

Baltimore Favored Over Forty-Niners

 The Baltimore Colts, defending National Football league champions, are favored to tie the San Francisco Forty-Niners for the Western division lead when they clash in Sunday's top game.

The Colts (5-2) trail the Forty-Niners (6-2) by a game and are seven-point favorites to whip the California club in Baltimore's Memorial Stadium before a sellout crowd of 55,557.

The New York Giants and Cleveland Browns, tied for the Eastern Division lead with 6-2 records, and the Philadelphia Eagles (5-3) are favored in the other key games. New York is a 5½ point choice to down the Chicago Cardinals (2-6) at Minneapolis and the Browns are nine-point favorites to defeat the Pittsburgh Steelers (3-4-1) at Cleveland. The Eagles entertain the Los Angeles Rams (2-6) and are favored by 3½ points.

In the other games, the Chicago Bears (4-4) are favored over the Lions (2-5-1) by five points at Detroit and the Packers (3-5) are four-point choices to defeat the Washington Redskins (3-5) at Green Bay.

Four Games Remain
 Each of the 12 teams has four more regular-season games.

The Forty-Niners are halfway through a tough, four-game road trip. They lifted their Western lead to two games by winning at Los Angeles but the margin dropped to one when they lost a 14-3 decision to the Bears last Sunday at Chicago. After playing at Baltimore, the Forty-Niners end their road swing at Cleveland.

If they win at Baltimore, the Forty-Niners will assure themselves of at least a one-game lead going into their final two home games against the Colts and Packers. Hawaii Needs Adequate Stadium To Succeed As Big Loop Baseball Site

Honolulu —(UPI)— There are several places in the United States today, including Hawaii, anxious to get a major league baseball team of their own.

Few will succeed and the reason in all cases probably will be the same. No stadium or one that is inadequate. Professional baseball, no matter how well it is played on the field, will succeed in the long run only if you have a stadium built for baseball where you can hear the crack of the bat when it hits a ball and where the spectator view is angled to give him the best look possible at the diamond.

Honolulu Stadium is a case in point. It is primarily a football field and the crowd-pleasing points of baseball are mainly lost in it.

Hawaii Growing State
 Hawaii with 600,000 population plus military personnel and still growing, probably has as good a chance as many other bidding towns for a berth eventually in either a new major league as the Continental, or in an expansion of the two existing major leagues. There is little doubt that one way or the other baseball player material here which has remained virtually untapped so far by the major leagues, and distance no longer is a problem with the coming of jet aircraft gobbling up the 2,000-plus miles between the islands and the mainland.

Requires Much Money
 It will take a lot of money to build the proper ballpark—our new stadium area in St. Louis will cost an ultimate 80 million dollars, with at least 22 million of it spent for baseball. But ask any city that has lost a major league franchise, and I'm sure they will tell you how much they miss it and how little they realized how much baseball means to a community in many ways.

Major league baseball might come to Hawaii. But I doubt if the islands will ever become a serious contender as a spring training site. It takes a special kind of stamina to train into shape in this climate, and a player finds he works up into a sweat too fast and then is cooled off just as fast by those wonderful trade-winds. It's great for relaxing but rough on muscle toning unless you are used to it.

Scholar Athlete Awards Given
 New York —(UPI)— Star half-back Gerhard Ger Schwedes of Syracuse's bowl-bound team and seven other senior football players who plan on pursuing graduate studies were named today as winners of the National Football foundation's scholar-athlete awards, plus \$500 scholarships for post-graduate work.

The foundation will honor the athletes at a dinner here Tuesday, Dec. 1. The awards carry with them \$500 Earl Blaik scholarships for post graduate work.

One recipient was named for each of the eight geographical NCAA districts. In addition to Schwedes, others honored were fullback Paul Choquette of Brown, fullback Neyle Sollee of Tennessee, guard Pat Smyth of California, guard Maurice Dokes of Texas, tackle Philip Roos of Ohio Wesleyan, tackle Donald Newell of California, and quarterback Harry Tolly of Nebraska.

Schwartzwalder, in his 11th season at Syracuse after three years at Muhlenberg and several at various high schools, has no doubt that this club is the best he ever has coached.

"In the past we've had some outstanding boys but we were never so strong right across the board," he said.

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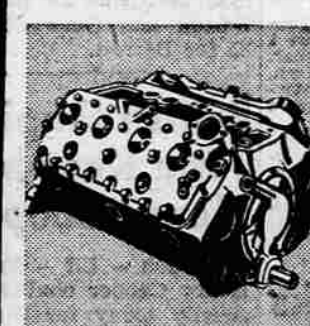
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
