

Tornadoes Drilling On Holiday to Gird For Quarter-Finale

Veterans Day isn't a holiday for the Medford High school football team. The No. 1 rated Black Tornado, girding for a state A-1 quarter-finals collision with Marshfield at Coos Bay on Friday night, was to drill this afternoon with a chalk talk and movies of the Grants Pass conflict also on the agenda. This is a week of polishing up and keeping in shape for

the Medford gridders who are undefeated and have won their nine games with sizable scores. Scrimmage contact is being avoided and coach Fred Spiegelberg has indicated the District 6 titlists in good physical shape. Fullback Dan Sieg, who has been troubled by a sore back, missed the Monday workout but was on hand yesterday. Spiegelberg reported the Tornadoes in a good frame of mind for the tussle. "They're taking the game as seriously as any game I have seen them take. They feel they can win but they feel that they have got to put out," the head mentor reported.

"It's going to be rough," Spiegelberg said of the game with the Pirates. Caught by Surprise

Medford battered the Buccaneers 39 to 21 in an early season contest. They caught them by surprise and by condition. This time Marshfield is expected to be much better prepared for the Tornado. The surprise last time was turning the single wing attack against the Coos Bay club after having displayed T formation offense against Beaverton the week before.

Marshfield is expected to show an improved offense. The Pirates turned to separate offensive and defensive platoons after its battle with the Tornado but may go back to using a number of players both ways in the Friday hassle, according to Coos Bay report. Coach Pete Susick was either keeping quiet or just undecided on his defensive alignment.

The Pirates will be battling for a decision over the Tornado after three straight setbacks at the hands of Medford, two last year in addition to the one this fall. Only loss suffered by Marshfield in the current campaign was the one to Medford and the Pirates are ranked No. 3 in state prep polls.

Heavier Pirates
Marshfield, District 5 champ, will put a club on the field which is heavier than Medford's. It's backfield threats are Dick Shanley, Hank Windell, Karl Coke, Dave Wood, Rich Hughes and Don Austin running and Bob Burke passing. In the line the Pirates have such stalwarts as Tom Erdmann, Gene Jenkins and Marv Harris.

Amount of action Jenkins may see is uncertain. He was victim of a clipping injury against North Bend and John Layton may be in the spot much of the time. Jenkins could see quite a bit of offensive service, however. Spiegelberg had some fine words this week for his defensive players, such as Calvin Dean, John James, Terry Earl and Reggie Breeze, who have been doing a fine job all year. He remarked that against Grants Pass, Lowell Dean did about the best defensive end job he has seen. If not making tackles, he was contributing to others making them.

Plans are well underway for the running of the sixth annual Thanksgiving Cross Country Motorcycle Turkey Run.

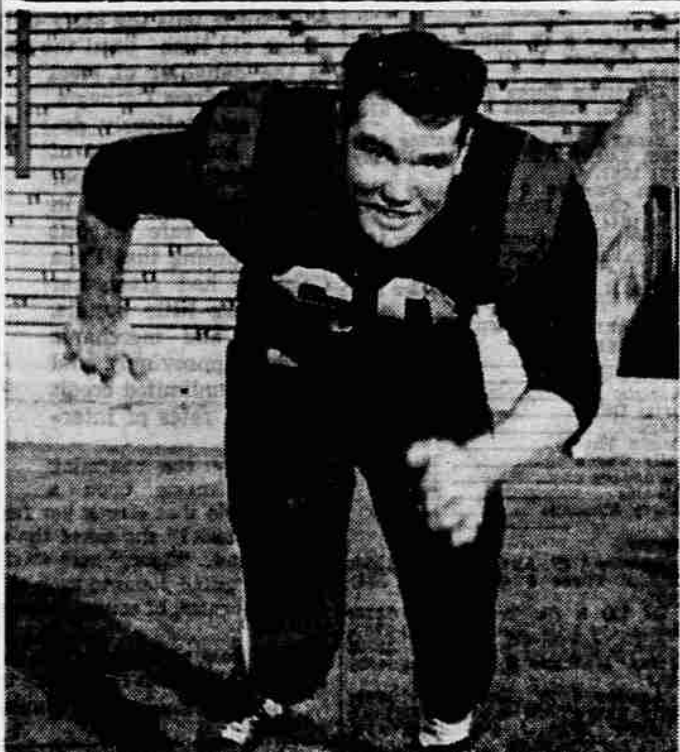
White's Cycle Center started the event and sponsors it each year.

Bears Picked To Defeat Forty Niners at Chicago

The Chicago Bears are favored to tighten up the National Football league's Western division race Sunday by defeating the San Francisco Forty-Niners at Chicago's Wrigley field.

San Francisco (6-1) is a two-point underdog although it leads the Western division by two games while the Bears (3-4) are tied for third with the Green Bay Packers. The second-place Baltimore Colts (4-3) are 9½ point favorites to whip the Packers at Milwaukee.

The New York Giants (6-1) are 2½ point choices to protect their one-game Eastern lead over the Cleveland Browns (5-2) by downing the Pittsburgh Steelers (2-4-1) at Yankee Stadium. The Browns are 7½ point favorites for their game with the Redskins (3-4) at Washington.

Eagles Over Cardinals
The Eagles (4-3) are four-point choices to down the Chicago Cardinals (2-5) at Philadelphia. In Sunday's other game, the Los Angeles Rams (2-5) are 2½ point choices to defeat the Lions (1-5-1) at Detroit.

