

Upsets Could Turn Rose Bowl Grid Picture Into Rat Race

Washington State and Oregon State, both short-enders, could turn the Rose Bowl parade into a rat race Saturday by pulling a brace of upsets and it's been done before in those traditional contests.

The eighth-ranked Huskies of Washington, presumably closest of all to Pasadena's red carpet, are seven point favorites to get by Washington State in their time-honored clash at Seattle. But the Cougars held Oregon, another bowl candidate, to a 7-6 victory last Saturday and can get mighty rough. A crowd of 52,500 will be on hand to see what happens.

OSC vs. Ducks
Oregon State, which isn't as bad as its 2-7 record looks, also looms as a trouble-maker for Oregon although the Ducks are 15-point favorites. Coach Tommy Prothro is rumored to have worked up a fancy passing attack to throw at Oregon out of his single wing. The Ducks, who have a monopoly on unenviable surprises have an 8-1 record to match Washington's. But that loss was to the Huskies.

A crowd of 80,000 will flock to the Memorial Coliseum in Los Angeles where mighty Southern California rules the nine-point choice over fast-improving UCLA. The undefeated Trojans, who are ranked second in the nation and would have the Rose Bowl sewed except for running afoul of the NCAA, are expected to pass more now that Luther Hayes is back at end. Bill Kilmer, the Bruins' tailback who has regained his early form, may counter with more than his usual quota of aerials.

It's strictly a case of "fail" and farewell to the football season in the northern California area where four teams wind up poor seasons.

Stanford Favored By Five
However, a crowd of 90,000 will jam into Stanford Stadium for the annual "Big Game" between the Indians (3-6) and California (1-8). Stanford has been tabbed a five-point choice to hand the

Bears their ninth straight loss.
San Jose State and College of the Pacific blow the final whistle on a pair of drab seasons tonight in Stockton. This one is strictly a toss-up. The Tigers won their last three games after a futile start and now are 4-4. San Jose State is battling to end up with a .500 mark.

Los Angeles State visits Fresno State in a Saturday night contest while regional frays spot Hardin-Simmons at Arizona State and Texas Western at Arizona.

Twenty-six seniors, 14 for Oregon and a dozen for OSC, will be playing their final games.
The weather man predicted showery conditions tonight "partial clearing" Saturday. Both Coach Len Casanova of the once-beaten Ducks and Coach Tommy Prothro of the seven-times beaten Beavers hoped for a dry field.

The game is one of the most important of the long rivalry. Oregon could be in line for the Rose Bowl bid if it wins and Washington State upsets Washington.

Although both Oregon and Oregon State have gone to the Rose Bowl in recent years the outcome of their annual battle did not figure in the invitation.

1941 Recalled
Oregon went to the bowl after the 1957 season but lost to OSC 10-7. Oregon State went after the 1956 season when it was tied by Oregon 14-14.

Back in 1941 Oregon State edged Oregon 12-7 here and that game clinched the Rose Bowl bid for the Beavers.

Neither coach would comment on his plans for the game.
Oregon has the passing of Willie West, Dave Grayson and Cleveland Jones, and the power of Dave Powell and Harry Needham. Up front the Webfoots have two fine pass receivers in Alden Kimbrough and Greg Althenhofen.

Kasso Key Man
The Duck defense also has improved. Last week WSU's Keith Lincoln made only 28 yards in 17 carries against Oregon.

Oregon State may bank a lot upon a sophomore named Don Kasso. The Berkeley tailback has flashed great form during the season and if his passing and running click on the same day he could make

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Dozen Clubs Battle For Holiday Jaunts

The battle for bowl bids will continue along the college football front this week end, with at least a dozen teams competing for post-season junkets.

Only two major berths have been filled thus far. Top-ranked Syracuse accepted a Cotton Bowl invitation last Saturday and Arkansas agreed Thursday night to play in the Gator Bowl on a unique "if" basis.

