Miss Marlene Miller, Medford, attended the bride. She wore a light blue sheath dress with white accessories and a corsage of white carnations.

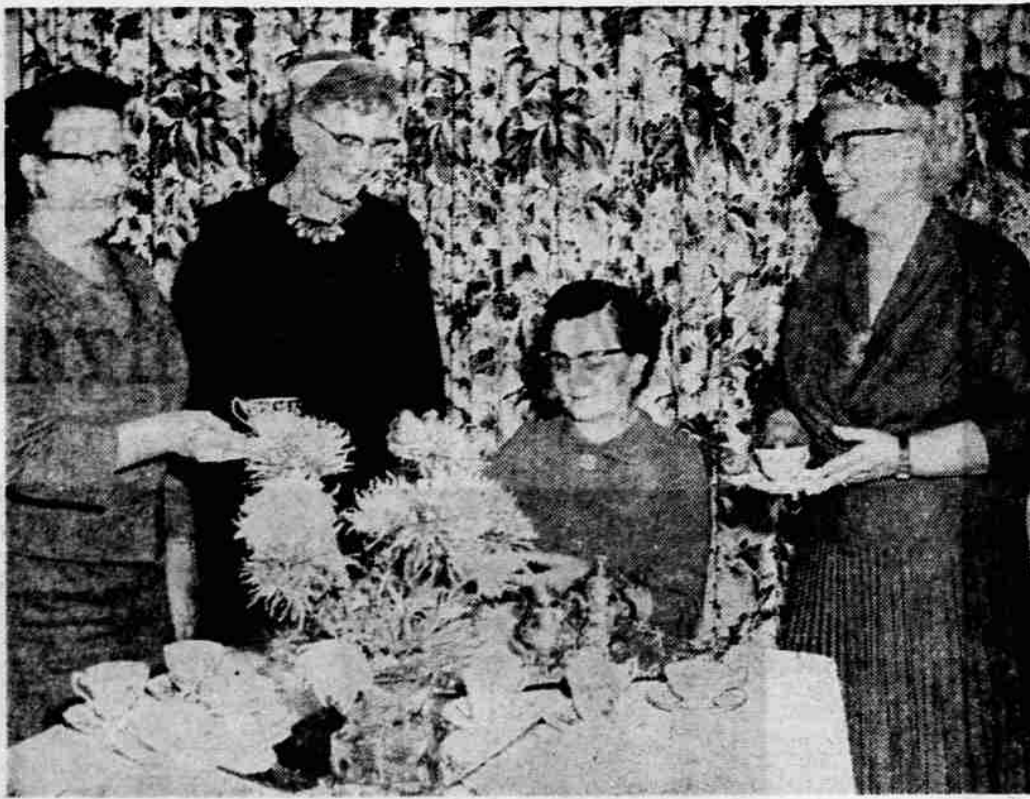
Roger Spaur, Medford, served as best man.

### Concert Program Today Has Schwieger Overture

A composition by Roy H. Schwieger, Medford, will open the first concert of the season by the Philharmonic Society of Southern Oregon, which will begin at 3 p.m. today in the high school auditorium.

Mr. Schwieger's composition, "Overture in D" was written especially for the orchestra at the request of the conductor, Richard D. Werner.

The composer, who attended the University of Minnesota and Northwestern Conservatory, studied piano with Leopold Godowsky for three years. He was employed in the movie industry and taught instrumental music in Los Angeles high schools before coming to Medford in 1956.

In addition to the overture to be performed today, Mr. Schwieger has written a symphony, two symphonic poems, another overture, a piano concerto, cello concerto, oboe concerto, two string quartets, a suite for orchestra and an opera-oratorio, "Solomon."

He has also written many solos for various instruments and several songs for soprano voice.

Soloist for the opening concert will be Miss Sonja Peterson, Medford, a student at Willamette university. She has appeared with a number of orchestras as soloist, in addition to presenting recitals. She has gained a reputation as a brilliant and sensitive pianist.
