Mrs. Acker showed slides of the ruins of Germany and other scenes of the country.

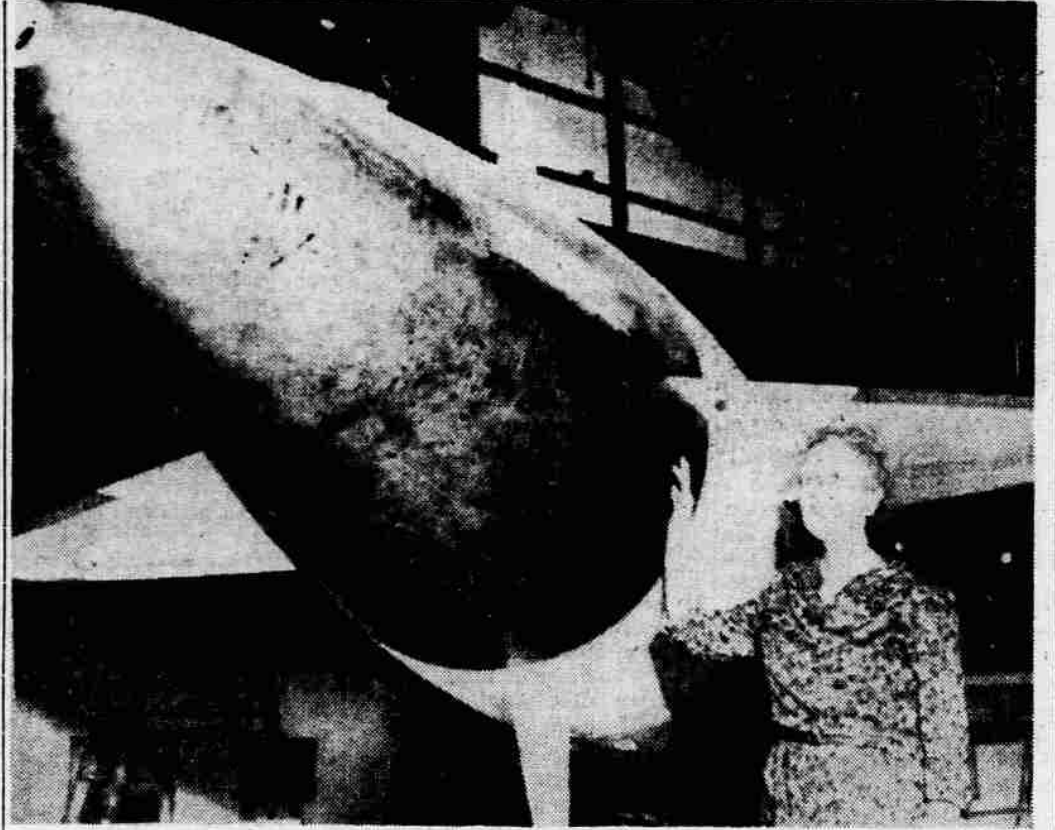

Pioneer Aviatrix Says Women Would Make Ideal Astronaut

(Pioneer aviatrix Ruth Nichols, who first sat at the controls of a plane in 1919, recently underwent some of the same tests being applied to the Mercury Astronauts who will be America's first men in space. This is the first of two dispatches in which Miss Nichols tells why women are "naturals" for space flight and what some of the key tests are like.)

Dayton, O.—(UPI)—I've encountered just about all the challenges in earth flight including soaring in a jet at more than 1,000 miles an hour at an altitude of more than 51,000 feet. Now I'm ready to take off for outer space.

Why?
For several reasons.
—I feel that Nature equipped us women emotionally, physically and psychologically for space flight.

—As the earliest licensed woman pilot still actively flying, I feel my nearly 40 years of experience and the emergencies I already have met equip me ideally for another pioneer flight.

—And finally, I have just become the first woman pilot to examine and experience some of the tests which the seven Astronauts have undergone in preparation for travel in the first manned space vehicle. The look and sampling were given me at Wright Air Development Center, at the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base.

Let me go into that first reason in more detail.
When I say that Nature equipped women physically, emotionally and psychologically, I refer to the way we inherently face a crisis. There is no event which so calls on the resources of a woman so much as childbirth. The process of reproduction is dangerous whether in the jungle or in the maternity ward. Yet we have the inherent ability to face it, often without thinking about it.

Women Submissive
Most of us women are passive. Submissive. Patient by birthright. We could stand up under any long and arduous space journey. It is estimated, for instance, that a round-trip voyage to Mars would take about two and one-half years.

It is that it is significant that every live animal sent up so far has been female—the Russian dog, our two monkeys. Wherever man goes, women eventually will go also. For if we find life on other planets—and in my mind, there is no doubt of its existence—we will have to have colonization.

It isn't chivalry which is keeping our researchers from thinking of women pioneering space flight. It is a matter of knowledge. Research has been studying man's characteristics and abilities during and since World War II, but have not even begun to look at woman's special problems in space travel. Of course some of the things we already know will be applicable to either sex. But it is my opinion we should start immediately a "crash" program assembling facts regarding the makeup of women. And I'm not a feminist.

