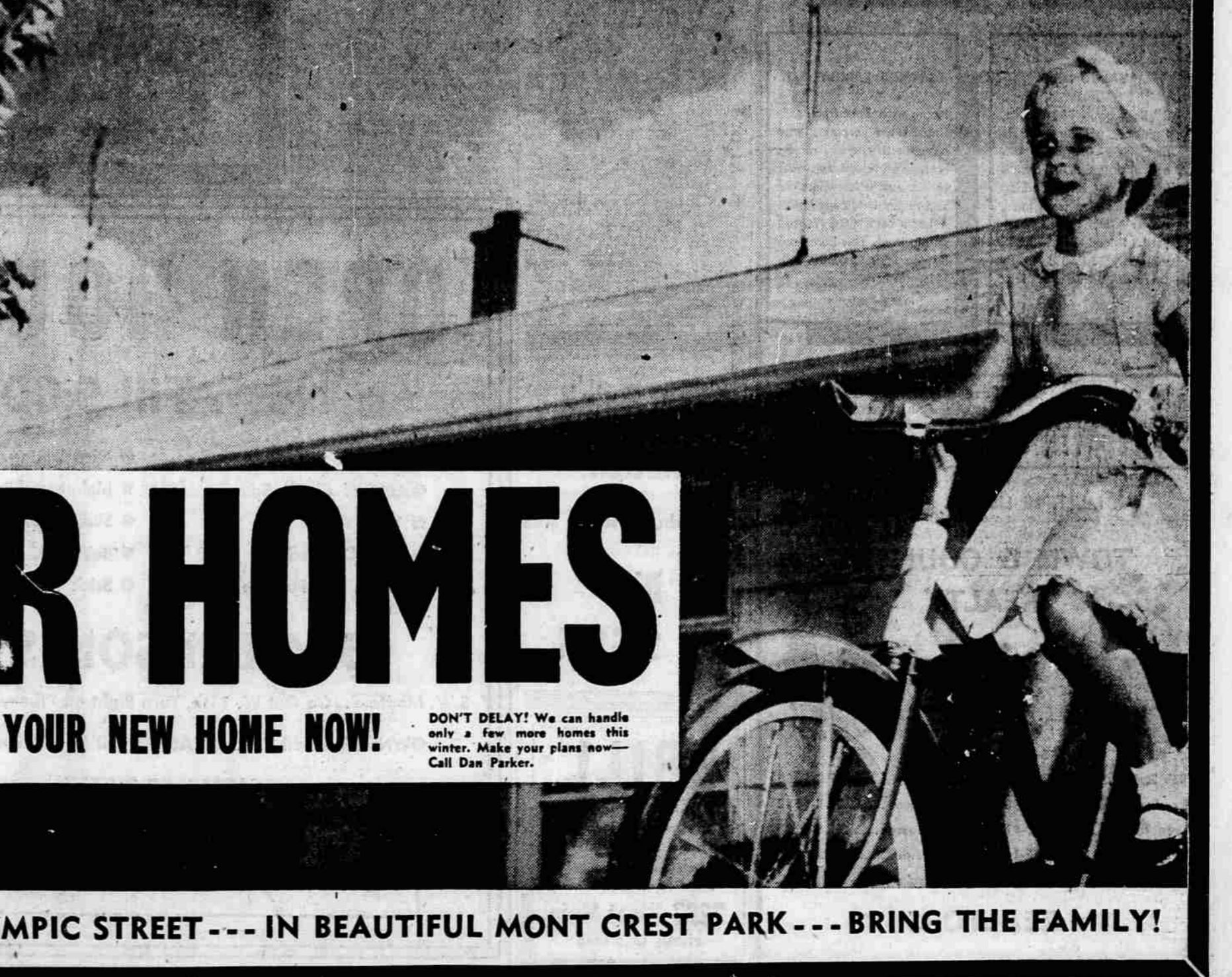
