General Assembly May Send Arms Plans to Talks

United Nations, N.Y.—UPI—Unanimous General Assembly approval was assured today for a resolution sending Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's "total disarmament" plan and all other proposals to next year's 10-power arms talks without endorsing any.

A resolution to that effect, carrying the unprecedented sponsorship of all 82 United Nations members, was unanimously passed, without a formal vote, by the Assembly's main political committee Nov. 2. Assembly approval was a formality.

The Assembly's attention was riveted on disarmament at its meeting today with the question of France's projected Sahara Desert atomic test and Ireland's proposal to freeze membership in the world's "nuclear club" both on the agenda.

Resolution Approved—The political committee approved a 22-power Afro-Asian resolution on Nov. 12 calling upon France to give up its plans for the Sahara test because of fears in the neighboring Arab countries of radio-active fallout dangers.

Action by the political committee late Thursday made the fate of the Sahara resolution more or less academic. The committee, by a 60 to 1 vote, with 17 abstentions, approved a 23-power Afro-Asian resolution on Nov. 12 calling upon France to give up its plans for the Sahara test because of fears in the neighboring Arab countries of radio-active fallout dangers.

The committee's 46-26 vote, however, was short of the two-thirds majority required for Assembly approval. Intensive consultations were held seeking a compromise that would assure final Assembly approval.

Bids To Be Called For Jackson Pool

The Medford city council called for bids on the Jackson Park swimming pools last night, after approving new plans and specifications. Bids will be opened Dec. 15.

Both the call for bids and approval of the plans were passed by unanimous votes. There was almost no discussion last night on these measures, which were necessary to bring the proposed pools within the \$90,000 allocated for them by the city.

Earlier bids were rejected as too high, and the plans were revised. The major changes in the plans were the omission of the pool fence and dressing room benches; a contractor's material to be used in the pool walls; and complete date of the contractor's bid, instead of the plans, as originally specified.

No Date Set For Portland Talks

Portland—UPI—Federal Mediator Elmer Williams said today he did not know when the next joint meeting between striking Stereotypers and Portland's two daily newspapers would be held.

This strike against the Oregonian and Oregon Journal was in its 11th day today. The newspapers continued to publish combined editions in the Oregonian plant.

Williams said he had not met formally with either side but had talked to both union and management several times on the telephone. No progress was made at the earlier joint meeting, he said.
