OSC Student Seen As Instigator of Dynamite 'Prank'

Albany, Ore.—(UPI)—District Attorney Courtney Johns Tuesday said that one 18-year-old Oregon State College student apparently instigated a "prank" that involved setting off a full case of dynamite near Corvallis last week end. The explosion rocked nearby houses and broke two windows of a downtown Corvallis hotel.

Johns said that nine juveniles were believed involved, but that eight of them apparently just went along to see what would happen. He said that five of them were Oregon State students, and that three of the five were girls.

Johns said that charges would be pressed against the 18-year-old boy after he conferred with complainants. One woman, who suffered from a heart ailment said she was "upset" by the blast; a girl said she was knocked from a chair, and a third person declared that a pottery was broken in a home.

Jones said the charges would involve destruction of property by explosives. The charge, if followed by a conviction, could carry a maximum penalty of 20 years imprisonment, he said.

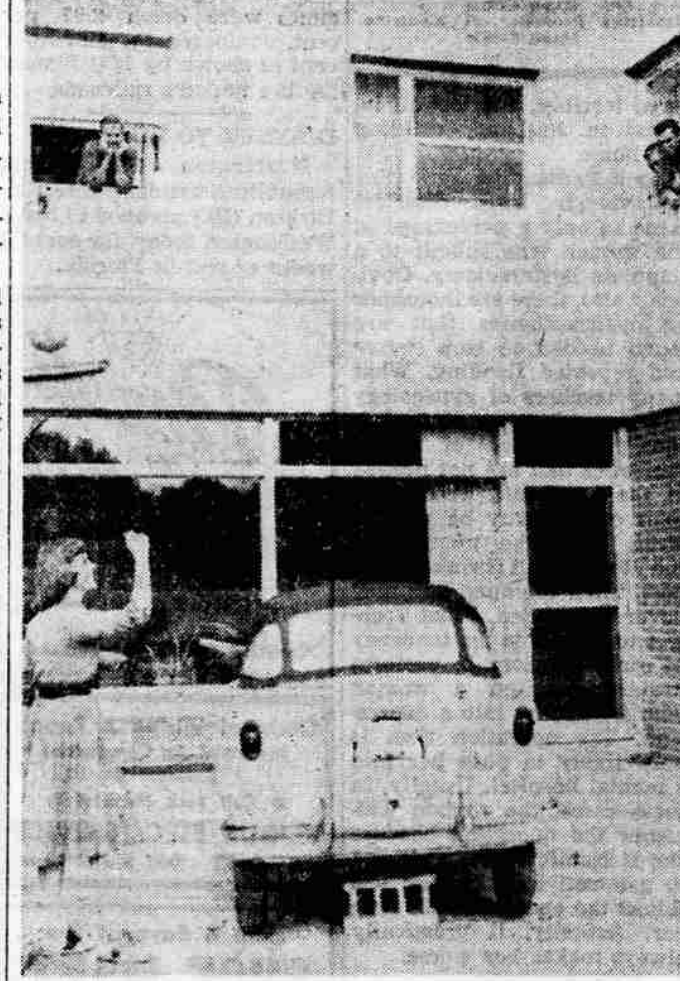
