MRS. ELIZABETH COWAN

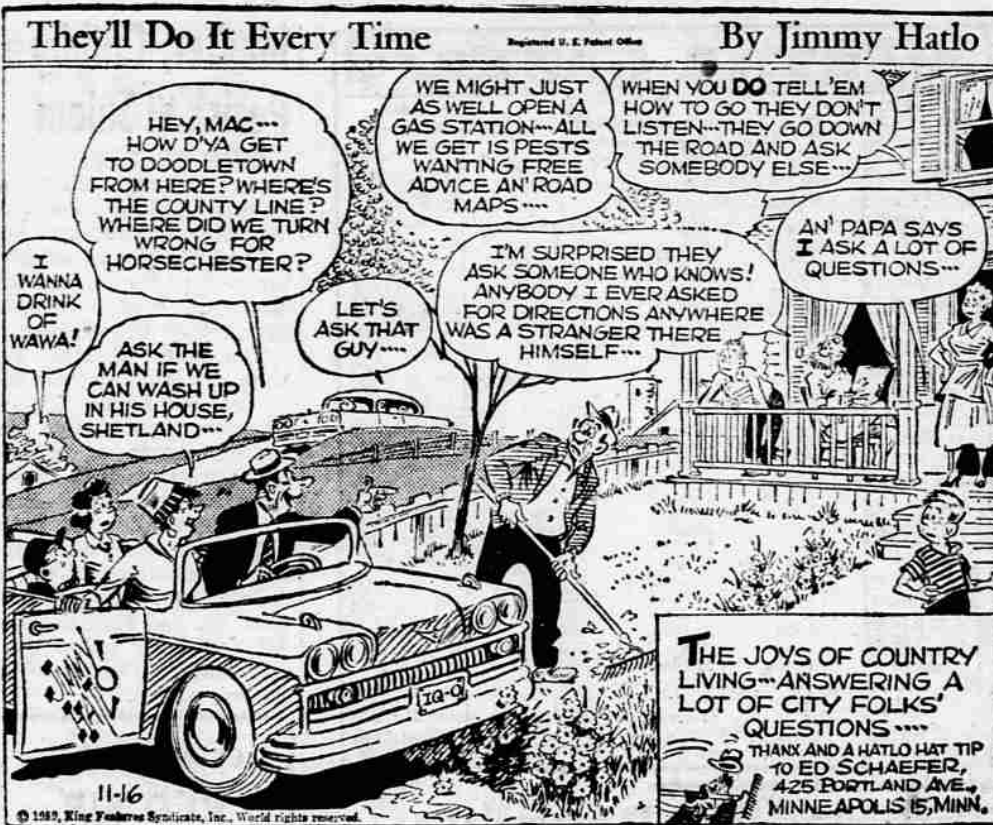

College Research Team Works on Preserving Seafood by Radiation

Corvallis — Fresh Oregon crab may find a way to Midwest dinner tables and fresh Maine lobster may be included in Oregon menus as food preservation, consumer acceptance would have to be won.

Pasteurization-radiation is a "natural" for preserving seafoods, believe OSC workers. If tests are successful, radiation centers could be set up at some of the world's major fishing ports to preserve seafoods where they are caught.

Crab, shrimp, rockfish, fillet of sole, kippered fish, oysters and clams will be included in the college study. Fish will be packed in cans, and sent to Arco, Idaho, to the Materials Testing Reactor for irradiation. After storage, fish will be cooked and served in college test kitchens, according to the usual recipes. OSC taste panels will test food for flavor changes.

Study of radiant-resistant bacteria, microorganisms able to survive heavy doses of atomic radiation, will also be investigated along with normal organisms that cause food spoilage at refrigerator temperatures.

Irradiated foods are in no way "radioactive" or harmful to health, the research team emphasized. Gamma radiation at such low levels as used in foods have been extensively tested and no harmful effects have ever been found.

OSC is among the first schools in the country to be granted funds from the National Health organization for a study of the irradiation-pasteurization of foods.

Iraq Declared Free From Ike's Doctrine

BAGHDAD, Iraq — (UPI) — Premier Abdel Karim Kassem Saturday declared that Iraq had "freed" itself from "imperialism" by "crushing" the Baghdad Pact and withdrawing from the Eisenhower Doctrine.

"Imperialism wanted to disunite the people, make them wage in pools of blood and see one group strike the other," Kassem declared in a nationwide radio speech, his first major public pronouncement since being wounded in an assassination attempt Oct. 7.

He moved with his father's family to a ranch near Fort Klamath where they lived until 1906 when they moved to Turlock, Calif., where Mr. Boothby was employed by the Standard Oil Company of California. Following his retirement he returned to Oregon and lived with a brother and sister near Prospect.

He married Miss Eda Whitely of Seattle, Wash., in 1953 and lived in Seattle until his death.

Mr. Boothby is survived by his wife in Seattle and four children in California.

Mr. Boothby was born at Zanesville, Ohio, for services and interment.

Mr. Bussemer was born at Zanesville on Aug. 23, 1906, and was a machinist in the Medford area for the past three years. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Loyd McCoy, Zanesville.
