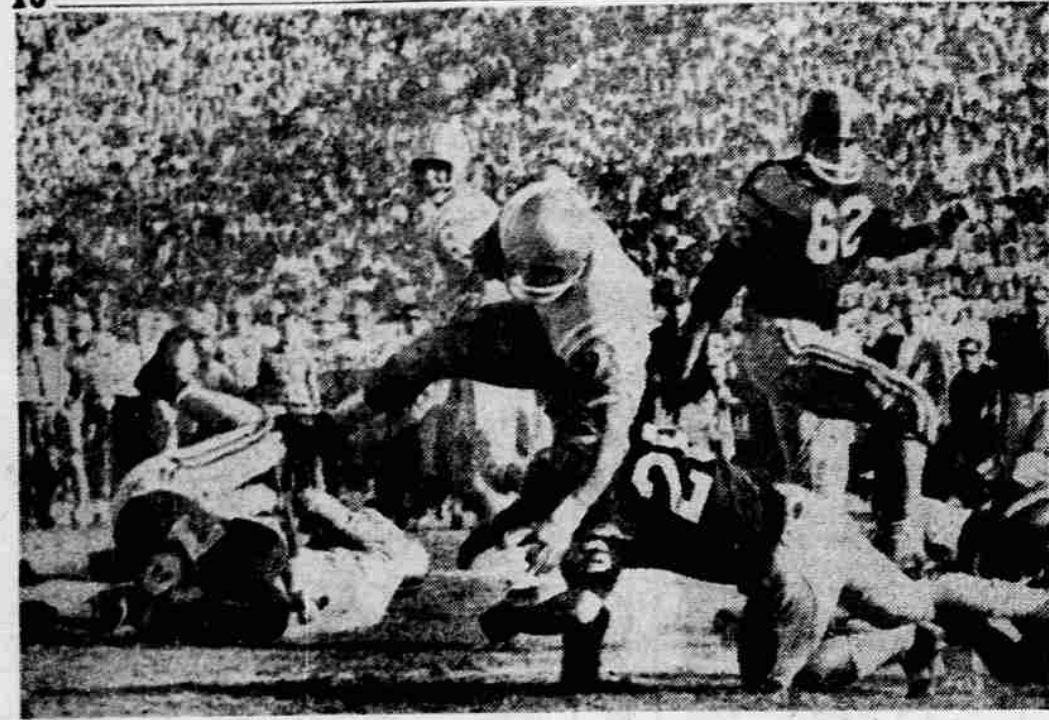

OSC Turns Tiger for Upset, Defeats Oregon Ducks By 15-7

Eugene, Ore. — Oregon State, a football lamb nearly all season, turned Tiger behind the inspired play of fullback Jim Stinnette Saturday and upset Oregon, 15-7.

Stinnette, a 210-pound senior, was a demon on defense and plunged over from a yard out for a fourth period touchdown to clinch the victory. Oregon State had gone ahead, 9-7, with only 59 seconds to play in the first half on a 40-yard field goal by halfback Amos Marsh, the first time he had ever tried a kick from placement.

Marsh late in the game intercepted a pass on the Oregon 45 and returned it to the 33. Halfback Don Kasso broke free for a 26-yard run to the four and Stinnette bolted over in three tries.

The defeat, second of the year for Oregon, killed any Rose Bowl hopes it might have had. It was only the third victory of the season for Oregon State.

Badgers, Huskies Now Bowl Rivals; Syracuse Ubeaten

Wisconsin and Washington clinched the rival berths in the Rose Bowl, Missouri won the Big Eight's bid to the Orange Bowl and Louisiana State received an invitation from the Sugar Bowl Saturday on a college football card also marked by the defeats of Southern California and Penn State.

U. C. L. A. sprang one of the major surprises of the season by handing second-ranked Southern California its first loss, 10-3. Syracuse, which clobbered Boston University, 46-0, thus remained the only unbeaten and untied major power in the country. The Orange faces U.C.L.A. on Dec. 5.

Wisconsin won the Big Ten's Rose Bowl bid by defeating Minnesota, 11-7. Washington clinched the West Coast's invitation to Pasadena, Calif., with a 20-0 victory over Washington State. Missouri defeated Kansas, 13-9, to win the Big-Eight's bid to the Orange Bowl and Louisiana State received its invitation to the Sugar Bowl after a 14-6 triumph over Tulane.

Penn State, the nation's fifth ranking team and a strong contender for the Liberty Bowl in Philadelphia, suffered its second loss of the season when beaten, 22-7, by Pittsburgh.

Texas Christian routed Rice 35-6, and accepted a bid to the Blue-Bonnet Bowl in Houston, Tex., Dec. 19. In Clemson clinched the Atlantic Coast Conference championship and an almost certain bowl bid with a 33-31 win over Wake Forest in the other games involving bowl teams.

