Hospital Volunteer Work Reviewed

More than 12,000 hours of volunteer service were given by members of Rogue Valley Memorial Hospital auxiliary during the twelve months ended in October, according to the annual report just issued by the president, Mrs. Glen D. Bessonet. Copies of the report were distributed at the fall meeting of the group, held Thursday afternoon in the Board and Staff room at the hospital.

Three pieces of specialized equipment recently purchased by the auxiliary for use at the hospital were displayed, and

their applications explained by Dr. Martin Vorheis, chief of the medical staff. The aortography equipment is used in making x-ray diagnosis of circulatory disturbances; patients requiring this type of test were formerly sent to San Francisco or Portland as no closer medical centers are equipped with the aortogram. A cardiac monitor has been secured for use in surgery when it is essential that the doctors have a constant check on the patient's heart beat. The third device is a telethermometer which indicates skin, body or vascular temperature of a patient under treatment, which would make it desirable to maintain a constant record of the temperature.

Charles I. Gustafson, administrator, spoke briefly about government assistance to hospitals, particularly as available through Hill - Burton funds, which have assisted many communities in building programs. He also showed a film "Helping Hands for Julie" which depicts the hospital care and specialized treatment given a child in a modern hospital in the course of diagnosing and treating a serious illness.

Membership in the auxiliary now totals 221. Mrs. Bessonet states. The number of hours given last year by each group of volunteers working in the hospital includes flower and mail, 461 hours; hospital-ity card, 753; surgical dressing group, 297; sewing group,

2228; and information desk assistants, 2240. Administrative work for the auxiliary including orientation classes required 1,049 hours; membership, 61; clerical assistants, 260; youth groups, 6; publicity, 17; and memorials, 4.

The gift shop and snack bar workers contributed 4,032 hours; of this 1,573 was counted to the gift shop, 94 to the "shop on wheels," and 2,365 to the snack bar.

Outlying chapters and special project groups active this year were the Gold Hill Health unit which gave 5 hours; St. Martha's Guild at Prospect, 120 hours; and St. Martin's Guild at Shady Cove, 21 hours.

Members of the junior auxiliary or "Candy Strippers" and their adult auxiliary supervisors gave 514 hours of service since their organization in June.

The meeting concluded with a tea. Centrepiece for the table was an arrangement of bronze and yellow chrysanthemums, spirea leaves, and manzanita wood, created by Mrs. Alton Anderson. Refreshments were provided by members of the snack bar and gift shop groups.
