## Information for Games Compiled

Washington (Science Service)—Weather and climate information for the Squaw Valley, Lake Tahoe, Calif., area where the 1960 Winter Olympics will be held next Feb. 18-28 has been compiled by the U.S. Weather Bureau here.

Squaw Valley lies just east of the ridge of the Sierra Nevada. It is about two and a half miles long and a quarter mile wide. Mountains rise abruptly from the valley floor, which is about 6,200 feet above sea level, to ridges of 7,000 to 8,000 feet in all directions.

The prevailing winds and highest winds are probably from the southwest. Temperatures show the wide variations typical of a high mountain valley, with the range between the mean temperature of the warmest month, July, and the coldest month, January, averaging 35 degrees. Highest temperature recorded at Squaw Valley is 90 and the lowest is 15 degrees below zero Fahrenheit.

Freezing temperatures, the Weather Bureau reports, can occur in every month of the year, thus restricting local gardening to the most hardy vegetables and flowers. Because of the protective winter snow covering, the ground usually does not freeze below the immediate surface.

Most of the precipitation falls as snow in the winter months. More than three-fourths of the annual average precipitation occurs in the five months from November through March.
