Huskies Picked By Seven Over Cougar Eleven

New York—UPI—Wisconsin, Washington and Kansas will clinch bowl berths Saturday by winning their showdown games against old rivals, the odds makers predicted today.

Wisconsin is a seven-point choice to beat Minnesota and can wrap up the Big Ten bid to the Rose Bowl if Illinois downs favored Northwestern; Washington is also a seven-point favorite to clinch the West Coast berth in the Rose Bowl by beating Washington State, and Kansas is a four-point favorite over Missouri in their Big Eight conference match.

The winner of the Kansas-Missouri game will represent their conference in the Orange Bowl, provided bowl-ineligible Oklahoma a 13-point favorite downs Iowa State.

Southern California is a nine-point favorite over nine-point favorite over UCLA. Iowa is 14 over Notre Dame, Yale is 6 over Harvard, and Penn State is 7 over Pittsburgh in other major clashes between old rivals.

Chualvo Checks Bid by Durelle

Toronto—UPI—Yvon Durelle, Canada's "fighting fisherman," apparently has reached the end of boxing's glory road.

Knocked out twice by world light heavyweight champion Archie Moore in title fights during the last year, Durelle tried to wrest the Canadian heavyweight crown from George Chuvalto Tuesday night at Maple Leaf Gardens.

It was a bad mismatch for the fisherman. Chuvalto floored Durelle six times before finally putting his opponent away for good at 1:01 of the 12th and final round. At the finish, blood was spurting from Durelle's nose and from a deep gash under his right eye.

Durelle, former Canadian and British Empire light heavyweight champion, weighed 186 1/2 pounds. Chuvalto scaled 210.

Bob Pettit Concedes Point Race

New York—UPI—Bob Pettit, who set an all-time National Basketball association scoring record last season, today counted himself out of the 1959-60 race which he predicted will be a three-cornered battle among Wilt Chamberlain, Elgin Baylor and Jack Twyman.

"I think all three of them will average more than 30 points a game for the season and easily break my record," said the St. Louis Hawks star who played his college ball at Louisiana State university. "I just can't see myself beating any one of them. I think I reached my limit last season."

Pettit, a 6-foot, 9-inch, 218-pounder with a velvety touch around the basket, averaged 29.2 points a game and scored 2,015 points last season—both records—but has averaged "only" 24.5 points in the Hawks' first eight games this year. He was held to a mere 11 points as the New York Knickerbockers beat the Hawks, 105-97, Tuesday night.

Nats Beat Royals
The Syracuse Nationals overcame a 38-point performance by Jack Twyman to down the Cincinnati Royals, 121-116, and the Boston Celtics scored a 132-129 double-overtime victory over the Detroit Pistons in the other games Tuesday night. The victory was the Celtics' 11th in 12 games.

Chamberlain currently is averaging 37.1 points for the Philadelphia Warriors, Baylor 34.3 for the Minneapolis Lakers and Twyman 34.7 for the Royals and Pettit thinks they'll be that close at the end of the season.

The Knicks, who snapped a five-game losing streak, gained early 17-3 and 21-5 leads and held several leads better than 20 points in an easy win. Only an eye-popping shooting exhibition by Clyde Lovellette in the fourth period made the score close.

Ken Sears scored 25 points and Richie Guerin 19 for the Knicks. The Nationals were led by Adolph Schayes' 30 points by four other players while Sam Jones scored six points in the second overtime to spark the Celtics. Jones and Bill Sharman each had 28 points for Boston and Gene Shue had 35 for Detroit.

British Empire Title Kept by Henry Cooper

London—UPI—England's Henry Cooper challenged officially today for the world heavyweight crown, after keeping his British Isles and British Empire titles by stopping Joe Erskine of Wales in the 12th round before 18,000 at Earls Court arena.

Their scheduled 15-round Tuesday night had been advertised as "the final eliminator for the heavyweight championship of the world, with approval of the British Boxing Board of Control."

Because of the confusion in the United States over the return of Johansson-Floyd Patterson fight, Cooper and some British officials believe there is an excellent chance of a Johansson-Cooper fight at London or Stockholm, Sweden, next summer.

An archery division in Medford Rifle and Pistol club has been started.

