Ray Smith, Medford, finished 16th and Nathan Parrish and Don Ryan, Crater, 19th and 21st, in the Oregon high school A-1 cross country meet at Wilson high in Portland on Saturday.

South Salem was paced to team victory in the meet by Clayton Steinke who was individual first in 8:51.4 for the 1.8 miles. Steinke edged Fred Dellinger, Springfield, by a foot. Jerry Hemstreet, Jefferson of Portland, took third.

Point to point for South Salem was 131 while Wilson was second with 146 and Grant of Portland third with 153. Springfield was fourth with 192.

Medford placed 21st with 527. No Crater placing was listed. Two of its seven runners, Bob Morris and Bob Garrison, were knocked down and spiked and did not finish the race. For Medford Bill Dahlstrom was 78th, Hi Martin 82nd, Dave Jordan 157th and Steve Drew, 194th. Drew finished limping with an ailing foot.

In all 37 A-1 schools entered and 247 runners completed the race.

Pleasant Hill was A-2 winner with 49 points and McKenzie was next with 55. Dave Reese, McKenzie, was individual first in 9:33.5.

Baton Rouge, La. — (UPI) — It's hard to figure out how your team could lose sometimes. After having graded the game movies of our game against the University of Tennessee, I see little to find fault with in our team's effort.

Our offense actually stamped the Vols for 337 yards while holding their efforts to 113 yards. Our team efficiency was very fine — just as good as it has been in the past. Our squad was very eager to play the game and in a good mental frame of mind.

Then who did we lose?

Praise Tennessee

Well, first and foremost, the credit must go to a fine coaching job by Bowden Wyatt and his excellent staff and the personality of the Tennessee squad.

Led by a young man named Cartwright, the Vols made the most of every opportunity and hung in the battle all the way. They were really opportunists. They deserve a great deal of credit.

On our side of the ledger, our defensive coaches did a remarkable job preparing our squad to meet a single wing attack and allowing only 93 yards rushing! The offense we generated against Tennessee was the best we have had this year. But we still lost 13 to 14.

Costly Mistakes

We made two of those "big mistakes" and they caught up with us — an interception and a fumble deep in our territory. Inasmuch as I think that our team played a fine game otherwise and that our staff did a great job in preparation, I must accept the responsibility for the loss.

Syracuse, Texas, USC New Big 3 in College Football

Louisiana State's defeat created a free-for-all for the national college football championship today but at least three conference titles and two major bowl berths may be decided this week.

The upsets which climaxed six of the nation's top 20 teams Saturday made Syracuse, Texas and Southern California the new "big three" of the college gridiron and tightened up both the Big 10 and Southeastern conference races.

Northwestern, Penn State, Purdue and the Air Force academy were among powers struck by "upset lightning" in addition to top-ranked LSU.

Predicts Bowl Pairings

The football may take some more funny bounces before the season ends but the Jan. 1-2 bowl pairings probably will look something like this: Wisconsin vs. Washington in the Rose, Louisiana State vs. Arkansas in the Sugar, Colorado vs. Mississippi or Clemson in the Orange, Syracuse vs. Texas in the Cotton, and Mississippi or Clemson vs. Penn State or Tennessee in the Gator.

The most attractive — and the most likely — of these pairings should bring Syracuse and Texas together in the Cotton Bowl in a "game of the year." Syracuse's 20-18 victory over Penn State put the Orangemen on the high road to a perfect season and the Eastern championship while Texas, 13-12 victory over Baylor Saturday, could clinch the host's berth next Saturday. A Texas win over Texas Christian and an Arkansas loss to Southern Methodist would turn the trick.

Close Battle

Wisconsin and Washington also could clinch Rose Bowl berths next Saturday although it's more likely the fight will go down to the final week end. Wisconsin tied Northwestern for the Big 10 lead by beating the Wildcats, 24-19, Saturday while Washington (8-1) still holds the inside track over Oregon (4-1) after both had close calls over the week end. Unbeaten and untied Southern Cal is ineligible for bowl competition.

