

Setback Doesn't Stop Farmer

Tustin, Mich. (UP) - William Oeverman Jr. is determined to keep up with the rigorous job of farming - and his favorite sport of hunting - despite a crippling setback.

The 36-year-old Oeverman has been a paraplegic for two years. His back was broken and he was permanently paralyzed from the waist down in a tractor accident.

But this fall, Oeverman made a giant stride back to normal activity when a new tractor arrived at his farm. The vehicle has hand controls, protective roll bars and a safety belt.

The tractor will permit Oeverman to work on a co-operative basis with his neighbors. They will do much of the hand work on his farm and in return he will use his tractor on their land.

Meanwhile, a special permit from the State Conservation Department allows Oeverman to go hunting right from his car. "I'm not really at a big disadvantage," he says. "I've got a radio, heater and roof over me while the other hunters have to be out in the cold."

Oeverman also has a saddle horse on the farm which can take him where his wheelchair won't. He can accomplish this by hooking himself to either side of the saddle with leather straps.

Zoology Man Says Disaster Approaches

Berkeley, Calif. - (UP) - A zoology professor at UCLA thinks it is already too late for man to avert disaster-not from bombs, but from over-population.

Raymond B. Cowles, author of "Zulu Journal," recently published by the University of California Press, draws his conclusions from studies of South Africa, where he was raised as the son of missionaries.

He contends that all life is indissolubly linked to its surroundings and that all forms of life are interdependent.

Cowles points out that men multiply at a geometric rate while food production can only be increased at an arithmetic rate.

"As a nationalist I can come to only one conclusion," he writes, "which is that no rational solution can be achieved in time to avert disaster to both wildlife and man himself."

Harness Raceways Getting Dangerous

Foxboro, Mass. - (UP) - America's harness raceways are getting to be almost as dangerous as the nation's highways, says silver-haired Townsend Ackerman, who is retiring at 71 after more than 50 years as a driver.

"Stricter regulations in granting licenses to drivers is the greatest need of the trotting and pacing sport today," he said. "It's almost a joke the way it is now. Buy a set of gear, pay the fee and you're a driver. It's as simple as that - and as dangerous."

Ackerman believes drivers should have several years of apprenticeship with harness horses before they are allowed to drive in competition.

'Rebel Yell' Said Hard to Imitate

New York - (UP) - A Columbia University English professor believes it is impossible nowadays for anyone to imitate the famous "rebel yell" of the Civil War.

Allen Walker Read describes the yell as "a mixture of fright, pent-up nervousness, exultation, hatred and a pinch of pure devilry."

While related to the Indian war whoop, the rebel yell "occurred only under the excitement and tension of the battlefield and therefore the real thing has not been heard since 1865," says Read.

Church Honored for Aid To Retarded

Nutley, N. J. (UP) - The Holy Family Roman Catholic church here has been honored for its pioneering work in teaching religion to mentally retarded children.

Guidposts magazine presented its church award to the parish of the Rev. Francis Lo Bianco, who discovered four years ago that mentally handicapped boys and girls were being left out of church activities.

The religious and recreational program which Father Lo Bianco started has since grown to 14 centers staffed by 100 volunteer teachers and serving over 300 children.
