

Designer Says Wardrobe Based on Three Dresses

New York —(UPI)— Designer Cell Chapman says the basis of a stylish wardrobe consists of three dresses — a "basic black," a cocktail outfit, and a "gay, gay dress."

"First, a woman should have a good basic dress — black or some subdued shade — that flatters her coloring," the designer said. "This basic dress can be worn with different accessories, but the selection of accessories should be so subtle that even your best friends won't realize they've seen you in that dress before."

"Costume jewelry need not be expensive," she added. "Manufacturers are turning out inexpensive pieces these days, but careful and thoughtful selection must be stressed."

A dress for cocktail parties is a second must for a wardrobe. This outfit may be worn with a variety of accessories.

A cocktail suit or a skirt with several tops is a good choice. "And last, a woman should have one gay, gay dress — and it should be colorful — to provide a marked contrast to the other more subdued outfits," the designer said.

Clothes should be made of durable fabrics that retain shape, but Mrs. Chapman diplomatically ducked questions on how much a woman should spend on clothing each year.

"There's no one who can answer that question, actually," she smiled. "Circumstances differ. For example, a single girl who lives at home can afford to spend more for clothing than a woman who is entirely self-supporting."
