Michael Rabin To Be Soloist With Orchestra

Portland - Michael Rabin, 23-year-old violin virtuoso, will make his first appearance in Portland on November 23 and 24 when he plays two concerts with the Portland Symphony Orchestra, with Piero Bellugi conducting.

A nationally and world-known artist since he was 13, young Rabin has appeared with the New York Philharmonic 63 times, and in the course of his current tour will appear with 10 major symphony orchestras, including Boston, Chicago, Cleveland, Philadelphia and San Francisco.

Popular as a recording artist, he has interpreted much of the major violin repertoire on leading labels; in fact, two works by Saint-Saens which he will play in Portland - "Introduction and Rondo Capriccioso" and "Havannaise" are among the classical best sellers. His major work with the symphony will be Mozart's violin concerto No. 4.

Rabin is a personable young American whose father has been a violinist with the New York Philharmonic for over 30 years, and whose pianist mother was a faculty member at Juilliard. He has such typical interests as photography, sports cars and home-built hi-fi.

The orchestra will open the concert with Handel's Concerto Grosso No. 10, commemorating the 200th anniversary of that composer's death, and conclude with Milhaud's "Second Symphonic Suite" drawn from the incidental music to the play, "Protee." Both works are first performances in Portland.

The Monday concert will be at The Auditorium; Tuesday's repeat performance at the Oriental Theatre. The J. K. Gill box office opens November 19, with the Symphony office in the Park building accepting advance reservations.

Explaining the classes for the mentally retarded child, Mr. Hayes said each one must be at least two years below normal to qualify for admission into the class, and said that there will be an increasing number of these children in the public schools in the near future.

Mr. Hayes pointed out that such persons encounter trouble in finding employment when they reach an employable age, but added that many are capable of performing work which does not require a great deal of skill.

He said that the cost of educating the mentally retarded child is almost twice that of a normal child, and the caliber of the teacher must be very high. There are now three such classes in the county.
