

Balmy Breezes Said Melting Cold War, Wishful Thinking

London - (UPI) - The winds that blow between East and West are so balmy and friendly these days that it is logical to ask whether the ice of the cold war is melting. There is even some feeling that peace for our time is going to be sealed, signed and handed down to the world from a summit in Switzerland some afternoon next spring.

Take it from the professionals - the diplomats whose job it is to sit down and bargain across the table with the Russians - this is wishful thinking. A United Press International survey of Western European capitals reflects no basis whatever for such optimism. When they talk with reporters off the record, the experts say they see no possibility of an immediate settlement of the cold war. What they think probably will come out of a summit meeting with the Russians are minor concessions on each side and an agreement to keep on negotiating.

But there are some surface facts which would seem to justify optimism. Twice in recent days the Communists have marched up to a showdown situation with the West, and both times they have retreated:

Reds Backtrack on Flags

1. The East German Communists said they were going to fly their flags along the elevated railways in West Berlin last week end to celebrate the anniversary of the Russian Revolution. Maj. Gen. Barksdale Hamlett, American commander in West Berlin, had a frank talk with the Soviet commander. Nobody tried to hoist any flags.

2. Dr. Otto Dibelius, Lutheran bishop of Berlin and Brandenburg believes no Christian can reconcile his conscience with a totalitarian government. He announced he was going into Communist Berlin and preach in the Marien Church on Nov. 1. The Communists threatened to bar him at the border. He went to East Berlin, preached to a congregation of 2,000,

and was cheered.

The same atmosphere prevails in Russia. Posters reading "The ice of the cold war is melting" appeared on Moscow buildings last week end at the anniversary celebration of the Russian Revolution. Khrushchev spoke well of Eisenhower, de Gaulle and Macmillan in his recent speech to the Supreme Soviet. He appears to be friendly with everybody in the West with the possible exception of the mayor of Los Angeles.

The current practice of heads of state to become modern Marco Polos and travel to far-away places in search of peace instead of silk is interpreted by many as a hopeful sign. Surely, they say, if there is so much activity some concrete result must be forthcoming.

Girl Has Reason To Buy the Ring

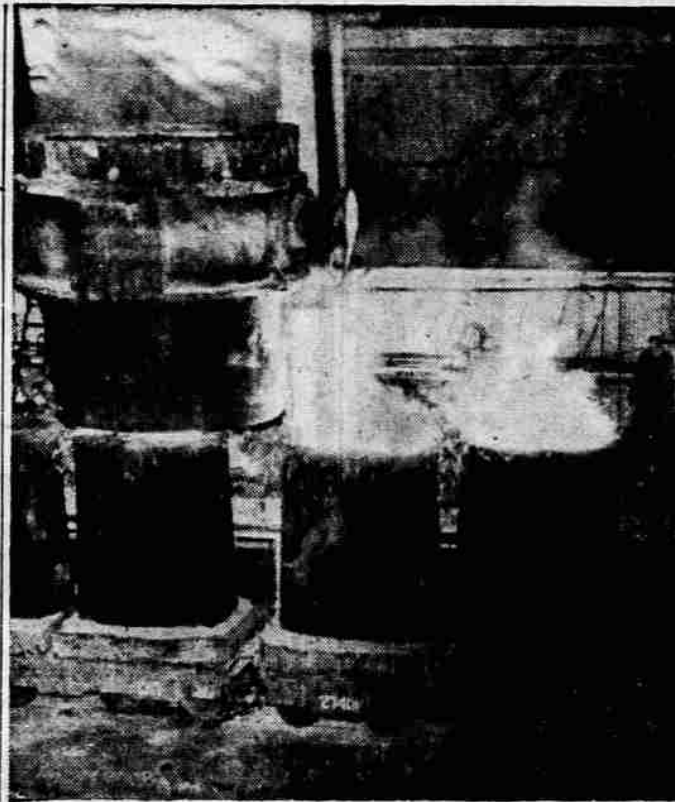