Illinois ended Northwest-ern's hopes of sharing the Big Ten title with Wisconsin by scoring a 28-0 upset; Oregon State ruined Oregon's last faint hopes of the west coast bid to the Rose Bowl with a 15-7 victory and Oklahoma won the Big Eight championship and prevented Iowa State from claiming an Orange Bowl bid with a 35-12 triumph.

Notre Dame beat Iowa, 20-10. Kentucky downed Tennessee, 20-0. Harvard scored a surprising 35-6 triumph over Yale and Michigan defeated Ohio State, 23-14, in other feature games.

Wisconsin won its first undisputed Big Ten football championship since 1912 when quarterback Dale Hackbart led an 80-yard scoring drive in the final nine minutes.

Bob Schloredt, who lost the sight of one eye in a boyhood accident, gained 209 yards rushing and passing and scored one touchdown to lead Washington's Huskies into the Rose Bowl. Washington's de-

fense held State's Keith Lincoln to only 33 yards running and two passing during the game. Quarterback Phil Snowden passed for one touchdown and set up the other as Missouri gained its first bowl berth in 10 years. Kansas drove to the one yard line late in the fourth period but the march fizzled. The Jayhawks were their own worst enemies losing the ball five times on fumbles. Prentice Guatt and Ron Hartline accounted for 168 yards rushing as Oklahoma walloped Iowa State but the Sooners were ineligible for the bowl bid because they played at Miami, Fla., last Jan. 1.

All-America halfback Billy Cannon's 45-yard run produced L.S.U.'s first touchdown in the third period and fullback Earl Gros ran 22 yards for the other score after Tulane threatened repeatedly in the first half. The Sugar Bowl committee will not extend its other invitation until Nov. 28 when Mississippi, the nation's third-ranked team which suffered a 7-3 loss to L.S.U. during the Southeastern conference season, ends its schedule against Mississippi State.

Bobbie Clemens raced 35 yards and Fred Cox sprang loose for 86 yards to lead Pittsburgh to its upset of Penn State. Penn State, with quarterback Richie Lucas shackled, did not score until the third period. U.C.L.A. capitalized on a 46-yard pass interference penalty in the fourth period that enabled the Bruins to get a first down on the seven-yard line. Three plays later fullback Ray Smith plunged over to snap a 3-3 tie before 85,917 fans in Memorial Coliseum.

The controversial pass penalty was called against Trojan halfback Jerry Traynham after U.S.C. quarterback Willie Wood intercepted the ball. Larry Terrell ran 95 yards with a fumble as T.C.U. scored its seventh victory in nine starts and George Ury ran 73 yards with an intercepted pass as Clemson rallied in the last four minutes to win the A.C.C. championship.

A crowd of 66,053 at the bowl game in New Haven, Conn., saw quarterback Charley Ravenal and halfback Chet Coultre score two touchdowns each as Harvard won the Big Three championship. Harvard, leading, 8-6, at half time, scored once in the third period and added three touchdowns only seven minutes apart in the fourth to beat Yale for the second straight year.

Bill Gundy's last-minute pass to Alan Rozycki lifted Dartmouth to a 12-7 victory over Princeton. Capt. Harvey Brookins gained 180 yards in leading Columbia to a 26-16 decision over Rutgers, Maryland routed Virginia, 55-12, Lafayette beat Lehigh, 28-6, Delaware edged out Bucknell, 22-6, and South Carolina defeated North Carolina State, 12-7, in other games.

SM Tallies 41-19 Win In Playoff

Athena — Precision sharp St. Mary's high of Medford soared into Oregon Class B football finals with Saturday afternoon's triumph here.

The Crusaders of southern Oregon, touchdowning at the start and concluding with a sparkling run, crushed McEwen's Scotties 41 to 19 in a championship semifinal fray.

McEwen challenged in the final quarter only but by then St. Mary's had a wide command. The Crusaders got the jump on pitchout plays which swept the McEwen defenses. Fierce blocking made the offense go and strong defensive rushing kept Scot offense from jelling until it was a hopeless cause. After three quarters St. Mary's was out in front 34 to 0.

Next week end's championship final will match St. Mary's with Yoncalla. The Eagles battered Knappa Friday 59 to 20.

Pitchouts by Bob Evans, with tosses to brother Bob, got the first three touchdowns for the Crusaders. Alex Mete and Fred Lucas tallied off of scrimmage plays and Roger Hout ran the contest's next to last kickoff back for a wrap up score. For McEwen Jay Moore tabulated on a pass from David Hesp. Fred Baker and Larry Whitney chalked up Scot touchdowns which were set up by short St. Mary's punts.

Bob Evans kicked five conversions for the Medford team. Terry McMillan plunged the lone extra for the Athena hosts.