The Bears entertain the Forty Niner team that edged them last month at San Francisco, 20-17, when R. C. Owens leaped and caught Y. A. Tittle's 46-yard pass in the end zone with 61 seconds to go. The Forty-Niners have won four in a row while the Bears won their last two starts.

Baltimore lost to the Browns and Redskins in its last two games and must bounce back quickly to retain the Western Division title and a chance to defend its league crown in the championship

game. The Colts tackle a Green Bay team that has lost four straight since winning its first three games. The Packers bowed at Baltimore last month, 38-21.

Giant Quarterbacks Ready
Charley Conerly and George Shaw, New York's top quarterbacks, are nursing injuries but may recover sufficiently to play against Pittsburgh. The Giants were fortunate to gain a 21-16 victory last month at Pittsburgh. The Giants have won their last five games, the league's longest current victory string.

Washington probably did Coach Paul Brown a favor by defeating Baltimore last Sunday. That upset should help get his Browns in a serious mood for a Redskin team they downed at Cleveland, 34-7. Don Bossler, Washington's fullback, is injured.

The Eagles entertain a Cardinal team they edged earlier in the season, 28-24, after trailing 24-0 in the third period. The Rams-Lions clash also is a return match. The Lions upset the Rams at Los Angeles, 17-7.

Reese and Richey are experienced players but new to the blocking back post. Richey has played just about every other position, seeing service particularly at end, fullback and linebacker. Reese has been a tailback and defensive half.

Woodward said much time has been spent on defense. He was studying a scouting report of Junction City last night.

Phoenix is District 6 titlist and Junction City won in District 5.

Transcript On D'Amato Gets Study

New York—UPI—The New York State athletic commission is expected to require at least two weeks for study of the transcript before giving a decision in the Cus D'Amato hearing, which ended Tuesday.

D'Amato, manager of former heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson, was a defendant against five misconduct charges during the three-day hearing.

He pleaded guilty to one of those charges: Failure to report Patterson's purse to the commission within five days after the June 26 fight in which Sweden's Ingemar Johansson won the crown from Patterson.

D'Amato was ordered to "show cause" at the hearing why his licenses as manager and second should not be revoked. Those licenses were already suspended for his failure to appear at a general hearing on Sept. 14.

Three Choices
In its decision the commission can: Lift the suspensions, stretch the suspensions to a definite date, revoke the licenses permanently or fine D'Amato.

The four charges denied by D'Amato and his attorneys are: Deliberately disobeying an order to appear at the Sept. 14 hearing, associating with persons of ill repute, acting as an unlicensed promoter, and acting as an unlicensed manager of challengers.

Meanwhile the hearing of promoter Bill Rosensohn was postponed to Thursday. Three misconduct charges threaten his license as matchmaker.

Pressure May Be Applied on Syracuse Board

Miami—UPI—The Orange Bowl selection committee was to meet in special session today, possibly to deliver an ultimatum to Syracuse to accept a bid to the post-season game before it is withdrawn.

Chairman Van C. Kussrow called the meeting after Syracuse trustees were indecisive about accepting an invitation. "I don't think our committee will wait until Sunday night, the time indicated by Syracuse for a decision," Kussrow said.

Kussrow told Syracuse officials Tuesday the Orangemen could have the visiting team bid by immediate acceptance. University officials put off a decision pending Saturday's game with underdog Colgate.

Harold Johnson Sonny Ray Foe

Chicago—UPI—Harold Johnson, the No. 1 challenger to champion Archie Moore in the light heavyweight class, fights a "Thanksgiving" match against Sonny Ray tonight, two weeks early.

His battle with Ray, sixth ranked among the 175 pounders, will be in front of the television cameras, and Johnson was thankful he had the chance for a better payday than usual.

"It's Thanksgiving for me," he said, "because it'll give me the money to have a Thanksgiving Day. I can't get enough fights to eat on most of the time."

Actually it'll be Johnson's 11th fight in four years, and he'll be defending a 10-fight winning streak. It will be his second appearance on TV in the past 12 months and his fifth on a "be impressive" campaign to force Moore to give him another title chance.

Carter Takes Third Straight

Richmond, Calif.—UPI—Former lightweight champion Jimmy Carter ran his comeback victory string to three straight Tuesday night by knocking out Mexico's Kildo Nunez in the fourth round of a scheduled 10-rounder at Richmond auditorium.

Carter was trailing on points before the sudden ending. Nunez, of Sonora, Mex., frequently belted the ex-champ with right hand leads during the first three rounds.

However, Carter caught Nunez coming in shortly after the fourth opened and dropped him for a full 10-count with a right to the heart. Nunez tried to make it to his feet but was unable to get off the canvas.

The win was Carter's second over Nunez this year.

"IF" FIGHT DATE
San Francisco—UPI—Yvon Durelle of Canada has an "if" date to meet Carl Bobo Olson in a 10-round light heavyweight bout here Dec. 10. A spokesman for matchmaker Bennie Ford said the fight will be called off if Durelle gets badly cut or is stopped in next Monday's encounter with George Chuvalo at Toronto.

The Ducks spent most of Tuesday on offense, dividing the session between running and passing.

Coach Jim Sutherland devoted most of the session to stopping Oregon's ground and aerial game. The two clubs meet here Saturday in the annual homecoming game.

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