Both Wisconsin and Northwestern play Illinois but the Badgers' other opponent is

OSC Loses, But Coach Real Proud

Corvallis — (UPI) — "Proud" although defeated Tommy Prothro today began preparing his "new" Oregon State footballers for Saturday's expected all-out aerial assault by Stanford.

"I'm real proud of our team," said Prothro after the Beaver's 13-6 loss to Washington in Seattle last Saturday. "They finally turned loose and went after 'em."

Prothro's "new" Beavers displayed an unbalanced line with their traditional single-wing backfield. Tommy even split end Aaron Thomas several times to spread the defense and give the Beaver backs more power on end sweeps.

Oregon State worked on the new offense behind locked gates all last week and Washington coach Jim Owens admitted the Huskies weren't prepared for it. As a result the Beavers outshined the powerful Washington club, 112 yards to 96, in the defensive battle.

10 OSC Fumbles

"We took them in every way a team can take another," Prothro reminded "except for the ball handling."

Oregon State fumbled ten times during the afternoon as bad passes from center and poor ball handling by backs stymied the Oregon State ground attack.

But in the end, it was a one-eyed Oregonian who wrote finis to Oregon State's chances before a crowd of some 48,000 fans.

Husky quarterback Bob Schloredt, a native of Gresham, passed for one Washington touchdown and ran for the other.

Andy's, Guard Get Franchises In Hoop League

Andy's Jewelers and Medford National Guard were granted franchises in the Southern Oregon independent basketball league at a meeting in Grants Pass Sunday.

USC Carries West Grid Prestige

West coast football prestige, if you want to call it that, is resting heavily on the strong shoulders of the USC Trojans.

Despite the dirty play charges leveled against Troy's rock-tough Mike McKeever, undefeated Southern Cal is clearly the pride of the Pacific coast.

The Trojans will have a significant opportunity to build on their reputation Saturday when they clash with the rugged Baylor Bears in the Coliseum.

That the Bears will be a severe test for the Trojans is best evidenced by their narrow, 13-12, loss to fourth ranked Texas last Saturday.

USC blasted West Virginia, 36 to 0, Saturday, but to be remembered are the mediocre performances by the Trojans against lowly Stanford and California. An upset by Baylor might not be surprising.

Huskies Eye Rose Bowl

Another possible upset looms when Washington lays its solid Rose Bowl chances on the line against the California Bears. Coach Pete Elliott's crew has dropped seven in a row but they are still not paties. They have a habit of losing by close scores and the odds are getting better that they just might win one.

The Huskies didn't look invincible when they squeaked by Oregon State, 13-6, last week. But if the Bears are to win they will have to stop a Huskie quarterback, Bob Schloredt, the big reason why Washington has a 7-1 mark.

California could have dropped Oregon last week, but Duck quarterback Dave Grosz lofted a desperation heave to Cleveland Jones with only five minutes to play for the winning touchdown, 20-18.

Washington State, which still has a chance for the Rose Bowl and has won four straight, plays a rematch with Oregon in a crucial test that could well produce another upset. Should the Cougars manage to knock over the Ducks and then Washington, they still might be practicing football come Christmas. Oregon scored a one-touchdown victory over the Cougars earlier in the season.

UCLA, which wiped the smile off Jack Curtice's usually beaming face with its 55-13 lacing of Stanford Saturday, battles North Carolina in the Coliseum Friday night. In other games, Stanford journeys to Oregon State; San Jose State takes on potent Iowa State in Iowa and winless Idaho will meet College of Pacific in Stockton.

Wiese Speaker At Session of Walton Chapter

Ralph Wiese, of the Rogue River National forest, will speak at the Isaak Walton league meeting at 8 o'clock at the Medford Gun club.