Texas will serve as the Southwest conference representative in the Cotton Bowl if it beats Texas A&M as expected on Thanksgiving Day. But if the Longhorns lose, Arkansas will pass up the Gator Bowl for a crack at Syracuse in the Dallas classic.

At least five more berths in the major bowls should be filled by Saturday night. They include both berths in the Rose Bowl, the visiting team in the Orange Bowl, the host team in the Liberty Bowl, and perhaps both teams in the Badgers Eye Bowl.

Wisconsin and Washington are seven-point favorites to knock off their Saturday opponents and wrap up Rose Bowl berths. The Badgers can clinch the Big Ten bid by beating Minnesota if Illinois turns back Northwestern while Washington is expected to gain the West Coast berth if it gets by Washington State.

Kansas will earn the right to represent the Big Eight Conference in the Orange Bowl if it turns back Missouri, provided bowl-ineligible Oklahoma whips Iowa State as expected.

Leading candidates for the other Orange Bowl bid include Clemson, Miami and Georgia. Miami entertains Michigan State Friday night, Clemson has a Saturday date with Wake Forest, and Georgia is idle this week end.

Penn State is expected to be named host team for the Liberty Bowl following its traditional season-end against Pittsburgh. The Nittany Lions, who are seven-point favorites, reportedly voted to accept a bid to the Philadelphia post-season game at a secret meeting Thursday.

Officials of the Blue Grass Bowl have indicated they will tender an invitation to the winner of Saturday's Kentucky-Tennessee clash, which is regarded as a toss-up in most quarters. The other bid may go to Bowling Green, the nation's No. 1 small college team.

Fourth-ranked Louisiana State, which closes out its

regular season as a 21-point favorite against Tulane, remains the top candidate for a Sugar Bowl berth. Officials of the New Orleans classic would like to pit LSU against third-ranked Mississippi in a rematch of their earlier thriller but won't be able to make a move until Ole Miss completes its season against Mississippi State next week.

Undefeated Syracuse, meanwhile, remains an overwhelming 30-point choice for its Saturday date with Boston University. Second-ranked Southern California, the nation's only other major perfect-record team, is a nine-point favorite over UCLA.

In other major traditional battles, Purdue is a one-point pick over Indiana, Iowa is 14 over Notre Dame, Florida is 15 over Florida State, Stanford is 5 over California, and Yale is 6 over Harvard.

Resale Value of Edsels Drop \$400

Detroit — (UPI) — The resale value of Edsels dropped as much as \$400 today, depending upon the age of the car.

The sudden price drop was brought about by Ford Motor Company's announcement Thursday that it would halt all production of Edsels because the car was a failure at the market place.

Ben D. Mills, Ford vice president and general manager of the Mercury-Edsel-Lincoln Division — now the Mercury-Lincoln Division — said the company would soften the blow for persons who have purchased 1960 model Edsels, however.

He said the company would give all persons who bought a new Edsel before production was halted Thursday a certificate worth \$300 on the purchase of other cars produced by Ford.

Dealers caught with 1959 and 1960 Edsels still in stock also will get rebates from the company. Mills said dealers will be allowed \$400 on all unsold 1960 models and \$300 on all unsold 1959 models.

The company produced a total of 2,809 1960 model Edsels before production was cut off. Total production since the car was introduced in July, 1957, was 109,468.

The Edsel was close enough to other Ford car lines so that many of the parts were interchangeable. This will mean it will be easier to get parts for them in the future.

Ford also said its dealers would continue to stock parts for the Edsel.

Wall Street Chatter

New York—(UPI)—The valuation of romance companies has gotten to the point where something is unrealistic, says Walter K. Gutman of Shields & Co.

"... Either they are clearly too high and those who succumb to their glamor now are going to be skulls on the beach of Wall Street later or the ordinary money-making company is valued too low and opportunity is building up for large profits in them," he notes.

"I prefer to believe the latter... and if you switch some of your profits from Mary to Martha now you will eat better in the future," he adds.

