

Holiday Food Said Plentiful

Washington—(UPI)—As Thanksgiving approaches, almost all the holiday favorites are to be found among the top values offered this week-end.

There are plenty of Thanksgiving turkeys this year. Also, for those who prefer pork, there are plentiful supplies of loins, chops, and hams. Lamb and beef are also being offered at good buys. Poultry and eggs continue to be good buys.

Most of the customary trimmings are also ample for the holiday demand. Among the plentiful at the vegetable bins are sweet potatoes, carrots, onions, potatoes, cauliflower, and salad greens. Good supplies of apples, grapes, oranges, pears, bananas, grapefruit, and avocados add to the good buys in fruit.

In fish, the best values this week-end are shrimp, fish sticks and portions, and canned tuna. These are the week-end's best values, nationally. Now, here is a closer look at plentiful foods in the West. Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming:

Ample supplies of pork, beef, eggs, poultry, apples, oranges and grapefruit will be found in most Pacific Coast markets this week. A number of pork cuts are priced 1 to 3 cents a pound lower this week.

In the northwest and San Francisco areas, some cuts of beef are 1 to 2 cents a pound lower. Supplies of eggs continue ample with prices about unchanged. Ready-to-cook turkeys, and fryer and hen chickens are in plentiful supply for holiday menus. Lamb, calf and veal supplies are ample for the demand, and unchanged in price. Butter prices are unchanged.

Fruit and vegetable plentiful include apples, avocados, navel oranges, grapefruit, emperor grapes, cabbage, carrots, potatoes, lettuce and tomatoes. In good supply are pears, celery, corn, dry onions, squash and sweet potatoes.

Best buys in fish include salmon, cod, rockfish, flounder, sablefish, and halibut.

Teacher Maxine showed up for a meeting of the Culture Vultures the other night with a thick book under one arm. The title sounded a bit overwhelming, "Addresses and Proceedings" of the 1959 convention of National Education association. A lot of ideas are thrown into the hopper at these huge NEA meetings, and at the session last summer, some of the most interesting ones were contributed by Charles Habib Malik, president of the General Assembly of the United Nations.

Teacher Maxine read Mr. Malik's speech to the NEA and Mr. Malik says communism is "Western," "as western as Christian missionaries." And that the cold war "appears (to the Eastern nations) as a family quarrel within the western community." The UN president, a native of Lebanon, took "America and the East" as his topic and here's what he said in one paragraph:

"I want tonight to turn your attention to the theme of America and the East. Communism is an international revolutionary movement. But it arose last century at the heart of European civilization, deriving its theoretical roots from British industrialism, French materialism and revolutionism and German idealism, and finding its first historical embodiment in 1917 in Russia, whose predominant Europeanism is modulated on the one hand by the Slavic character and tinged on the other with significant Asian strains.

"Communism thus is an internal European revolutionary movement; it is an inner upheaval within the European idea. It could not have possibly arisen in the heart of Asia or Africa. When therefore people refer to communism as 'the East' they are using a misnomer. The East could no more have thought of communism than the West could of totemism or of nirvana. To the unadulterated East, communism is as western as the Christian missionaries or the automobile dealers from Detroit.

"The cold war therefore appears as a family quarrel within the western community. This equal alienness of communism and westernism accounts to a large extent for the phenomenon of neutralism in Asia and Africa. In fact on the spiritual level it is simply another name for it."

Mr. Malik's entire speech is an arresting one. He went on to say that the West faces two challenges—communism and the East—that the "West can no longer take the East for granted."

versally recognized" and "that every people in Asia and Africa is now destined sooner or later to achieve self-determination and independence." He declared that in this movement the United Nations is playing a beneficent role and that "you can be sure we would have had far greater turbulence and anarchy in the two continents were it not for the midwifery of the United Nations."

The president of the United Nations talked some of the role of the United States, said country after country has been encouraged by the U.S., but pointed out that great variance in the standards of living in the world (they are at a ratio of 30 to 1 when one compares the United States with the countries of Asia and Africa) "generates tensions and pressures which the wise cannot fail to anticipate and do something about."

"The real challenge of the East is neither in the political nor in the economic sphere," said the UN president. "The real challenge is in the domain of the spirit."
