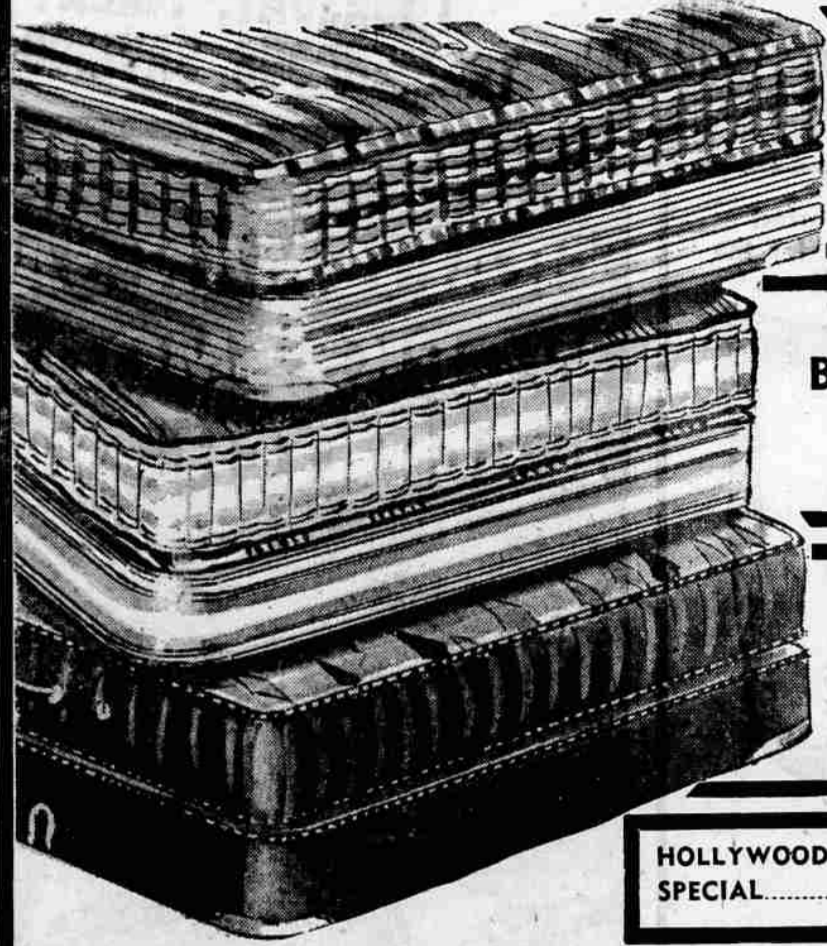
Urging full-scale efforts to combat cancer, he declared, "this country is attempting to fight cancer with less than half of what we spend annually on permanent waves."
