George Johns, principal of Central Point schools, announced that the total enrollment at Central Point Elementary and Junior High school is more than 900 students. Present enrollment is 914 compared to 820 last year. Enrollment in the junior high school is 299. The seventh grade, with 166 students is the largest class in grades three to eight.

Johns noted that daily lunch participation in the school cafeteria reflects the increased enrollment. Students eating daily in the cafeteria number nearly 500. This number exceeds last year's participation by 100 students, he said. Students who bring sack lunches eat in the junior high library or in classrooms.

The fifth and sixth grade chorus, under the direction of Mrs. Joanne Sousa, will make its first appearance Dec. 3 as a part of the evening's entertainment provided after the annual Parent Teachers association's chili dinner. The 110-piece band, under the direction of Harry Meyers, will also make its first concert appearance of the season the same evening. The band is made up of sixth, seventh and eighth grade students. A beginning band of 83 fifth grade students has been organized by Meyers and forms the largest group of fifth grade students to start band at this school.

A special group of interested band students have been organized by Meyer again this year to play at basketball

games and school assemblies. This pep band has 30 members.

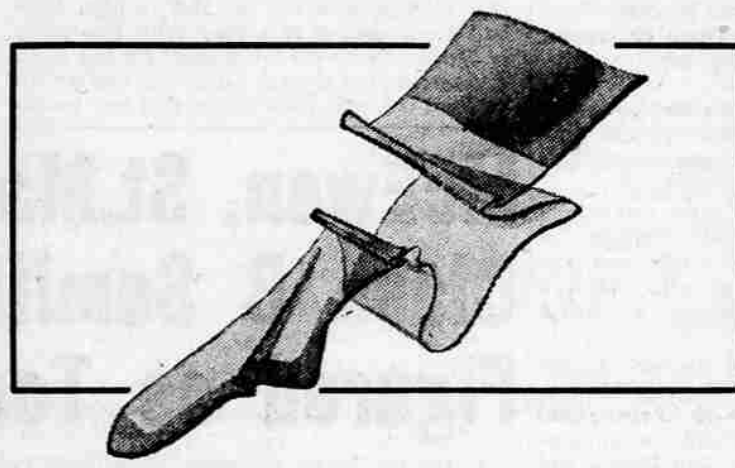
