Proposed Camp Health Code Explained to Area Farmers

Migrant farm labor camps in this area and other areas in the state may be run by the book, in the future, according to information presented at a public hearing on the farm labor camp health code here Tuesday.

The "book" will be a set of regulations established under health code if this code is incorporated into a bill and passed by the state legislature at its next session.

Dr. Ralph R. Sullivan, director of the occupational health section, state department of health, and James L. Agee, sanitation engineer and assistant director of the occupational health section, conducted the hearing here and in other areas of the state. Judging by their agenda they are only about half through.

Regulations General

The proposed regulations are considered general and not too specific by the two men, but seem to cover the ground pretty thoroughly. Sections cover the camp area, water supply, toilet, hand-washing, bathing and laundry facilities, sewage disposal and plumbing, garbage and refuse disposal, housing, food sanitation, communicable disease reporting, and operation and maintenance.

The section on camp area has been amended to specify "not adjacent farm land." This section states that the grounds and immediate premises surrounding the farm labor camp shall be maintained in a clean, sanitary condition, free from waste water, sewage and garbage.

Some sections, such as that under water supply are already law and do not need much explanation or discussion. So far, there have been no objections to most of this section.

Library Reborn In Philadelphia

Philadelphia - (Science Service) - Benjamin Franklin's Library has been reborn in a monumental hall housing the collections of books and manuscripts of the American Philosophical Society, founded in 1743.

Located near Independence Hall at the famous address of Fifth and Liberty, the modernized restoration of the fine Georgian building of Library Company of Philadelphia was dedicated recently. Costing more than \$2,000,000, the Library Hall has space for 300,000 volumes. It will provide a center for historical research, particularly relating to Franklin and his times, the American Revolution, the Lewis and Clark Expedition and memoirs of foreign academics.

The building is located in Independence National Historical Park upon land made available by Congress. A garden of the library is dedicated to Thomas Jefferson, third president of the society.

Dr. William E. Lingelbach, librarian emeritus, characterized the new research center as "a superb monument to Franklin and his confirmed faith in the force of ideas and their dissemination through books and libraries in promoting useful knowledge."

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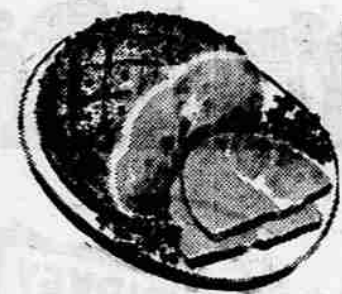


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
