

# Khrushchev Boasts of Russ Rocket Stockpile

Moscow — (UPI) — Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev said in a speech made public Tuesday night that the Soviet Union's stockpile of rockets and hydrogen and atomic warheads could wipe "all our potential enemies" off the face of the earth.

He told Soviet journalists that he visited one factory where 250 rockets with hydrogen warheads were turned out "on an assembly line basis within a year."

Khrushchev's speech to the newsmen in the Kremlin last Saturday was released by the official Soviet news agency Tass Tuesday night.

While stressing the "invincible might" of the Soviet

armed forces, Khrushchev reiterated his appeal for total disarmament.

Khrushchev noted progress in Soviet-Western relations.

As for his talks with President Eisenhower at Camp David, Khrushchev said he told Eisenhower "his position differed from mine."

"I was authorized by the Soviet government, in conformity with the desire of our people, to sign immediately an agreement on disarmament, on the discontinuation of arms production and on their destruction," Khrushchev said.

"I believe the President also wants this, but apparently he cannot do it because

there are still strong quarters in the U.S.A. opposing disarmament. We must not be deceived in this respect."

Khrushchev criticized Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York for a recent speech the premier said "expressed the desire on the part of definite circles to turn back the pointer of the barometer which is tending toward the lessening of international tensions from 'rain' to 'fair' and which the exponents of the cold war are pushing in a different direction."

"But Messrs. Imperialists, if you try to return to the position of the cold war, Rockefeller will not save you just as the late U. S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles could not save you . . ."

Khrushchev said.

## Scholarships For Rural HS Students

Seniors graduating from rural area high schools, and planning to attend an Oregon college or university, are being offered a scholarship opportunity by the Oregon Council of Churches and the Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

Two scholarships, offered to all seniors irrespective of race, color, or creed, will be based on essays written on themes that present the values and opportunities of rural life and vocation. The essays, between 2,000 and 3,000 words, must be original, and the application approved by the school principal.

The Council of Churches hopes, through this essay contest, to encourage rural high school students to consider the values of rural life and the many vocations open to them in the rural setting. It is also designed to encourage rural high school students to seek higher education in Oregon institutions of learning.

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## No Progress in Newspaper Strike

Portland — (UPI) — Federal Mediator Elmer Williams planned today to hold separate meetings with both sides in Portland's newspaper strike to try to arrive at some basis for resuming joint negotiations.

"No progress" was Williams' report after a two-hour meeting Tuesday attended by both representatives of the striking Stereotypers union and of the Oregonian and Oregon Journal.

Williams said the next joint meeting was subject to call. "I intend to talk separately with both parties between now and the next meeting," he said. There was no indication when the next session would be held.

The striking union, in a one-page sheet distributed on Tuesday, charged that the newspapers were importing highly paid "professional strikebreakers." The union also said some Portland firms were canceling advertising during the strike and that "thousands of union families" were canceling subscriptions.

In a front page editorial today, management charged "the current flood of rumors generated by the Portland Stereotypers union strike is as wild as that which followed upon the Vanport flood of 1948. Then it was said that boxcars loaded with corpses were wheeling out of Portland under cloak of night."

The newspaper charged that the present crop of rumors flow from "the false thesis" that (1) "the newspaper unions were deliberately pushed into the strike," and (2) the strike was incited to "pave the way for the Oregonian to take over the Journal."

## Former Teamster Member Indicted on Charges of Perjury

Washington — (UPI) — A federal Grand Jury indicted a former Teamsters Union member for perjury today, charging he falsely denied taking payoffs from a trucking employer to preserve labor peace.

The eight-count indictment was returned here against Edward F. Weinheimer of the Bronx, N.Y.

The indictment charged that Weinheimer falsely denied to the Grand Jury that he received cash payments totaling \$2,000 during August and September, 1957, from his employer, Exhibitors Service Co., Inc., of McKees Rocks, Pa., a trucking firm.

The indictment charged that just before the alleged cash payments, Weinheimer admitted conferring with Teamsters President James R. Hoffa who at the time was a vice president of the union, and with Robert (Barney) Baker, a representative of the Central Conference of Teamsters.

Barney was indicted last Sept. 21 by a federal Grand Jury in Pittsburgh on charges of accepting money from Exhibitors Service Co. in violation of the Taft-Hartley Act. Baker's case is awaiting trial.

Today's indictment said the purpose of Weinheimer's meetings with the teamster officials was to seek the intervention of Hoffa and Baker in a jurisdiction labor dispute and to call off an imminent strike by a Pittsburgh teamsters local against the firm.

The Grand Jury had been conducting an investigation to determine whether Exhibitors Service Co. correctly explained certain payments in its reports filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The perjury charges against Weinheimer were based on his testimony of Aug. 28, Sept. 2 and Sept. 3.
