

Planners Suggest Variance for New Home in Medford

The Medford planning commission Thursday night recommended to the city council a variance for a home constructed by Dan Patch at the corner of Ellen ave. and Marilee st.

The commission recommended denial of the Mail Tribune's request to vacate an alley behind the Tribune building.

In recommending the variance for Patch, the commission recognized an oversight of a building inspector who failed to notice that plans for Patch's home did not comply with the city's 20-foot setback requirement.

With Warning

As a result of the error, the home was constructed with only a 16-foot setback from Marilee st. The commission granted him the four-foot variance with the warning that all other homes constructed along Marilee st. will have to comply with the 20-foot setback requirement.

In denying the Mail Tribune's request to have the alley vacated so it could be used for parking and unloading, the commission noted that it did not want to set a precedent for similar requests by favorably recommending this one.

The commission referred to the planning department for future study a request of residents of McAndrews rd. asking to change its name back to Buckshot rd.

29 Signatures

There were 29 signatures on the petition to change the name back to Buckshot rd., compared to 21 on the original petition requesting the change from Buckshot rd. to McAndrews rd. The name was changed to McAndrews rd. a few months ago.

The commission recommended that Dean Marcum's request to extend a variance to maintain a trailer house at his home, 515 Park place, No. 5, be granted for six months with the express recommendation that it not be renewed at that time.

It was recommended to notify Harold Stevens, 210 Lincoln st., that he is operating a plumbing shop at his home in violation of the city ordinance regulating home occupations.

Hearings were continued on changing several lots in the Highecroft addition from residential to multiple family zones, and on changing from commercial to light industrial an area on Barnett rd. to permit a veterinary hospital.

Hearings Granted

Hearings were granted on a request for change of zone from single and two family to commercial property in the Laurelhurst addition, and on a request for change of zone from single family to light industrial for property on Merriman rd. and Midway rd.

Another hearing was granted for a change in zone for a 46-acre area near the junction of Merriman rd., De Barr ave. and Table Rock rd.

A communication regarding the dedication of a street south of Spring st., was read to the commission.

Edward Bolt Is Reelected to Post

Edward F. Bolt, Gold Hill, was reelected president of the Oregon Motor Court association at the final session of the three-day convention of the organization in Portland last week.

Other officers elected were Robert Elftstrom, Salem, first vice president; Walt Johnson, Portland, second vice president; Agnes Berry, Trail, third vice president; and James R. Clark, Portland, secretary-treasurer.

Delegates at the convention passed a resolution urging a continued study for the establishment of a national park in the dunes area, after hearing Sen. Richard L. Neuberger say the "state is in grave peril of losing a national park in the Oregon Dunes."

Other resolutions ask development of better controls and enforcement of all laws prohibiting excessive highway noise; calling for an increased number of wayside rest areas, and commending the fish and game commission for its program of planting larger game fish in streams.

Medford area directors named include Max P. Weston, Brownell motel, and H. E. Mauck, Travelodge. Ila Estelle of Colonial motel, Ashland, was named as the Ashland area director.

Theme of Education Week Followed

Ashland - "Praise and appraise your schools" was the 1959 theme of American Education week, Nov. 8-14, which was observed on the Southern Oregon college campus. Under the sponsorship of the SOC Student Oregon Education association, events were scheduled throughout the week.

Oregon Education association president, Mrs. Maxine Smith of Medford, spoke Wednesday at the student body assembly. Using the education week's theme for Wednesday, "learning to get along with the people next door," Mrs. Smith outlined the generally complacent attitude of the American people and the role of schools in bringing nations to better understanding. In charge of the assembly was Wayne Paulson, SOC student OEA president.

Attending the annual Silver tea from 2-5 p.m. Wednesday were members of the Lincoln school and SOC faculty and student OEA members. Initiation ceremonies of new SOEA members on Friday at 7:30 p.m. climaxed a week-long membership drive.