I am convinced that in my lifetime space flights will be

almost a routine — if there were one available right now, I'd sign on as a crew member or passenger. But the coming generations will not think of space with awe... no more than our generation gives a thought to hopping a car for the station or hopping a jet to Europe.

But why, I have heard people ask, is space travel so important to those of us living comfortably on this solid earth of ours?

In a generalized way, I offered some answers in my recently published autobiography, "Wings for Life." But, speaking in the light of today's scientific discoveries, I would answer that, first of all, growth through all eternity cannot be stopped. If populations themselves don't expand, as they inevitably will, the human mind must be allowed to explore any new frontier which is open.

Furthermore, the relatively small size of our planet with respect to the Universe will become more decisively apparent to the extent that we will recognize still further the oneness of life and the need to integrate with all nations and levels of people, rather than to battle by violence.

New sources of minerals, of energy, and of weather information will of course also be thereby obtained. Finally will come a new realization pertaining to the eternity of life.

It is stated that the first two lessons of the course will be given free, and further information may be obtained by calling the Workmans at KEystone 5-1150.

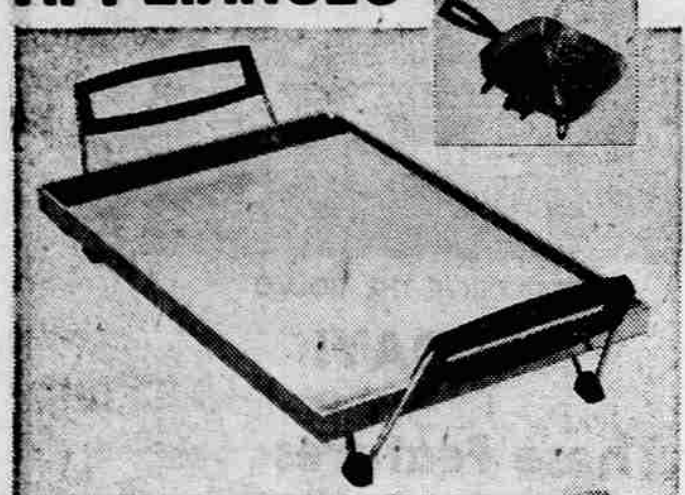
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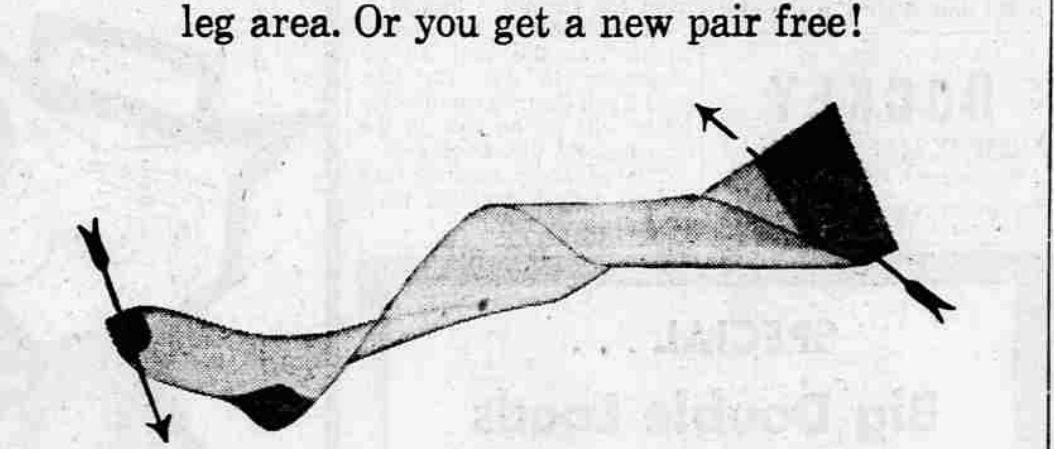
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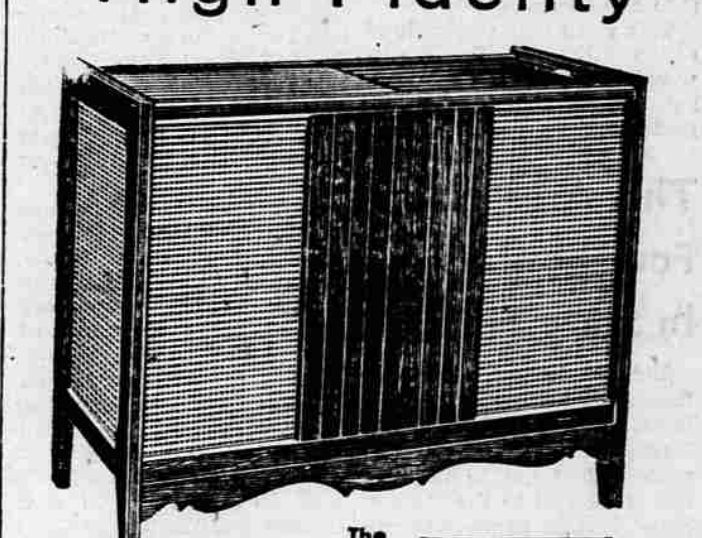
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
