Steels, Electronics Stand Out in List

New York—(UPI)—Steels, electronics and some specialties stood out in a firm and moderately active stock market today.

Support came into the list after a ragged opening that enabled a number of the leaders to extend earlier gains and others to come up from their lows.

U.S. Steel jumped more than 2 in the recently depressed steel section, while National added nearly 2 and Youngstown, Lukens and Bethlehem were all up a point or more.

Electronics were still favored with General Time and Zenith up more than 2 and Raytheon and Motorola ahead by more than a point each. Texas Instruments sold off around 1. DuPont and Thiokol added more than a point each in the chemicals.

Five Youths Die As Auto Plunges Over Steep Bank

Longview, Wash. — (UPI) — A car plunged over a 35 to 40-foot embankment into the Mount Solo slough Monday night, killing five teen-age boys. One youth escaped.

The dead, all from Longview, were Jerry Walston, 15, and his brother Floyd, 13; Bill Webster, 16, and his brother Dick, 13; and the driver, Douglas Randolph, 17. Francis Hughes, 16, was the only survivor.

The sheriff's office said the car was traveling at a high rate of speed when it plunged over the steep embankment into about 20 feet of water.

Hughes was able to swim to shore. The others were trapped in the wreckage.

Experts Conflict On Subject of Excise Taxes

Washington — (UPI) — Congress got conflicting advice today on whether the federal government should rely more heavily on excise taxes to meet its money needs.

The House Ways and Means Committee, in the second day of a five-week inquiry into ways of making income taxes more fair, called for testimony on the relative role of the excise levy from a panel of experts.

The question of broadening present excise taxes—eaten to the extent of enacting a national sales tax—popped up in advance papers submitted to the tax-writing committee by several of today's scheduled witnesses.

William Fellner of Yale University suggested that income taxes be revised with a 15 per cent, across-the-board cut in rates, coupled with a \$100 increase in personal exemptions. Together, these would reduce federal revenue \$9 billion a year.

Fellner proposed offsetting this with a retail sales tax of 7 per cent, applied to about 40 per cent of national consumption.

He conceded his suggestion was controversial but termed it a "reasonable compromise."

John F. Due, a University of Illinois economics professor, said in his paper, however, that a federal sales tax would hit hardest at lowest income levels—elderly retired couples, large families, and young couples—as well as cause businessmen "considerable nuisance and expense."

Mitchell said Hoffa had advised him that only "a few Teamster officers" were forced to resign because of the ban. The secretary added, "the Justice Department has been asked to look into the accuracy of this report."

The Supreme Court refused Monday to interfere with lower court decisions upholding the clean-up directives issued by the Teamster monitors. It was a major setback for Hoffa.

Court Monitors Will Speed Efforts To Remove Hoffa

Washington — (UPI) — Court-appointed monitors vowed today to speed efforts to force the ouster of Teamsters' President James R. Hoffa and his cronies from union office.

Monitor Chairman Martin F. O'Donoghue made the pledge following a Supreme Court ruling which permits enforcement of his anti-corruption drive within the giant truck union.

O'Donoghue indicated he would try to nail the Teamster chief for his part in a Florida real estate deal involving use of funds belonging to Hoffa's home Local 299 in Detroit.

The monitor chairman said he would ask a federal court early next week for power to go ahead with an inquiry into the Florida transaction.

Might Ask Hoffa's Removal
If the courts find that Hoffa misused union funds, O'Donoghue said they might direct Hoffa's removal as provisional president of the Teamsters.

The court also might order the union's executive board to bring charges against Hoffa looking toward his permanent ouster and expulsion from membership in the 1,600,000-member union, O'Donoghue said.

Expulsion would prevent Hoffa from running for office in the Teamsters. It would be the most extreme penalty the union could impose on him.

Neuberger Adds Water Provision in Seashore Bill

Portland — (UPI) — Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) today announced a new provision for inclusion in his Oregon Dunes National Seashore bill which would provide for industrial use of water from Siltcoos and Tahkenitch lakes.

The proposal would make possible adjustment of water levels in the two lakes within the boundaries of the Seashore plan and permit removal of water for industrial purposes, Neuberger said. The latter hinges on approval of the Oregon Water Resources Board.

Prompt Report Promised
The senator also said that the Secretary of the Interior has assured him that the Interior Department "will do all possible to furnish a prompt report on the revised Oregon Dunes Seashore bill when it is introduced and referred to the Department by the Senate Interior Committee."

Neuberger said his revised bill, announced Oct. 26, did not provide adequately for industrial use of lake water under state control. The new provision would clear this up.