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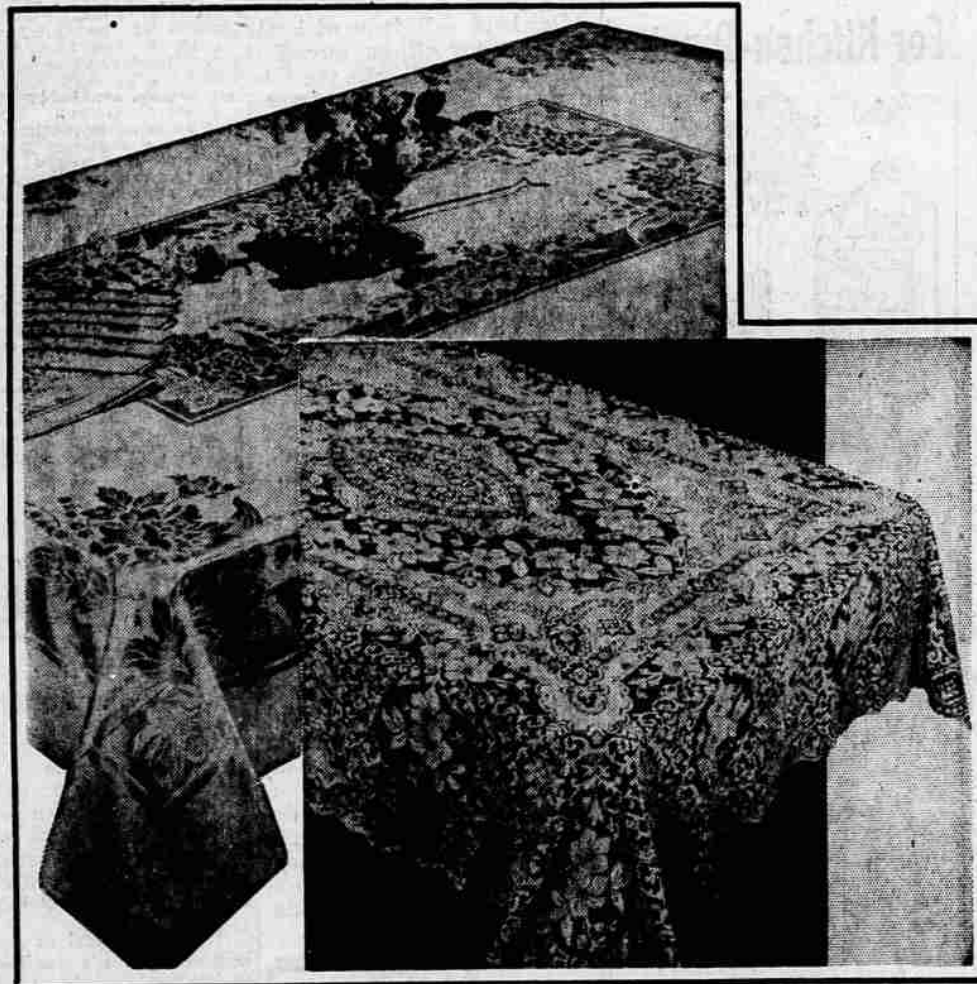
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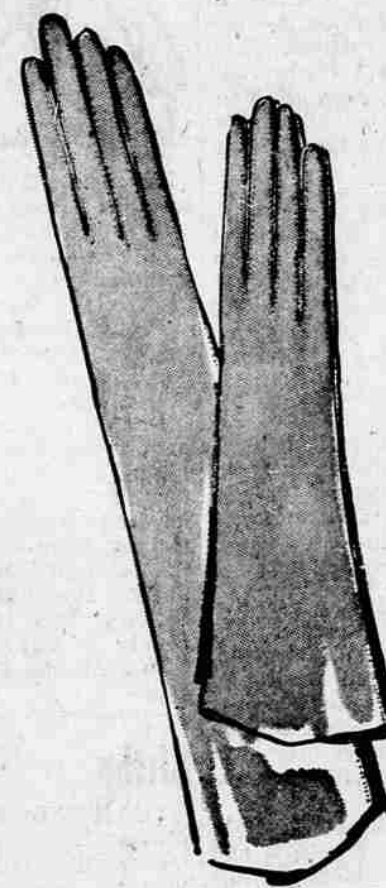
