

Regional Meeting On Aging Will Be Held Here Saturday

Mrs. Helen Zollinger, chairman of the Oregon state conference on aging, and Miss Jeanne Jewett, administrator of the state welfare commission, Portland, will be among the speakers and panelists at the Southern Oregon Regional Conference on Aging.

The conference will start at 9:30 a.m. tomorrow at the First Methodist church in Medford. Registration, for which there will be no charge, will start at 8:30 a.m.

Mrs. Zollinger will preside at the luncheon at 12:30 p.m. tomorrow served by the Methodist women, and will speak on "What Can the Community Do?" in preparation for the state conference on aging at the closing session tomorrow afternoon.

Mrs. Zollinger is a member of the national committee on aging, on the council of the national gerontological society, and on the executive committee of the Oregon State Council on Aging.

She also will participate in a panel discussion on recreation and education, which will be moderated by Elliott Cohen, assistant to the director, division of recreation for the ill and handicapped, National Recreation association, New York City.

Miss Jewett, who has been with the public welfare program in Oregon since 1933, will moderate a panel discussion on meeting the health needs of older citizens. Topic will be "What is Being Done Now?"

The panel on health will be held at 2:15 p.m. Participants will include Dr. Martin Verheis, medical; Mrs. Julia Brown, Klamath county public welfare commission, foster homes; Miss Helda Boyle, Klamath county health department, and Mrs. Chester Guches, Jackson county health department, health department aspects; Mrs. Vivian Gardner, Jackson county,

nursing home facilities; and Mrs. Guches, Mrs. Henry Padgham and Mrs. Frank Fairweather, all of Medford, other services.

The panel on health is one of four. The other three are on employment and income; housing, recreation and education.

Participate in Discussion
Participating in the employment and income discussion will be C. L. Williams, representative of the National Association of Retired Civil Service Employees, Ashland, moderator; and managers of state employment offices in Klamath Falls, Julius D. Giuntini; Grants Pass, Dale Simpson; and Medford, John Patton.

Edward Jacobson, manager of the Medford social security office, and Wilbur Womer, district administrator of Klamath Falls, will participate in a panel on the place of social security and rules of employment as it affects income for retired persons.

The regional conference here is the second session in the state leading to the state conference on aging. Following state conferences throughout the country, a White House Conference on Aging will be held in 1961.

MUST CLOSE GAP

Worcester, Mass. (UPI)—Sen. Leverett Saltonstall (R-Mass.) said Thursday night that the economic gap between the wealthy and backward nations of the world must be closed if we are to win over Communism. "Communist economic penetration in some of the marginal areas of the world poses a real danger for the West," Saltonstall told a Holy Cross University student forum.

Wall Street Chatter

New York (UPI)—Businessmen, investors and economists are reluctant to forecast earnings beyond the near-term although the underlying economic picture is still strong and healthy, notes Hayden, Stone & Co.

They realize that a lot depends on whether the government, backed by public opinion, can prevent a second steel strike at the end of the 80-day cooling off period, the firm points out.

However, it adds, this cautious attitude has provided an element of internal market strength for the past several years and is primarily responsible for the market's ultra-selective status at this time.

Home Furnishings daily cites persistent reports that Higbee Co. is up for sale and that Associated Dry Goods Corp. and Federated Department Stores have been mentioned as interested in the Cleveland department store.

"... Tax loss selling offers the prospect that many oil issues will be oversold at year-end," notes Oil Statistics Co., Inc. The firm points out that better-informed buying in oil shares is being noted in the street and that this should help form a strong base for an early 1960 rally.

Aviation Week reports Cessna Aircraft expects to double its sales in the next five years by developing the foreign market for business planes and by credit sales at the retail level.

STOPOVER POINT

Vienna (UPI)—A group of 26 Jewish emigrants from Russia have passed through Vienna on their way to Israel, police said Thursday. It was the first time in many years Jewish emigrants from Russia have stopped off in this city, the key point for Jewish emigration from Eastern bloc countries. Police said the Russians arrived here Nov. 9 and left for Israel after a short stopover.

New Threat Brings Fear of 'Mad Bomber' on Loose in NY

New York (UPI)—A normally quiet neighborhood on Staten Island was clutched by fear today. Housewives were afraid to go outdoors. Car owners approached garage doors with terror.

The death of Mrs. Concetta Giarletta, 41, by a grenade booby trap under a garage door and the warning to another housewife that "you will be next" spread panic in the Port Richmond district of the island.

Was another "mad bomber" on the loose?
New York City had been plagued for 17 years by George Metesky, the original mad bomber, who set off 32 homemade bombs which injured 15 persons during his career. He was captured in 1957 and sent to a home for the criminal insane.

Police said the call to the Trachta home could have been a cruel hoax. But the coroner's verdict on Mrs. Giarletta was starkly real. "Death due to an explosion," it read.