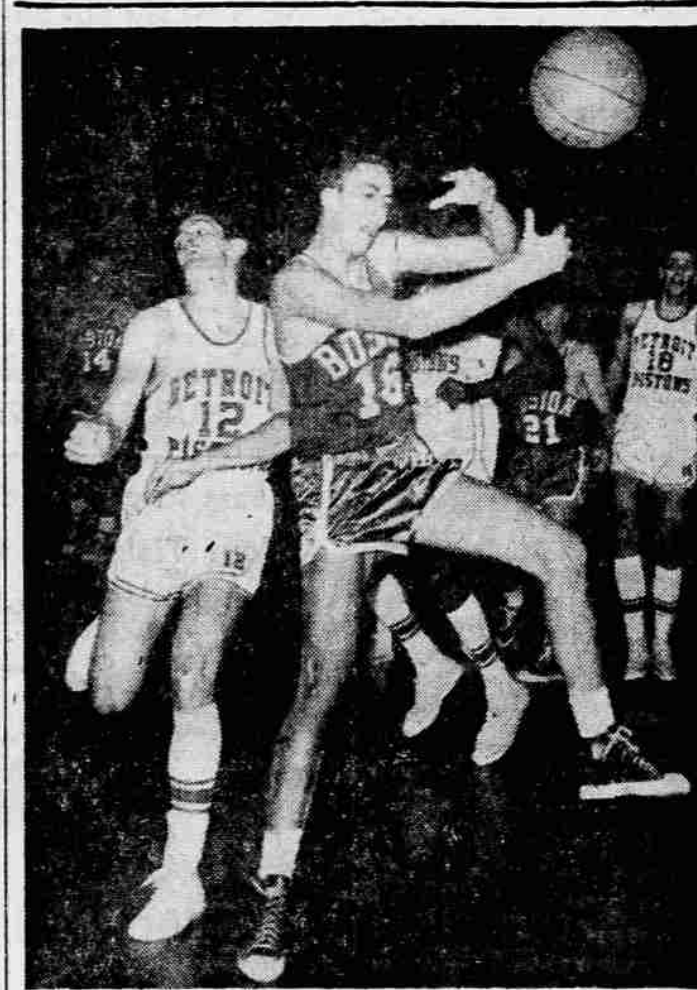
The club range on Vilas rd. west of the Crater Lake highway Four Corners will be open for archery on Thursday and Saturday nights from 7 to 10 p.m.

Sen. Neuberger 'Man of Hope'

Los Angeles—UPI—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) Tuesday night was named 1960 "Man of Hope" at an awards banquet here. The award was given by the City of Hope, a national group devoted to furthering medical research.

A research fellowship will be established in his name. In accepting the award, Sen. Neuberger said that loss of life by major diseases dictates the need for massive efforts to find cures.

Neuberger, who has introduced legislation which would provide \$500 million in federal funds for cancer research, cited figures showing that private and government funds available annually for cancer research total less than \$150 million, while the U.S. spend \$6 billion per year on tobacco products, \$9 billion on liquor and \$2 billion on jewelry.

Two Arrested for Albany Burglary

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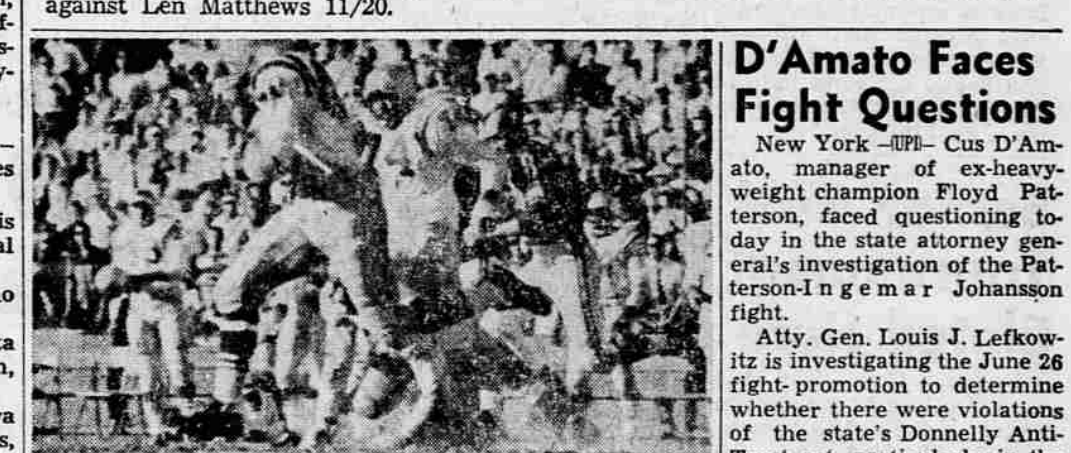

D'Amato Faces Fight Questions

New York—UPI—Cus D'Amato, manager of ex-heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson, faced questioning today in the state attorney general's investigation of the Patterson-Ingemar Johansson fight.

Atty. Gen. Louis J. Lefkowitz is investigating the June 26 fight-promotion to determine whether there were violations of the state's Donnelly Anti-Trust act, particularly in the sale of rights to TV, movies and radio.

Meanwhile, mobster Tony (Fats) Salerno of Harlem finally has been found at Miami Beach, and Dist. Atty. Frank Hogan of New York is trying to bring him back for testimony about the June fight before a New York County grand jury.

Salerno is alleged to have been an undercover financial backer of the promotion.

Portland Area Employment Down

Portland—UPI—The State Employment Department of office here reported today a decrease in total employment in the Portland metropolitan area of 8,200 the past month.
