

SF Industrialist To Address Portlanders

Portland - (UPI) - Industrialist William L. Keady, San Francisco, will be the principal speaker next Monday at the Portland Chamber of Commerce members' forum in the Multnomah hotel.

He is president of Fibreboard Paper Products corporation, said to be the West's largest manufacturer of paper-board cartons and containers.

Weather Reports for Highways Scheduled

Salem - (UPI) - Hazardous highway and weather condition reports will be prepared daily by the State Highway Department again this winter starting Monday, the department said Saturday.

The reports will be made available to public agencies such as the U. S. Weather Bureau, state police and the motor vehicle law enforcement teletype network.

The public will get the information through press, radio and television.

Gold Hill Council To Consider Water Plant Bond Issue

Gold Hill - The Gold Hill city council will meet Monday night in the city recorder's office to consider calling an election on a proposed water filtration plant bond issue.

The estimated cost of a water filtration plant for the city would be \$200,000, which includes bonds and interest, Archie Rice, consulting engineer for Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield Consulting Engineers, Corvallis, told about 100 persons attending a public hearing on the proposal last week.

Rice, who presented facts and answered questions regarding the proposal, made a survey for a proposed filter plant for the city's water supply in 1956.

Meters for New Homes

Rice said that because of opposition from residents to water meters, it was decided that a water treatment plant, estimated to cost \$120,000, could be constructed without installation of meters at homes of present property owners. He suggested, however, that meters be installed at all new homes, and on property changing hands.

The bonds, including interest, estimated at 5 per cent, would be paid off in 20 years at the rate of \$10,000 a year, he said.

In addition to the \$10,000 for principal and interest, there would be an annual cost of about \$3,808 to operate the plant, he added. Rice said the city would have to set an estimated water rate of at least \$4.75 per month to pay these costs.

Ferd. Jones, city recorder, said there are 238 water users. The \$4.75 per month would raise \$57 extra per year from each water user, or a total of \$13,566 annually, which would pay all costs of building and operating the filtration plant according to engineer's estimates.

Guarantees Annual Payment
This would guarantee the annual payment of \$10,000 on bonds and interest, and would cover the estimated \$3,808 for a part-time man to operate the plant and chemicals, Rice and Jones noted.

City officials stressed that other city expenses which are now financed by at least part of the funds derived from the present water rate would have to be raised some other way.

Rice said, in answer to a question, that whether water meters would be required at all homes in the future would be up to the city council. He noted that the council now has the power to require meters, whether the city builds a filtration plant or not.

Would Necessitate Chlorine
The engineer said the use of chlorine would still be necessary as a germ killing agent if such a plant were constructed. He said that at least as much or probably more chlorine would be required when the water is filtered.

Mrs. Daniel Stewart asked Rice if the greater amount of chlorine used last summer was necessary because of more bacteria at that time or because a greater amount of water was being used. Rice said the amount of chlorine required per gallon is actually less in the summer than in winter because more chlorine is required when the water is slightly muddy.

Harold E. Milliken, assistant chief sanitary engineer with the state board of health, Portland, verified the point.

Tests Taken Regularly
Orie Moore, Jackson county sanitation officer, said tests of Gold Hill's water are taken regularly and have been completely satisfactory. Copies of his reports are available at his office, he said.

Delos water, city councilman, said that if water tests were unsatisfactory the council would be notified immediately, and residents would be notified.

Rice said that tests are taken twice monthly, and that there is a possibility that the water might be unsatisfactory at some period between tests. Jones later said tests are actually taken at least twice a month, and many times more often than that.
