Tissue Banks

Dr. Nicholas G. Georgiade, speaking in London before the International Congress of Plastic Surgeons, reported that he had used for successful skin grafting the skin of a dog which had been kept in a special solution at a temperature of -49 degrees F. for 1,480 days. This is a record. He has found ways, also, of keeping for four months corneal tissue from the eye. If confirmed, this will represent a tremendous advance, because soon the eye surgeon who wants to make a window in a badly scarred cornea will not have to wait for a donor to die. It is to be hoped that some day there will be banks for human skin so that anyone badly burned can quickly be skin-grafted, also, it is to be hoped that in the cornea banks for the blind, the corneas can be preserved and kept a while.

In a splendid report from the Veterans Administration Armed Forces conference, Dr. Emil Rothstein said that the anti-tuberculous effect of Isoniazid is so great that its use is indicated in every case in which tubercle bacilli are found. Often it doesn't help to add other drugs, but in the presence of cavities in the lungs it helps to add streptomycin or a drug called PAS. ACTH and cortisone-like drugs do not seem to help much. There are some new drugs which are now being studied. Two of them help in some cases.

Arteriosclerosis and Eggs
Many people with hardening of the arteries are confused because some of their doctors say, "Don't touch eggs, because they contain cholesterol," while others say, "Don't worry; an egg a day won't hurt you." Many experts agree that it is useless to put people on a nearly cholesterol-free diet because so much of the cholesterol in our blood does not come from our diet; it is formed within our body. About all the experts agree on is that it is better to eat more vegetable oils, like corn oil, and less fat of animal origin. It is well not to eat large amounts of butter and cream and the fat of

Wall Street Chatter

New York—(UPI)—A great deal of stress is being placed on the point that Congress will immediately solve the steel dilemma should the strike remain unsettled by Jan. 26, notes E. F. Hutton & Co.

It points out that Congress blundered this year in not raising the statutory bond rate ceiling, and that if such important legislation could be denied, history might well repeat itself next year with some very costly delays.

The firm also notes that anti-labor legislation in a Democratic-controlled Congress in a presidential year may not be quickly forthcoming.

They shovel looks for a profitable fourth quarter after finishing the strike-ridden third quarter with a deficit.

Investors Research Co. notes: "The stock market is gauging prospective business conditions six to 12 months away and it is truly fortunate that a speculative flurry is not materializing at the moment."

A fast premature upmove based upon immediate news would be symptomatic of a market that was basically unsound and vulnerable to a steep setback.

Discussing McGregor-Donger as an investment, Reynolds & Co. notes that while the trend toward casual wear is a plus factor in the company's favor, the stock is attractive primarily for its good return.
