Bay Area Gridder Touted to Pros

San Francisco—UPI—Jimmy Sochor, a tiny bundle of dynamite on the football field for undefeated (10-0) San Francisco State College, is being touted to the professional camps by his coach, Joe Verducci.

"He is the finest all-around back we know," says Verducci. "I certainly hope somebody gives him a chance."

But if Sochor, a quarterback, makes the grade, it will be a miracle. He stands only 5-8 and weighs, at the most, 150 pounds.

"You might call him the Eddie LeBaron of a later decade," says Verducci.

Top Quarterback
Sochor is a fine passer, with a four-year record of 134 completions out of 271 attempts for 2,008 yards. He is a fine signal caller, who has led his team to four straight Far Western Conference championships. He is the leading punter on the team.

"But if nobody wants him as a quarterback," says assistant coach Vic Rowe, "I certainly wish they would give him a chance as a defensive back."

"He is a deadly tackler with very sure hands. Some of the pro scouts already have told me that he would get killed the first time he tried to tackle a man like Jimmy Brown of the Cleveland Browns. But I certainly wish they would give him a chance."

This year Sochor passed for eight touchdowns. He completed 54 tosses out of 106 for 916 yards. He had seven interceptions.

Knows Game Inside Out
"He is an intelligent fellow who runs the team real well and who knows the game of football inside-out," says Verducci.

"Everybody thought LeBaron was too small for professional football. I think they are about the same height. LeBaron has been a wonderful man for many seasons for the Washington Redskins."

"It is possible that someone will pick up a gem in Sochor, too."

Verducci scouts for the Chicago Bears in the San Francisco area. It is possible that young Jimmy may get a shot with the Monsters of the Midway in 1960.

That's if, of course, owner George Halas will listen to his own scout.

Stanford Man Leads Offensively

San Francisco—UPI—Dick Norman, Stanford's passing whiz, gained 237 yards in the air and 49 on the ground against Oregon State on Saturday to boost his Big Five total offensive leadership.

Norman now has a total offensive record of 1642 yards this season. He also has passed for 10 touchdowns.

Jerry Traynham of USC retained his lead in the rushing department with 491 yards total; Chris Buford of Stanford still is tops in receiving with 49 catches for 635 yards; and Bill Kilmer of UCLA leads the punters with a 43-yard kicking average.

Skip Face of Stanford, who picked up 27 points against Oregon State, leads the scorers with 89 points.

When Medford high opposes South Salem on Friday in state A-1 grid semifinals, it will be a repeat engagement of early season foes. The Black Tornado won that early October conflict 39 to 6. But, if the forthcoming encounter is anything like the repeat with Marshfield, Medford will have a struggle on its hands. While it is hardly worth retelling, the Tornado had a close call last Friday in contrast to its convincing September pasting of the Pirates.

PASSING PROVIDED BIG MARGIN

The Tornadoes certainly will work for sharper play this time against South Salem's Saxons. Coach Fred Spiegelberg pointed to ragged play after the non-counting fracas despite the lopsided score and pointed out that "passing broke it open." And, aerials did account for Medford's substantial margin. Eight Medford passes were thrown and, of the five completed, four went for touchdowns. Our previous story said that Medford never was in serious trouble. But, it could have been if passing hadn't clicked.

LESSON TO HEART
Lee Gustafson, South Salem coach, had high praise for the hard charging brand of football played by Medford in the previous session here. At the same time he was unhappy with his own club's efforts for the night. Doubtless, he has used the tussle as an object lesson for the Saxons have been going strong ever since. The Black Tornado will have the chore of seeing that the lesson doesn't backfire.

Since leaving Medford with a 2-2 record, South Salem has won six straight and stands 8-2 for the season. Next foe after Medford was Sweet Home which was trampled 32 to 0. Then, the Saxons smothered Lebanon 45 to 10. Corvallis 47 to 0 and North Eugene 41 to 0. They had it tougher in a second game against North Salem, 24 to 13, and displayed fine comeback power by spotting Pendleton a touchdown then winning 27 to 7.

Junior Rose Bowl To Pick Opponents

Pasadena, Calif.—UPI—Teams to play in the 14th annual Junior Rose Bowl football game Dec. 12 will be selected Sunday.

Hank Ives, game chairman of the sponsoring Pasadena Junior Chamber of Commerce, made announcement of the move up in dates Monday.

The selections originally were due Nov. 29, but Ives said Bakersfield JC of the Metropolitan Conference has bolted so far ahead of other California teams that it definitely would get the nod to represent the "West" in the annual classic.

Leading in the race for the Eastern representative were Del Mar, Tex., and Kilgore, Tex., both with six wins each. Others named by Ives as still in contention were Pearl River, Miss.; Wenatchee, Wash.; Otero, Colo.; Garden City, Kan.; and Phoenix, Ariz.

Giants' Man Top Rookie Of the Year

Boston—UPI—The San Francisco Giants' first baseman Willie McCovey today was named the 1959 National League Rookie of the Year by unanimous vote of the Baseball Writers Association of America.

McCovey needed only part of the season to bring the top rookie honors to the Giants for the second consecutive year. Ironically it was the man he bumped from the first base position, Orlando Cepeda, who won the 1958 laurels.

The 21-year-old McCovey hit .356 after joining the Giants last July 13. In 52 games he was at bat 191 times, racking up 68 hits including 13 home runs, five triples and nine doubles.

The baseball writers, three from each National League city, gave all 24 votes to McCovey, according to the announcements here by the association secretary Hy Hurwitz, a Boston Globe sports writer. Balloting was conducted by mail.

The writers will name the American League Rookie of the Year Thursday.

Ducks Holding Heavy Drills

Eugene, Ore.—UPI—Coach Len Casanova of Oregon, with an eye still on the Rose Bowl, scheduled a lengthy practice session today as the Ducks opened heavy drills for their annual intra-state battle with Oregon State.

The Ducks can still make it to the Rose Bowl if they beat OSC this Saturday and Washington loses to Washington State. Oregon has lost only one game this year, a 13-12 squeaker to Washington.

SUN BOWL HOSTS

El Paso, Tex.—UPI—New Mexico State's Aggies, who played in the first Sun Bowl game 24 years ago and haven't been back since, have been named the host team for the Dec. 31 football classic.

Selection committee officials have not as yet named the visiting team but it is expected to be picked from among unbeaten Bowling Green (9-0), Virginia Military (7-1-1), North Texas State (6-1) and Colorado State (6-3).

The Aggies have won five of eight games this fall with two more to go—against West Texas and the University of Mexico.

Berkeley, Calif.—UPI—Coach Pete Elliott of California said today that both tackle Frank Sally and quarterback Larry Parque would be ready for action against Stanford this Saturday.

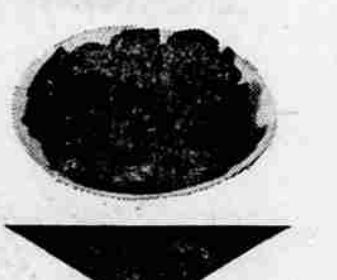
