

Coaxial Cable to Be Cut During Training Season

One of Pacific Telephone's big coaxial long distance cables is being chopped in two today, Wednesday and Thursday in Medford.

However, the cable breaks aren't interrupting anyone's telephone calls or TV entertainment.

It is part of a training program for the company's transmissionmen, cable splicers and supervisors, Jack Cregar, local manager, said.

The company garage at 124 South Fir st. is the scene of the cable restoration training. There are some 30 plant men from Medford and vicinity who are learning the "do's" and "don'ts" of putting the big cables back together after a break.

Classroom Discussion
The one-day sessions include a half-day classroom discussion on restoration procedures followed by a practice with coaxial cable to re-establish voice paths.

The cables used in the training program contain 288 wires as well as eight coaxial tubes. They can carry about 1,800 simultaneous conversations.

"This kind of training pays off in cable emergencies when every minute counts," Cregar points out. "Everyone learns to work from the same script."

Another 'Double Phony' Chalked Up Against Communist Propagandists

Washington—(UPI)—American officials have chalked up another "double phony" against Communist propagandists as the celebration of the Red revolution passed with no hammer-and-compass flags raised over Allied West Berlin.

"Double phony" is the term applied by American diplomat officials to the Communist tactic of whipping up a false crisis and then claiming credit for ending it when circumstances make it impossible or unwise for them to carry through.

The East German Communists, seconded by the Russians, are posing as peace makers for not going through

with an earlier threat to hoist their new banner over the Communist-operated elevated railway stations in the Allied zone.

Other Crises Cited
Previous examples of such tactics cited by U.S. officials included Russian actions in the Suez crisis of 1956, the imaginary Turkish plan to invade Syria in 1957, and the Middle East and Quemoy scares of 1958.

They consider the year-long crisis over the future of Berlin as probably the biggest "double phony" of them all.

Just a year ago Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev sent jitters through the world by demanding that the Allied

and Western powers pull out of West Berlin or face the possibility of another Communist blockade.

The Allies refused and Khrushchev finally agreed at his meeting with President Eisenhower to drop the ultimatum by declaring that there was no "time limit" on negotiations over the status of the city.

Second Half
Soviet propagandists now claim that Khrushchev reversed stemmed from his great passion for peace. This, to American officials, is the second half of the "double phony."

Diplomatic authorities noted that the Soviet tactic of pressure and release has been

applied on many occasions in an obvious effort to keep the Western world off balance.

They list what they consider four major examples prior to the Berlin crisis:

—Suez: The Russians reacted to the British, French and Israeli invasion of Egypt in late 1956 with threats that Britain might be hit with missiles. When the Western powers withdrew, in response to United Nations demands, the Russians claimed credit for halting the invasion.

—Turkey-Syria: In 1957 the Soviet Union unleashed a propaganda campaign charging that Turkey was preparing to invade Syria, now a part of the United Arab Republic. Moscow radio whipped up the affair with repeated reports of troop movements and threatened Turkey with dire consequences if it carried out its threatened invasion plans.

When nothing came of the matter, the Russians executed the second part of the "double phony" by claiming that their warnings had prevented the invasion.

War Fears Raised
—Middle East: When U. S. troops were rushed to Lebanon in July, 1958, to help preserve the established government there, Moscow claimed the American government actually was planning to invade neighboring Iraq and depose the new revolutionary regime there. The Soviet propagandists against raised war fears.

When U. S. forces pulled out of Lebanon, the Russians claimed "imperialistic" American designs had been thwarted by the Kremlin's exposure and warning.

—Quemoy: The Russians claimed credit for having pacified the Quemoy outbreak in Sept., 1958, by warning the United States that the Soviet Union would firmly back the Chinese Communists if they got into hostilities with the American fleet. Actually, the artillery exchanges over the off-shore islands between the Chinese Reds and the Nationalists died down when the United States made it clear it was ready to fight if the Communists tried to take Quemoy.

The East German Communists advertised plans to raise their new hammer-and-compass flag over the elevated railway stations they still operate in Berlin to commemorate the 42nd anniversary of Russia's Bolshevik revolution.