St. Mary's led 14 to 0 at the quarter and by 21 at the half. Dick Evans swept left end on his brother's lateral for 35 yards for the opening score. The Crusaders charged 65 yards in four plays off the beginning kickoff. Second TD play went 28 yards this time around right end. Touchdown No. 3 was for 18 yards around the portside flank.

Lucas Recovers Fumble
Fred Lucas fell on a McEwen fumble to set up the first marker of the second half. A 26-yard shove went three plays with Alex Mete shooting up the middle for the concluding nine. Bob Evans fourth straight kick made it 28 to 0.

St. Mary's only prolonged scoring march took 15 plays for 68 yards. Lucas bucked over from the two. Then the Scotts made their bid as the scoring pass went for 62 yards. It was thrown to the right flat.

When St. Mary's reserves, now in the game, could get nowhere after the Mac kickoff, Terry Cooper was called upon to punt. The ball went only 21 yards and the Scots took over on the SM 30. McEwen gained the end zone in five plays with Baker reaching it on a four-yard buck. Shortly after this another punt went for 13 yards and the Scotties scored in three plays from their 45. Whitney's touchdown was on a three-yard run.

Vale Squelches Phoenix Pirates 41-14 in A-2 Gridiron Semifinal

Vale-Vale high's high-powered Vikings, favored to take their fifth Oregon A-2 gridiron crown in six seasons, made another big stride in that direction here yesterday afternoon. They victimized the Phoenix Pirates 41 to 14 to barge into the 1959 titular finals.

The Vikings in the semifinal, overpowered the Pirates with their weight and strength, struck also through the air and effectively contained the Phoenix speedy backs. Quarter tabulations were 13 to 0, 27 to 0 and 34 to 0.

Playing in the wind and cold but on a sunny day, the Vale forces ran up 387 net scrimmage yards, 257 by charging on the turf and 119 with their aerial game. Phoenix did get good yardage but not enough to match the Viking power. The Pirates made 205 rushing and 45 pitching for 250 overall.

Punt Blocked
Rob Johnson passed to Dave Wilcox for 12 yards on the initial touchdown play and Wilcox added the first of five conversion boots. Wilcox helped the Vikings to their second TD of the day. He blocked a Ron Baker punt. Dick Fulwyler went over from the one after Vale had taken over on the Pirate 25-yard line.

Fulwyler next crossed into the pay zone on a four-yard run. Then, after an exchange of fumbles, another Johnson covered 28 yards.

The Vikings used Fulwyler's smashing talents again in period No. 3. He rammed 35 yards in five carries, crossing over from the three.

In the fourth quarter the Pirates were the first to score. Mike Reese toured 56 yards on an end sweep. A Reese pass to Dan Lumley picked up the extra point. But Vale came back with an Eddie Colwell to Fulwyler toss that went for 60 yards and another touchdown in the book.

Mike Consbruck got loose for Phoenix at the gun for a 34 yard touchdown run. He also ran the bonus marker.

Fulwyler, 190 pounds, and Wilcox, 200, playing at defensive ends, were given a big share of credit, for holding down the Phoenix breakout threat Pirate Leon Small went once for 30 yards and Lumley for 35. Stan Munson ran well for the Vikings although it did not show in the scoring.

Phoenix, the Rogue league and District 6 A-2 winner, ended a fine year with an 8-3 record.

Arkansas Tops Off Victories

Little Rock, Ark. — (UPI) — A bowl bound Arkansas unleashed a fleet of jackrabbit backs on Texas Tech Saturday to bury the West Texans 27-8, and finish the season with an 8-2 mark, equalling the winningest season in Razorback history.

Senior quarterback James Monroe engineered the Porker speed on first-half drives of 59 and 40 yards and halfback Jarrell Williams twisted 31 years to another touchdown as the Porker took a 21-0 half-time lead.

Arkansas' next stop will be either the Gator Bowl, where they have already accepted a Jan. 2 date or the Cotton Bowl if Texas A&M beats Texas Thanksgiving.

Brilliant in Offense
Jim Mooty, Lance Alworth, Curtis Cox, and Williams were brilliant in the Razorback offense. Mooty, whose ball carrying was limited to third quarter, gained 62 yards on six carries. Alworth, who scored the first touchdown, gained 56 yards on 10 carries.

Williams made the game's most electrifying run, a 31-yard twister in the second period. He shook off Tech's Dickie Polson on the 34 and tacklers before cutting back in and out-distancing Jerry Mohan the last few yards. He received key blocks from Cox and Johnny Fields.

The only Tech touchdown was a 58-yard pass-run from quarterback Glen Amerson to Dan Gurley with 4:16 left in the game. It was the game's longest play.

Leading the Arkansas defense were John Children, Wayne Harris, Marlin Epp, and Jim Hollander.
