

# Humboldt Rallies Over Red Raiders

Ashland—Gordon Carrigan put on a one-man football show for Southern Oregon college but Humboldt State came from behind to beat the Raiders 20 to 7 Saturday night here on Fuller field.

Carrigan nabbed eight of the Raiders' nine completed passes and picked up 14 yards on an end around reverse play to total 139 yards for the evening.

The game closed out the 1959 Southern Oregon college football season with a 4-5 record and a second place in Oregon Collegiate conference.

Freshman Doyle Branson put the Raiders into an early 7 to 0 lead when he scored from five yards out on a sweep around the left end. Phil Swisher booted the extra point and there was 3:09 remaining in the first quarter.

Midway through the second period, Humboldt's Lumberjacks got back six of the points when Cecil Stevens capped a 71 yard drive with a three-yard off tackle slant.

Drive 72 Yards

SOC's slim halftime lead lasted until Humboldt got its hands on the ball by taking the second half kickoff.

The California 'Jacks drove 72 yards in 15 plays to take the lead when Fred Whitmire passed three yards to Darol Foster and Jim Walker booted the conversion.

Humboldt had to come through in the clutch on this drive when they had a fourth down situation with eight yards to go. Whitmire again passed to Manuel Vasquez for 12 yards and the first down that set up the touchdown.

An intercepted pass set up the third tally for Humboldt late in the third period when Walker intercepted one of Jack Brown's aerials and returned it 28 yards to the Raiders' 27 yard line.

It took six plays for Humboldt in the short drive to the goal and again it was Foster on the receiving end of Whitmire's pass for the touchdown.

Francis Gains

Tom DiMercurio got the conversion on a pass from Whitmire to cap the scoring

for the evening as the fourth quarter went scoreless.

Eldon Francis was the leading ground gainer for the Red Raiders with 41 yards followed by Branson with 26 and Alan Barnes with 24.

Carrigan gained 125 yards on his pass receiving all from the arm of Brown who completed one other for a four yard loss.

Teamwise the Raiders gained 221 yards while Humboldt marched and passed for 276 to extend its winning streak to eight games.

## Folley Fights Alonzo Johnson

New York (UPI)—Two good heavyweights bouts and an international lightweight fight stand out on this week's boxing schedule.

Zora Folley, second-ranking heavyweight contender, meets former contender Alonzo Johnson in a nationally televised 10-rounder at Phoenix, Ariz., Wednesday night. Folley of Chandler, Ariz., is favored at 12-5 over Johnson of Rankin, Pa.

At London on Tuesday night, England's Henry Cooper will defend his British Empire heavyweight title against Joe Erskine of Wales. Cooper, ranked fifth among world contenders, is favored at 2-1 over seventh-ranked Erskine.

Friday night's TV-radio 10-rounder (NBC) at Madison Square Garden pits lightweight contender Len Matthews of Philadelphia against unrated Willie Toewe of South Africa. Matthews is favored at 13-5 to spoil Toewe's American debut.

## Bears Cut SF Margin Over Colts

Chicago (UPI)—There was plenty of second guessing in San Francisco today.

San Francisco Forty Niners were mulling over one of last year's most controversial subjects — the presence or absence of quarterbacks Y. A. Tittle and John Brodie.

Rookie head coach Red Hickey, a man who could do no wrong in winning six of his first seven starts this season, threw open the door for fan criticism Sunday.

Hickey yanked veteran signal caller Y. A. Tittle after five plays against the Chicago Bears, and the San Franciscans went on to their second defeat of the season, 14-3.

The loss cut San Francisco's Western division lead to one game, as Baltimore edged closer with a 28-24 victory Sunday over Green Bay. The Forty Niners tangle head-on with the defending pro champs next Sunday at Baltimore.

'Worst Day For Tittle'

"Tittle had one of his worst days of the season and so did the rest of the team, and we got beat," said a solemn Hickey after Sunday's loss.

Hickey indicated that he was less than pleased with the work of Tittle's replacement, John Brodie. Brodie played the remainder of the day at quarterback, with the exception of the final minutes of the game.

The stint was the first of the season for Brodie at quarterback.

Brodie had three passes intercepted and Tittle tossed away two. A rough and tumble Bear defensive unit pushed San Francisco's offense around the icy field most of the afternoon, as the Forty Niners were kept from scoring a touchdown for the first time in 18 games.

In addition to losing five interceptions, the Forty Niners lost three fumbles to the hard-charging Bears. The victory gave Chicago a 4-4 season mark and kept them in outside contention for the Western crown. San Francisco is now 6-2 and Baltimore is 5-3.

San Francisco's only touchdown yesterday, a brilliant run by J. D. Smith, was called back because of a clipping penalty.

## Steelers' Triumph Assist To Browns

Layne's 45-yard pass to Tom Tracy Sunday with 89 seconds to go gave the Steelers (3-4-1) a 14-9 upset triumph over the New York Giants and stunned a capacity Yankee Stadium crowd of 66,786. The perfectly-executed toss, against a defense that had not permitted a touchdown since it last faced Layne Oct. 25, produced a costly defeat for the Giants.

Like Browns of Old

The Browns, looking more and more like the Cleveland teams that have dominated pro football since World War II, took quick advantage of Layne's assist.

