

Kick Gives Oregon Victory Over Washington State 7-6

Pullman, Wash. (UPI)—Quarterback Roger Daniels kicked the point-after-touchdown with 17 seconds to go to give the Oregon Ducks their second win of the season over Washington State, 7-6, on frozen Rogers field Saturday.

Oregon halfback Willie West romped over for the touchdown in the spectator-crowded corner from the two after Washington State had held for three downs inside the five yard line.

It was the kind of story book ending of which Oregon has built a possible Rose Bowl bid this season. With only a minute to go, and after the teams had exchanged fumbles near the Washington State 20, the Cougars kicked to the Oregon 25. Halfback Dave Grayson ran it back to the 40. On the first down, quarterback Dave Gross passed 56-yards to West who caught it and stepped out on the four yard line.

Fullback Dave Powell, who was the Ducks' most consistent ground gainer up to the middle and off the tackles, made two, and then was held for no gain. WSU halfback Keith Lincoln broke up Gross' next pass attempt.

Then West swept end-for-the score.

The final few minutes had been played deep in Washington State territory as the Cougars tried desperately to hang onto the 6-0 lead they had since early in the second period. Oregon, starting on its own eight in the final play of the third period, moved to the Washington State 16 on six first downs before Powell fumbled on the 17 and WSU center Marv Nelson jumped on it.

Halfback Keith Lincoln made four and fullback La Roy Rath fumbled on the 24. Gross recovered for the Ducks.

Intercepts pass
On the next play, halfback Don Ellerstick intercepted West's pass intended for Cleveland Jones on the one yard line. WSU moved out to the 28 on four plays and a helpful 15-yard penalty against the Ducks before Lincoln kicked.

WSU's score came when sophomore passing ace, quarterback Mel Melin, kept the ball and went off-tackle 18 yards for the touchdown. Halfback Perry Harper's run was short for the two-point attempt.

The Cougars' scoring drive started on the Oregon 37. Harper lost four yards, then Melin went around end for five. A 15-yard penalty against Oregon gave WSU a first down on the Duck 18. Melin's score came on the next play.

Principal Pleased With Parent Turnout
Bruce Metzger, principal of Jackson school, Saturday expressed his appreciation for the attendance at the school's open house in connection with National Education Week.

More than 300 parents visited the school, he said. Regular class schedules for grades five and six were shown to parents, and informal discussion with parents were scheduled for grades one through four.

The fourth grade mothers and the Parent Teacher association executive board served refreshments during the open house.

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Fumbles and penalties aided Washington State on three occasions during the game. Two personal fouls penalties against Oregon came at key points and four times the Cougars recovered Oregon fumbles.

Most players on both teams wore sneakers in an effort to gain some traction on the frozen field. The temperature was in the 20's throughout the game, which was viewed by a brave, chattering 15,500.

Trouced WSU Earlier
Oregon defeated WSU 14-6 at Eugene earlier in the season. Saturday's win left the Ducks with only one loss to Washington—in its season's record and still a front runner in the race for the roses.

Stanford Scores Easily Over OSC

Corvallis, Ore. (UPI)—Fullback Skip Face's 27-point scoring spree and Dick Norman's passes carried Stanford to a surprisingly easy 39-22 football victory over Oregon State Saturday.

Face, a 181-pound junior, scored three touchdowns, kicked a 14-yard field goal and four conversions and ran for two more extra points.

Norman, another junior, hit 14 of his 26 passes for 235 yards including a 57-yard scoring toss to Chris Burford.

A crowd of 10,900, including New York Governor Nelson Rockefeller, watched the offensive battle in sunny, but chilly weather.

Oregon State found itself trailing 21-0 early in the second period before it, denied the scoring column on a 85-yard kickoff return by halfback Ron Miller.

Norman used his passes, with Burford as his favorite target, to set up two first-period touchdowns. The scores came on runs of five and three yards by Face, who ran around Burford's left end position on pichtouts. Rick McMillen dashed 19 yards with another pichtout for the third Stanford score.

Boots Field Goal
Before Oregon State could get going with a late-game drive, Face booted a 14-yard field goal to put the hometown Beavers behind 24-6.

Sophomore halfback Don Kasso led the Beavers to their two final touchdowns and scored them both on runs of two yards.

With only moments left Norman faded back and hit Burford with a long pass on the Oregon State 30. The lanky end ran over to score unmolested and Face climaxed a great day by again running around left end for the final two points.

It was only the third victory of the season for Stanford, which was walloped 55-13 by UCLA last week end.

Oregon State, having its worst season under Tommy Prothro, has won only two and lost seven.

Burford caught seven of Norman's passes and was the man he aimed at in the clutch on the first half payoff drives.

Larry Gardner kicked both extra points for the winners. Westminister opened the scoring in the second period on a 75-yard pass play from Gil Cordova to Ray Varoz. However, the Portland State club was quick to strike back, taking the kickoff and marching 73 yards in 12 plays to pay dirt.

Quarterback Ward Sayles capped the drive with a five-yard burst into the end zone to knot the score at 7-7.

The visitors scored again the next time they got the ball.

The touchdown came on a 39-yard pass from quarterback Dave Voll to end Sam Roberts. Mac Wiebe missed the extra point that proved the margin of difference.

Powell was the workhorse in the Oregon win. He carried the ball 21 times for 71 yards, an average of 3.2 per carry. But it was in the air that the Ducks really outplayed the normally air-minded Cougars. Oregon completed six out of 15 passes for 94 yards while the Cougars completed three out of ten for 17 yards.

Rose Bowl Bound Huskies Roll Over California 20-0

Berkeley, Calif. (UPI)—Washington's Rose Bowl bound Huskies, penalized five yards a minute through the first 16 minutes, played a waiting game and it paid off Saturday as they rolled to a 20-0 win over inept California.

Led by the running of fullback Bob Jackson and halfback George Fleming, the Huskies scored touchdowns in the second, and fourth quarters to pick up their eighth victory in nine starts this season.

The Husky victory was made in the face of a discouraging start. Washington, eventually penalized 164 yards, drew the wrath of the officials for 74 yards in the first 16 minutes of play. But coach Jim Owens failed to be ruffled and had his players wait for the breaks.

The Huskies kicked on third downs three times during the first half before they got the chance they wanted. This came in the waning second of the half — and was almost ruined again by another 15-yard penalty.

The Huskies rolled 62 yards in seven plays to the Cal nine. Here a 15-yard penalty set them back to the 24. But reserve quarterback Bob Hivner tossed a 21-yard pass to John Meyers, and the Huskies were back in business. Jackson scored from the one on the fourth down.

Washington got its second touchdown when Fleming ran back a punt 42 yards to the Cal 30 in the final period. Jackson and Fleming took turns packing the ball up to the one from where Hivner scored.

An 80 yard march accounted for the final tally with Joe Jones pounding over from the two.

A slim crowd of 38,800 watched California lose its eighth consecutive game — longest losing streak in the Golden Bears' history. It was the first time since 1887 that California had failed to win a single game on the home lot.

California never threatened the Washington goal-line, and except for a single play four seconds before the half, never got inside the 30.