Willamette Sure of Tie At Least

Willamette's defending champion Beacats Saturday assured themselves of at least a part of the Northwest conference football crown with a solid 34-14 win over last-place Whitman.

College of Idaho, with a chance to tie the Beacats next week against the same Whitman squad, stepped out of the conference to wallop Oregon Tech, 49-13.

Lewis and Clark ran up 33 points before Pacific university could score and then coasted to a 33-20 win over the Badgers in Portland.

The Seattle Ramblers, a semi-pro club of former college gridgers, hammered out a rugged 14-7 win over Linfield at McMinnville.

Willamette, with its win over Whitman, closed out its conference schedule with a 3-1 record. The tie came at the hands of Linfield and the Beacats lost to College of Idaho.

Stan Solomon led the assault with a 98-yard kickoff return.

At Caldwell, Charlie Alvaro passed for three touchdowns and added seven conversions as he led College of Idaho in its romp over Oregon Tech.

Linfield lost star passer Bill Parrish in the opening quarter when he suffered a shoulder separation in the loss to the Ramblers.

WSC Next For Oregon Footballers

Eugene — (UPI) — Oregon, still in the Rose Bowl race thanks to Cleveland Jones' great catch, today faced the prospect of meeting bowl-contending Washington State without star center Bob Peterson.

Peterson was carried off the field early in the third period in last Saturday's 20-18 win over California. Both his ankle and knee were hurt although no bones were broken.

Trainer Bob Officer said "only time will tell" if he can play. Jones, who is just slightly over five-foot-three inches, grabbed Dave Grosz's fourth-down, 35-yard pass from the clutches of six-foot Wayne Crow for the winning touchdown against California.

For a time it appeared the Golden Bears would get their first victory in seven starts as they overpowered Oregon with a strong ground game.

"Too Many Mistakes"

"We gave them the ball too many times," said Coach Len Casanova. Oregon fumbles led directly to the final two California touchdowns. Cas also said the Webfoots "made too many mistakes for this late in the season."

He cited Cal fullback Walt Arnold's 49-yard touchdown run early in the second half. Arnold was in the clear just beyond the line of scrimmage. This came after Arnold had recovered one of two costly Webfoot fumbles. Minutes later Cal's Norm McLean picked up a fumble by Dave Grosz on the Oregon 39 and in 11 more plays the Bears had scored again.

This made it 18-14. Arnold had scored the Bear's first TD with a two-yard plunge in the second period.

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Haney Signed As Sportscaster

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Former Milwaukee Manager Fred Haney, who used to broadcast the games of the old Hollywood Stars in the Pacific Coast league, will succeed Leo Durocher as sportscaster on NBC's weekly baseball broadcasts next season.

He signed a three-year contract with NBC with options. Haney let it be known last summer he was seriously considering quitting the Milwaukee job because he wanted to devote more time to his family in California.

He said he was particularly delighted with his new post because "it will allow me more time at home with my family. And I still will be closely associated with baseball."

Haney resigned from the Milwaukee Braves during the World Series, after the Braves tied the Dodgers for the pennant but lost the flag in the playoff.

4 Undefeated Teams Remain

New York — (UPI) — College football's perfect record "club" today listed only four major teams among its 26 survivors.

Louisiana State, Northwestern and Penn State were bounced off the list during the week end, leaving Syracuse, Texas, Southern California and North Texas State as the only major unbeaten schools.

Huron (S.D.) College boasted the most impressive record, outscoring its opponents 418-14 while winning its first nine games. San Francisco State also had a 9-0 record.

Texas and North Texas State each had 8-0 marks while Syracuse and Southern California had 7-0 records.

SERVICE BOWL CHAMPS

Colorado Springs, Colo. — (UPI) — Hamilton Air Force Base, Calif., spotted Fort Carson, Colo., a first period touchdown and then rallied to gain a 16-7 victory Sunday in the 6th annual Pikes Peak Service Bowl game.

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