With Bobby Mitchell opening a three-touchdown spree with a 90-yard run, the Browns made the Washington Redskins (3-5) their fifth straight victim, 31-17, and deadlocked the Giants for the Eastern division lead. However, the Browns will know more about their feeling for Layne after they play the Steelers next Sunday at Cleveland.

The Colts, defending league champions, get a chance to tie the San Francisco Forty-Niners (6-2) for the Western lead next Sunday at Baltimore. If they do, the Colts (5-3) will owe a vote of thanks to Johnny Morris and the Chicago Bears.

Colts Edge Packers

Morris ran the opening kickoff 58 yards to set up a one-yard touchdown plunge by Rick Casares and caught a 51-yard scoring pass from Ed Brown to lead the Bears (4-4) to a 14-3 triumph over the Forty-Niners at Chicago. Baltimore, with John Unitas firing two scoring passes to Ray Berry and the decisive touchdown toss to Jim Mutscheller, took advantage of Chicago's help by edging the Green Bay Packers, 28-24. Baltimore started the day two games behind San Francisco.

The Philadelphia Eagles (5-3) also benefited from Pittsburgh's triumph, moving within a game of the Giants and Browns each (6-2) in the East by downing the Chicago Cardinals, 27-17. Clarence Peaks plunged a yard to snap a 17-17 tie with five minutes to go after Norm Van Brocklin's 45-yard pass to Pete Retzlaff set up the play.

Earl Morrall completed a 79-yard touchdown pass to Dave Middleton and an 11-yarder to John Henry Johnson to lead the Lions (2-5-1) to a 23-17 triumph over the Los Angeles Rams (2-6) in the other game.

## Bob Cousy Shines for Bostonians

The Boston Celtic flash never looked better than he did Sunday night when he poured in 38 points in a 134-128 victory over the Cincinnati Royals.

Cousy, high scorer for the game, scored 23 points in the second half as the Celtics chalked up 42 points in the third quarter and widened their Eastern division lead in the National Basketball association. Bill Sharman netted 35 points for the Celtics, who now have beaten the Royals 11 straight times over two seasons.

Lakers Win

The Minneapolis Lakers emerged from the Western division cellar with a 106-100 triumph over the Philadelphia Warriors. Dick Garmaker was high man for the Lakers with 23 points followed by Elgin Baylor with 21.

Paul Arizin and Wilt Chamberlain each scored 26 points for the Warriors, who dropped 1 1/2 games behind the pace-setting Celtics.

Gene Shue scored 26 points to lead the Detroit Pistons to a 103-94 victory over the New York Knickerbockers. The victory was the Pistons' third straight and the loss was New York's fifth in a row. Detroit, ahead all the way, led by 24 points early in the last period and then had to withstand a last-ditch rally by the Knicks to win.

## Casper Takes Lafayette Open

Lafayette, La. (UPI) — Billy Casper Jr. fired a two-under-par 69 Sunday to easily win the second annual Lafayette Open golf tournament. He had an 11-under-par total of 273 for the four days of play.

Casper, a 26-year-old PGA star from Apple Valley, Calif., never was seriously threatened after he took the halfway lead in the \$15,000 event. He won by four strokes over George Bayer of Glenage, Ill., who finished with a 68 for a 277 total.

Tied for third place were Jim Ferree of Crystal River, Fla., and Billy Maxwell, of Odessa, Tex., with 278s. Gay Brewer Jr. of Crystal River, Fla., held down fifth place with 281, while Bill Johnston of Provo, Utah, was in sixth with 282.

Bayer came from fourth to take over the runner-up spot by posting his best round of the tournament. However, the two best rounds of the day were scored by Bob Gobi of Crystal River, Fla., and Arnold Palmer of Ligonier, Pa. They shot 67s to come from far back and tie for seventh, along with Frank Wharton, of Dallas, Tex. The trio had a 283 total.

# Rose, Sugar Bowl Opponents Should Emerge Saturday

New Year's Day rivals in the Rose, Sugar and Orange Bowls should emerge from next Saturday's showdown battles in five conferences but Syracuse, the nation's No. 1 team, will have to wait until Thanksgiving Day before learning its Cotton Bowl opponent.

Wisconsin, Washington, Louisiana State, Clemson and Missouri are favored to win the juiciest plums — but the footballs have been taking crazy bounces the last two weeks and the craziest may be yet to come. Six of the country's top 11 teams and eight of the top 20 were beaten in last Saturday's series of form reversals.

Texas, beaten, 14-9 by Texas Christian in one of the upsets which left Syracuse and Southern California the only major perfect-record teams, can win a share of the Southwestern Conference title and the conference's Cotton Bowl bid opposite Syracuse by beating Texas A&M, Nov. 26.

Here's how the situation shapes up in the five most lucrative bowls as the season heads for its grand climax:

Rose Bowl: Wisconsin (4-2) can win the Big Ten bid by beating Minnesota (1-5) even if Northwestern (4-2) defeats Illinois (3-2-1). Michigan State, also 4-2, has finished its conference schedule. The West Coast bid will go to Washington (6-1) if the Huskies beat Washington State. A Washington loss and an Oregon (5-1) victory over Oregon State would give the berth to the Ducks.

Sugar Bowl: Georgia (6-0) clinched its first Southeastern Conference title since 1948 when it beat Auburn, 14-13, Saturday but it is a doubtful choice. Louisiana State (4-1) probably will get the host berth if it beats Tulane (0-4-1)