Eugene Elk Hunter Injured by Bullet

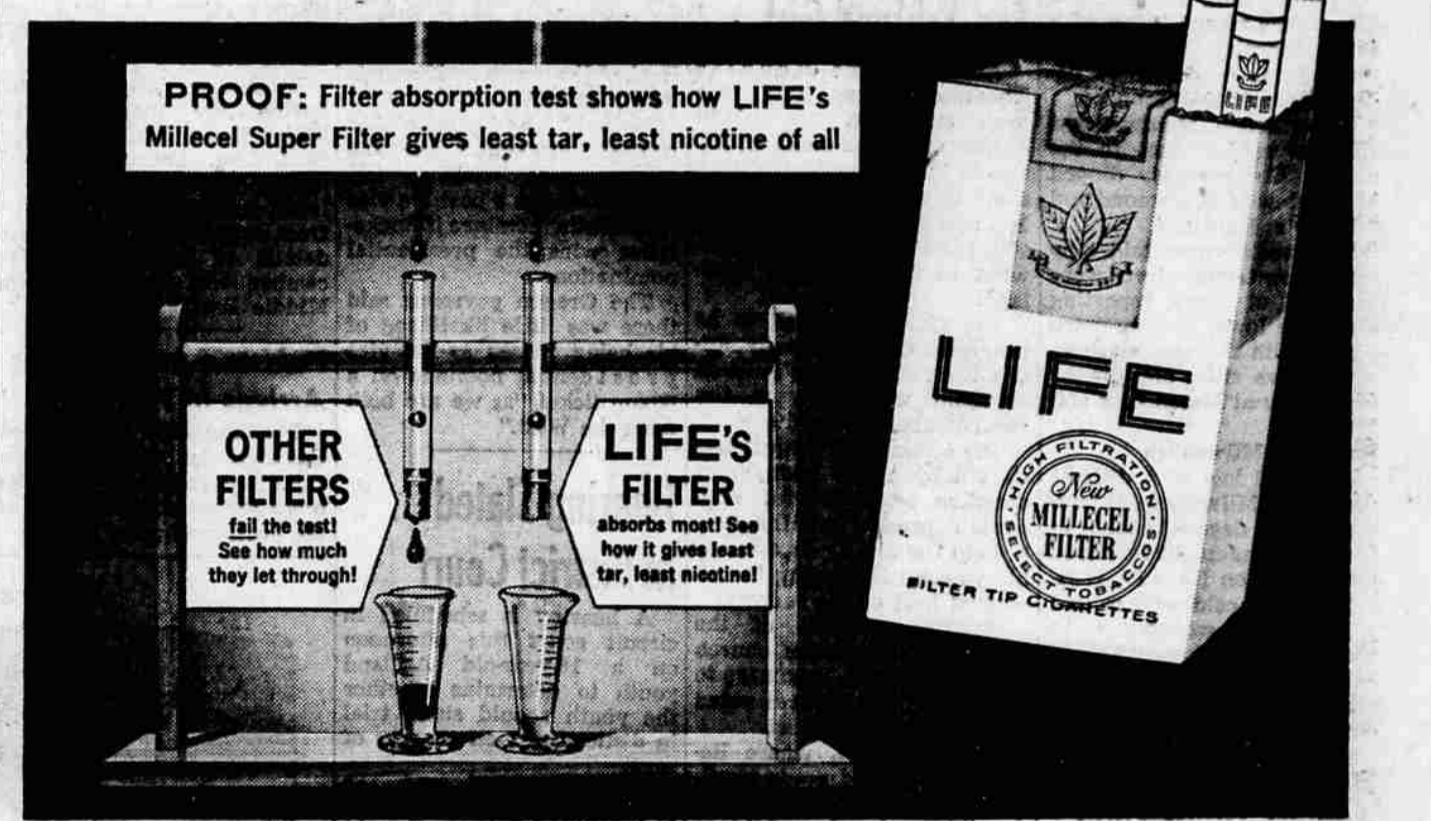

Continued Cold Weather Expected

Washington — (UPI) — The Weather Bureau predicted today that the nation would be lashed with continued wintry weather during the next 30 days with "only transitory periods of warmth."

In its regular 30-day forecast, the bureau said temperatures would average below seasonal normals in the area between the Appalachians and the Continental Divide.

The coldest weather was expected in the central and northern plains. Above normal temperatures were predicted in the far Southwest and the Atlantic coastal strip.

Precipitation was expected to exceed normal over the eastern one-third of the nation, the northern plains, the far Southwest, and the central and southern West Coast. All other areas would record near normal amounts except for subnormal precipitation over the Pacific Northwest, the bureau predicted.
