### T-H Amendments To Take Effect

Portland - Robert J. Wiener, regional officer-in-charge for the national labor relations board, has announced that his office is ready to begin administration of the new Taft-Hartley amendments on Friday, Nov. 13, when the new amendments take effect. The amendments cover such subjects as picketing, secondary boycotts, the right of strikers to vote in board elections, and hot cargo and subcontracting agreements. These amendments will be administered exclusively by the board. They also provide that the states, for the first time since the enactment of the Wagner Act in 1935, may regulate labor disputes over which the NLRB declines to assert its jurisdiction. Other provisions, which deal primarily with reporting and disclosure matters, and with the democratic rights of union members and the fiduciary duties of union officers, will be administered in the main by the U.S. department of labor. Wiener stated, "We are ready to, and we will, administer the new Taft-Hartley amendments, vigorously, expeditiously, and fairly."

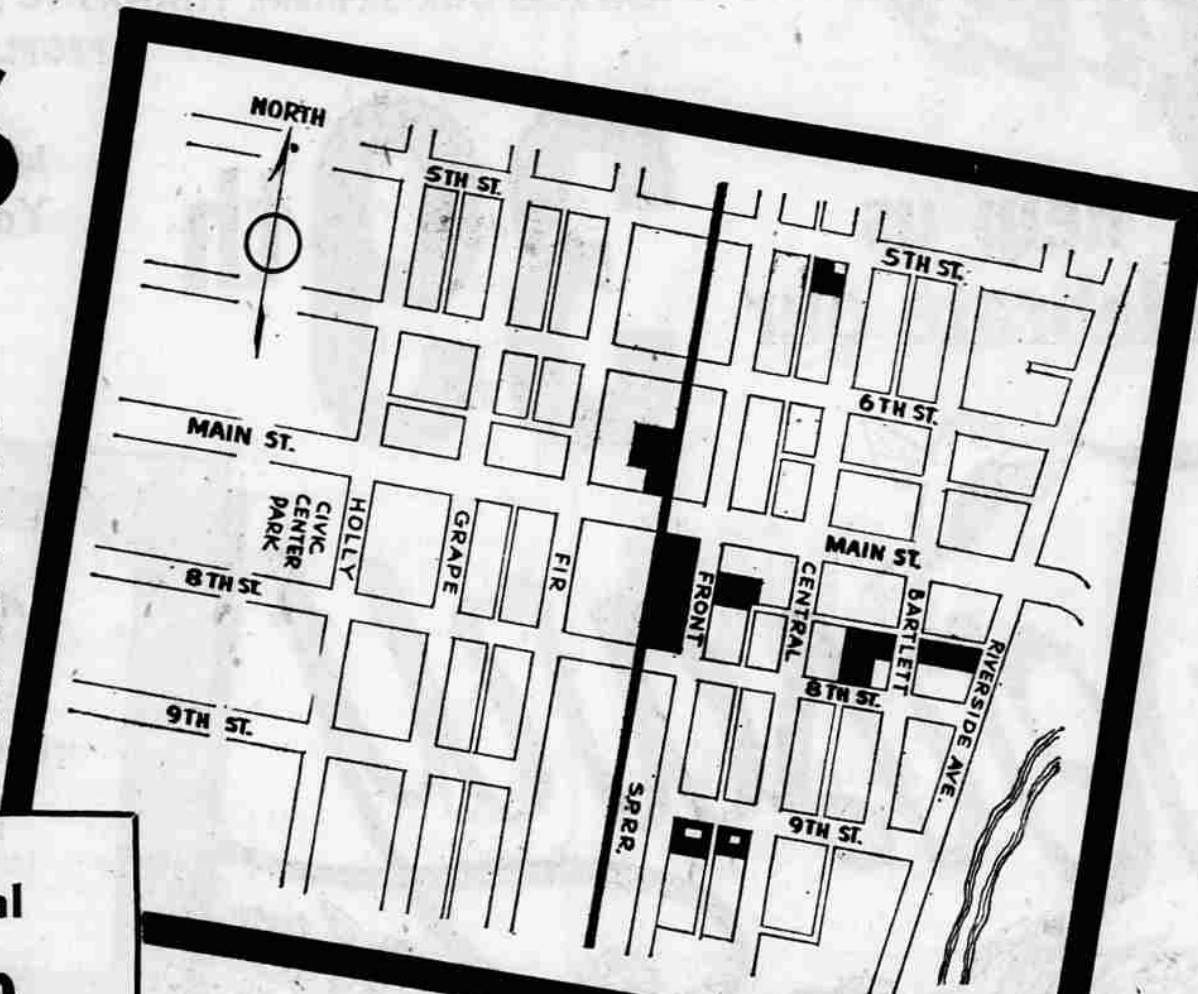
### Half-Size Separates