Field Reversed
This raised the possibility of disturbances with ramifications to the East-West cold war. But the allies and West Germans made preparations to handle the situation. The East German Communists then reversed their field and claimed the whole thing was whipped up by the Westerners to try to start trouble.

They announced that in the interests of peace they would not exercise what they claimed was their legitimate right to raise the flags.

Officials here said the Communists "peaceful" motives probably were due to the fact that 19,000 West Berlin police and 11,000 British, French and U. S. troops were standing by to see that the flags stayed down. But this did not prevent the Communists from completing another "double phony" and propagandizing their peace-loving attitude.

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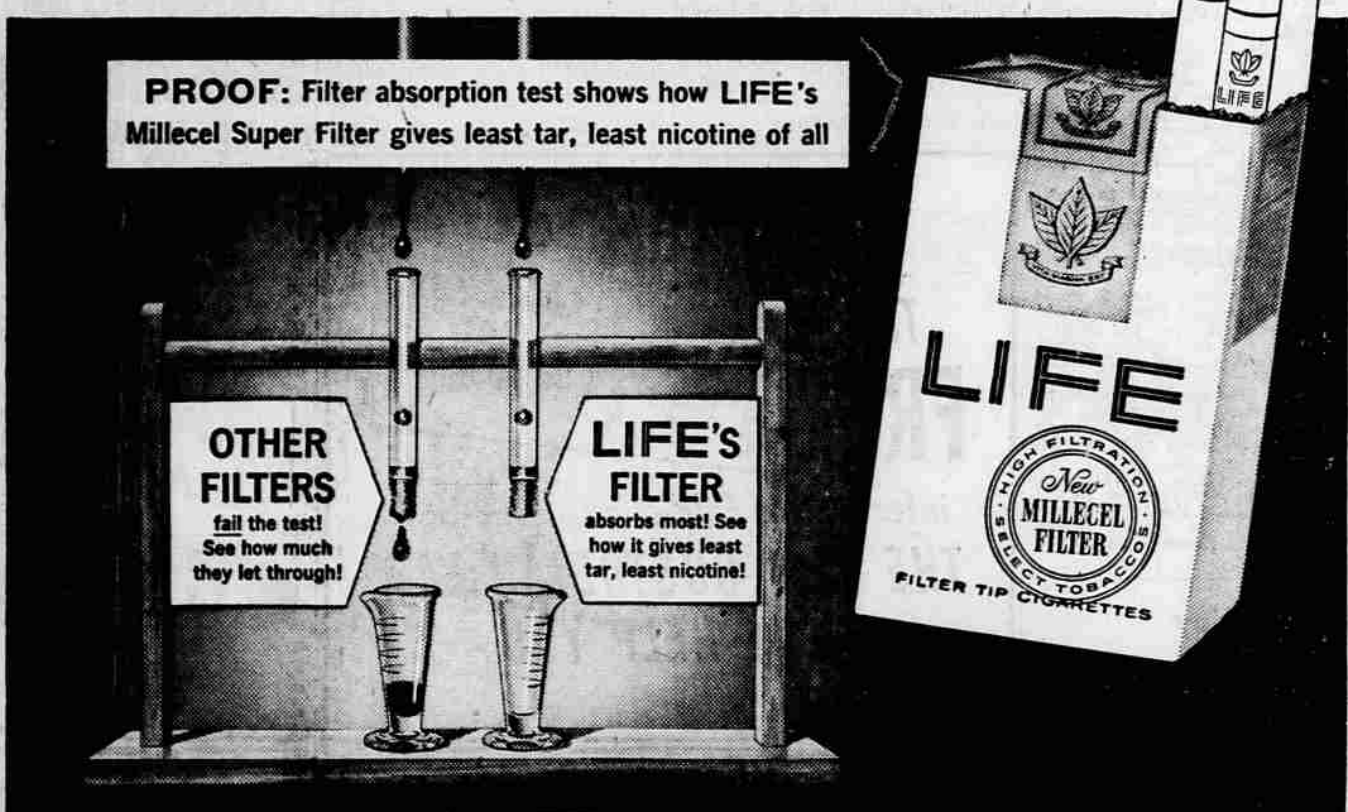
