Sweet Home — (UPI) — Two members of a U.S. Forest Service crew of 13 injured Tuesday when their panel truck went into the South Santiam river after plunging 75 feet remained in serious condition today. Only three of the 13 were hospitalized.

UMC Campaign Gets \$5,170 During Week

A total of \$5,170.56 for the week ending Nov. 9 was reported at the United Medford Crusade division chairman's meeting this week at the Jackson hotel.

The total raised to date is \$103,074.57, which is 74.2 percent of the \$138,782 goal. The amount reported is about \$600 more than was reported on the same date in last year's campaign, but is about 4 percent less percentage wise, Del Landing, campaign chairman, said.

Early this week, the UMC's home crusade was conducted by women volunteers, but the amount received will not be known until later this week or early next week, UMC officials said.

Landing said that in order to keep abreast of last year's campaign percentage for Nov. 16 it will be necessary for volunteers to turn in \$11,600 this week. He added that there is a good possibility this can be done.

Division Totals
Division totals so far in the campaign are: lumber \$27,138.73; professional, \$8,355.60; public employees, \$12,976.95; retail, \$10,986.96; commercial, \$6,949.13; distribution, \$4,433.50; service, \$24,960.59; special gifts, \$6,416; home crusade, \$11; and special events, \$846.11.

Eugene Garner, special events chairman, turned in \$327 from a golf tournament at the Rogue Valley Country club. He added that he believed his goal of \$1,200 will be realized. He expressed appreciation to Mr. and Mrs.