Van Alstyne, Noel & Co., discussing Douglas Aircraft: "Considering the current deflated levels of Douglas shares which are down from a 1956 high of 95¢ we think the issue offers interesting capital gains possibilities over the intermediate term, based on the anticipated profits improvement in the coming fiscal year."

Standard & Poor's says Statham Instruments is looking for earnings of more than \$1 a share in the fiscal year ending May 31, 1960, up from 32 cents the year before.

First National Shrine Built By Roman Catholics Dedicated

Washington—(UPI)—The first national shrine erected by American Roman Catholics will be dedicated to the honor of the Virgin Mary today at a ceremony attended by one of the largest assemblies of prelates in U.S. history.

Six cardinals, 200 archbishops and bishops and more than 1,000 monsignori, abbots, priests and nuns will take part in the 2½-hour ceremony at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception.

The \$18,500,000 shrine, begun in 1920, is the largest Roman Catholic church on this continent, and one of the seven largest in the world.

Belonging to all of the nation's Catholics, rather than to any particular diocese, it is intended to be a place of pilgrimage for visitors to the capital.

Cardinal Spellman Officials
Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York will officiate at the dedication ceremonies and will offer the first Solemn Pontifical Mass. The sermon will be preached by Archbishop Joseph E. Ritter of St. Louis, chairman of the bishops' committee for the shrine.

Music will be provided by an all-star choir of 210 monks, representing the best voices from more than 20 religious orders. They will be accompanied by an organ and a full symphony orchestra.

Ranking prelates from every U.S. diocese and several foreign countries were on hand for the long-awaited dedication. Among those assigned to places of honor in the procession were:

Cardinals James Francis McIntyre of Los Angeles, Richard Cushing of Boston, Albert G. Meyer of Chicago, Thomas Tien of Peking, China (now living in exile in New York) and Garibi Rivera of Guadalajara, Mexico; Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, apostolic delegate to the United States; the Most Rev. Lawrence Patrick Whelan of Montreal, representing the prelate of Canada; Archbishop Miguel Dario Miranda of Mexico City; and the Most Rev. Cornelius Lucey of Cork, representing the bishops of Ireland.

Joseph Cardinal O'Hara of Philadelphia was unable to attend because of illness, church officials said.

The shrine, built on a hill-top in northeast Washington adjoining the campus of Catholic university, is Romanesque-Byzantine in architecture, with a massive tiled dome and a 329-foot bell tower. Built like the great cathedrals of Europe, the shrine should stand without major repairs for more than a thousand years, engineers say.

Although the exterior is substantially completed, there is still much interior ornamentation to be done. Authorities estimate another \$12 million will be required to finish the job.

State to Purchase Smaller Autos

Salem—(UPI)—Of 80 cars to be purchased by the state in December, over half of them will be the new compact autos, specifications show.

Forty-one of the cars to be purchased will have wheelbases of 106 inches. Standard autos have 118-inch wheelbases.

Both the standard and compact cars will have six cylinder engines to keep costs at a minimum.

However, state patrol cars will continue to be eight cylinder.

Fire Damages Nut Dryer Building

Dundee, Ore.—(UPI)—A fire which spread from a kiln Thursday night destroyed three-fourths of a 2½-story nut dryer building of Hudson House Incorporated here. Loss was estimated at \$100,000.

The blaze, which broke out about 11:30 p.m., was fought by the Dundee and Newberg fire departments. The trucks were recalled about 2 a.m.

Newberg Fire Marshal Clarence Heater said flames shot 150 feet into the air and were visible for miles.

"Tons and tons" of nuts were destroyed, Heater said.

McMinnville Man Shoots Wife

McMinnville—(UPI)—A prominent McMinnville businessman Thursday night accidentally shot and killed his wife while he was cleaning his shotgun in his home, police reported.

The sheriff's office said that Leo Howard, a beverage distributor and a director of the Yamhill-Plywood company, had cleaned a couple of rifles and had brought his shotgun into the house to clean it.

Officers said the gun discharged, and Mrs. Howard was struck. She was dead on arrival at McMinnville General hospital.

The sheriff's office and coroner's office said no inquest was planned.
