FCC Inquiry Into TV Evils Seen as Slow Motion Affair

Washington — (UPI) — Chairman John C. Doerfer has indicated that the Federal Communications Commission's inquiry into television evils uncovered by congressional investigators will be a slow-motion affair.

Doerfer told United Press International it probably will require more than a year for the commission to get a complete picture of the TV quiz show scandal and all that it implies.

He said he was doubtful the FCC could begin hearings, the first step in its broadened new inquiry into network practices, before the end of the year.

Action Seen Likely He also said it was unlikely the commissioners would arrive at conclusions about the need for new legislation in time to present them to next year's session of congress.

But Doerfer and other FCC members questioned did not rule out the possibility that some action might be taken against the networks and individual stations if the investigation turns up evidence that they have violated existing laws.

The commission announced

that the new inquiry would be aimed at determining just what powers it has or might seek over the programming and advertising policies of the radio and television stations.

It said the investigation would cover the quiz show frauds, "Payola" (the accepting of bribes by disc jockeys to play a particular record) and "offensive commercials" and other broadcast practices contrary to the public interest.

To Map Strategy Doerfer said the seven members of the commission would first have to meet to map strategy for the investigation. Two of its seven members are out of the country attending an international radio conference in Switzerland and are not expected home for a couple of weeks.

Then, Doerfer said, extensive preparations would have to be made for the public hearings to be held before the full commission. He said the commission would call up as witnesses the networks, legal and communications experts, civic and religious leaders, advertisers and show business talent.

He said the commission would try not to duplicate the congressional hearings, but added that it might be necessary to call in a few of the same witnesses where there were "controversial issues of fact."

Not Shared By All Doerfer's go-slow approach is not shared by all of the other members of the commission. But they all agree that the commission has taken on a giant task which will necessarily be drawn-out because of its own rules of procedure.

The commissioners also argue they want to avoid any action which might look like censorship. "We want no part of censorship," said commissioner Robert E. Lee, who has advocated a more aggressive attitude by the FCC in combatting undesirable network practices.

Under present budgetary limits, the commission does not expect to add substantially to its staff in making

the new study. But it plans to take some staff members away from other jobs to work on the project.
