

### Medford Man Named by Hatfield

Salem—(UP)—Three appointments were announced by Gov. Mark Hatfield Friday.

Robert Minear of Medford was named to the Advisory Committee on Education of Migrant Children to succeed Mrs. F. B. Lubken of Hood River. She resigned.

Walter Lofgren, Astoria, was appointed to the State Commission for the Blind and succeeds Henry Sinner, Portland, who resigned.

Lloyd Griffiths of Salem was appointed to the Employees Suggestion Awards Board to replace Melvin Cleveland, Salem. Cleveland resigned when he became State Civil Service Director.

## Chemical Salesman Defends Spray Used On Cranberries

"My family will continue to eat cranberries in spite of the publicity on aminotriazole," a salesman for the company which produces the chemical spray, told the audience at the Oregon Weed Conference Friday afternoon.

Clark Amen, Corvallis, salesman for the American Cyanamid company, said "it should be stressed that this spray does not produce acute toxicity (not poisonous), nor does it have a short-use toxicity."

"In experimental animals, the amount of aminotriazole that constitutes a lethal dose is so high that the product may be said to be practically devoid of acute toxicity," according to the prepared statement of the salesman read.

"One may conclude from the extensive evidence available that it would be practically impossible for an individual to absorb a harmful dose of aminotriazole from any small number of exposures."

Inhibition or slowing down of the thyroid gland's action was the only specific harmful effect noted when the chemical was fed to rats in a steady

and uninterrupted dose over a lifetime of the animal, the release stated.

"In some rats, the effort of the thyroid gland to compensate for this blocking action over a period of a lifetime, led to the development of thyroid tumors, some of which were judged to be malignant," Amen read.

When the compound was fed to the rats for a period as long as 18 weeks, then removed, the rats returned to normal. Dogs received the same test without any visible effects, Amen reported.

This inhibition of the thyroid is an effect produced by many chemical compounds including some compounds which occur naturally in foodstuffs, and some pesticide chemicals for which residue tolerances have been set, according to Amen.

Eventual development of tumors required continuous daily absorption of aminotriazole over a period equivalent to many years of human life, Amen pointed out.

"We would have to consume 2 1/2 to 3 pounds of the actual chemical and that would only kill about 80 percent of us. It would be almost impossible to get that much down," Amen said.

The conference did not go on record regarding the chemical and its relation to cranberry spraying.

In a telephone conversation, County Extension Agent George Jenkins, Coquille, said only a small percentage of the cranberry growers in his area had used the chemical at all and even a smaller percentage had sprayed before harvesting the berries. Oregon cranberries have a gross income of about \$50,000, he said. Since this is the second consecutive crop withheld from the market many of the growers may be hard hit financially, he noted. The Coquille area crop is shipped to southwest Washington for processing.

Both were pinned under a heavily loaded gravel truck and trailer after the vehicle had left a timber access road and careened down a steep 500-foot bank and burst into flames.

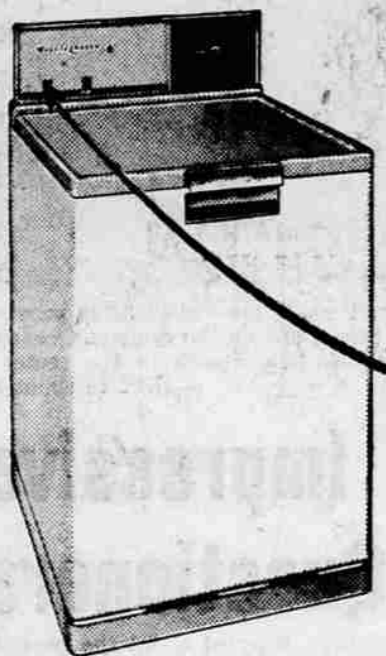
