## Bodi Files Motion To Seek Freedom

Corvallis—UPI—Wayne Bodi, 20, now serving a 10-year term in Oregon State Prison on a manslaughter conviction, has filed a motion in Benton County Circuit Court that could lead to at least temporary freedom pending a State Supreme Court appeal.

Bodi's motion asks that he be returned to custody of the Benton county sheriff pending the outcome of his appeal. If the motion is granted and he is returned here, he could get out by posting bail. Bodi was convicted Aug. 8 of slapping his 4-month-old daughter, causing her death. Bodi is a carpenter, partly crippled by polio.

## Two-Car Collision Kills Four People

Warren, Ohio—UPI—A two-car collision near this northeastern Ohio community Wednesday night killed four persons and injured three others.

The State Highway Patrol identified the dead as Dick Bassett, 20, Warren, and his brother, Donald, 17, and Glenn Hall, 27, Burghill, and George Arrio, 20, Gustavus. The injured were taken to Trumbull County Memorial hospital in Warren, where their condition was listed as "fair." The patrol said investigation has shown tentatively that Arrio was driving left of center.

## Soviet Attempt To Buy Blocked

Washington—UPI—The Commerce Department has blocked an effort by the Soviet Union to buy \$15,556,207 worth of American stainless steel.

The department said Wednesday night the applications were disapproved under regulations prohibiting shipment to Communist countries of materials having strategic value in wartime.

In addition to the stainless steel sheet, plate and tubing, the department turned down requests to ship Russia \$176,455 worth of chemicals, plastics and synthetic rubber.

The department would not identify the U.S. firms involved. Officials said they felt the export license requests indicated the Soviets were serious about doing business with the U.S. firms and were not merely putting out feelers to test possible changes in U.S. export controls.

## Judge Is Asked To Oust Hoffa

Washington—UPI—A federal judge has been asked to oust James R. Hoffa as president of the Teamster Union and bring him to trial on corruption charges.

The request was made Wednesday to U.S. District Court here by Godfrey P. Schmidt, attorney for 12 rank-and-file teamsters.

The group asked Federal Judge F. Dickinson Letts to name an impartial board of examiners to hear 164 charges of misconduct against Hoffa and report back on their verdict.

They said neither Hoffa nor the Teamsters' executive board had done anything about the charges which were filed with the court months ago.

They said "no reasonable hope of substantial reform of the Teamster movement can be entertained while James R. Hoffa and his cronies control the administration of the international organization."

The rebel group argued that the union's general executive board, which normally would try union officers accused of misconduct, was not capable of being impartial in Hoffa's case.

Board members are "stooges" of the Teamster chief and would "whitewash" any charges against him, the rank-and-file teamsters said. They charged that Hoffa conspired to rig his own election to the \$50,000-a-year union presidency.

## Washington Officials To Question Suspect

Vancouver, Wash.—UPI—Sheriff Clarence McKay of Clark county expected to go to Pendleton, Ore., today to question John Broderick, 33, a suspect in the slaying of a Camas Salesman.

A first degree murder charge was filed here Wednesday by the Clark county district attorney against Broderick. The district attorney's office said that if Broderick would not waive extradition, he would be returned to Clark county under Oregon-Washington reciprocal agreement.
